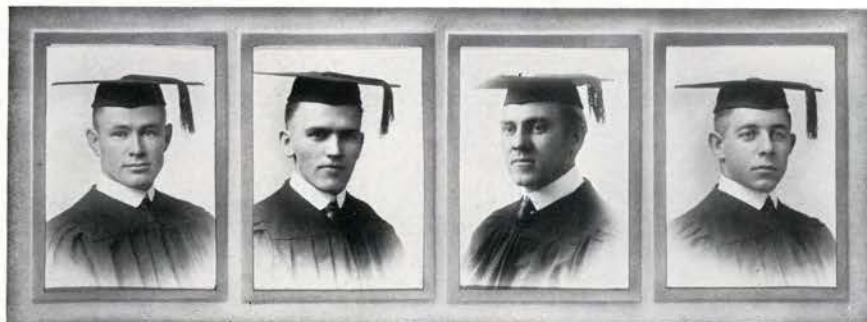
Among other things we have seen the Student Ticket an accomplished fact. The college Health Service established; a system of Intra-mural Athletics installed;

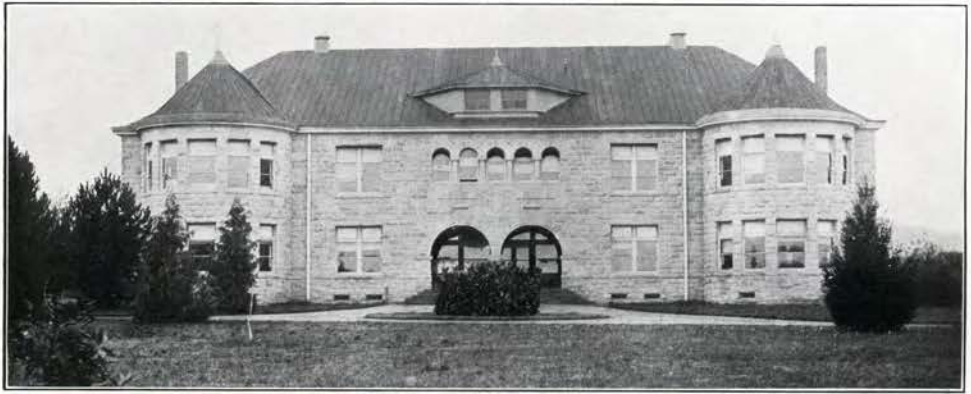

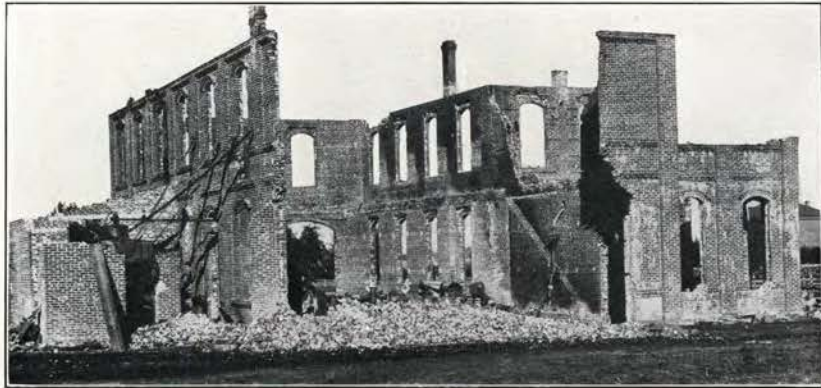

Returning this year we realized the need of co-operation in our big work and we started out determined to hold to our record.

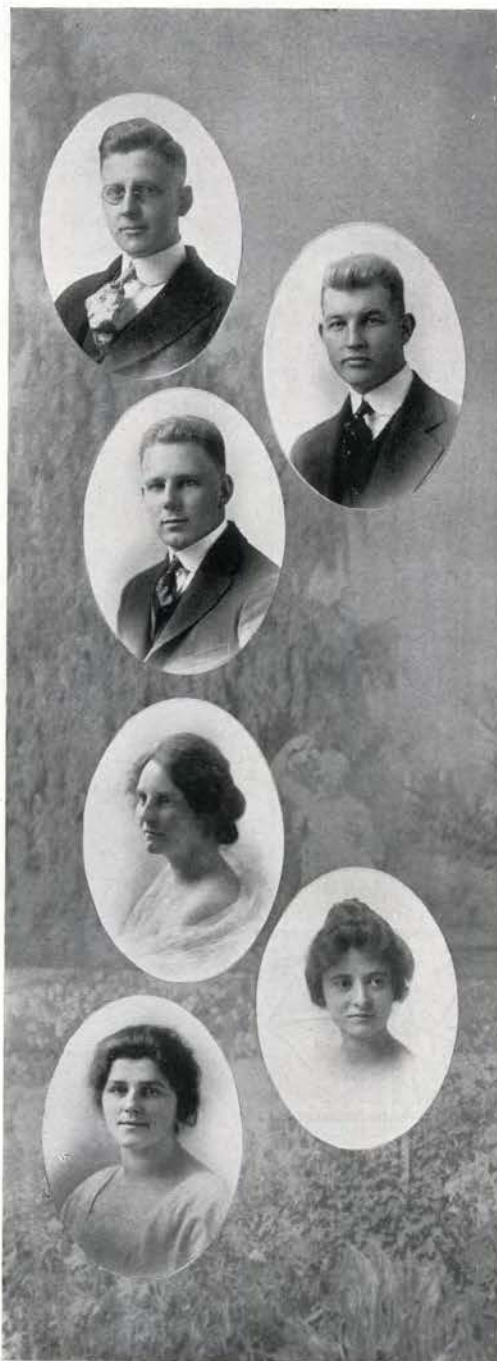

Tomorrow's Flunk Day, and the seniors fall."

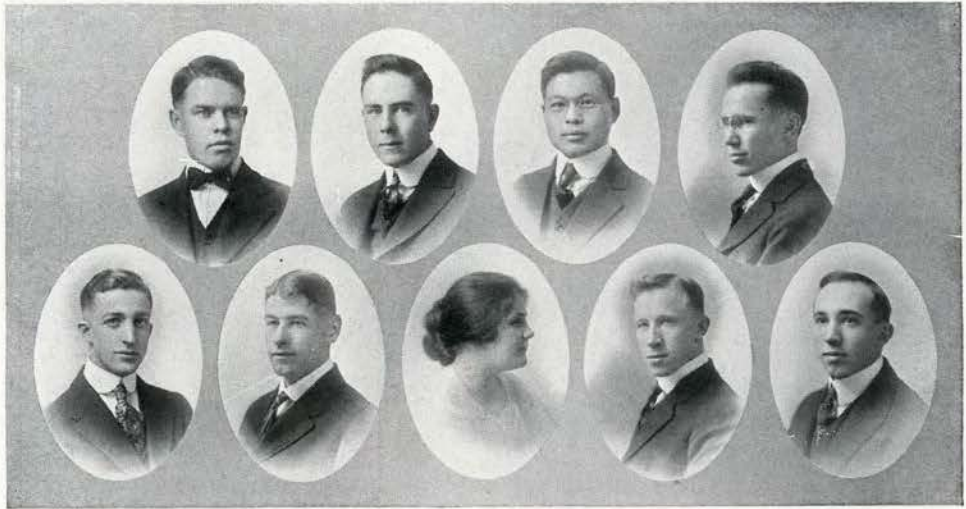
Much else they told of class plots, hatched at midnight,

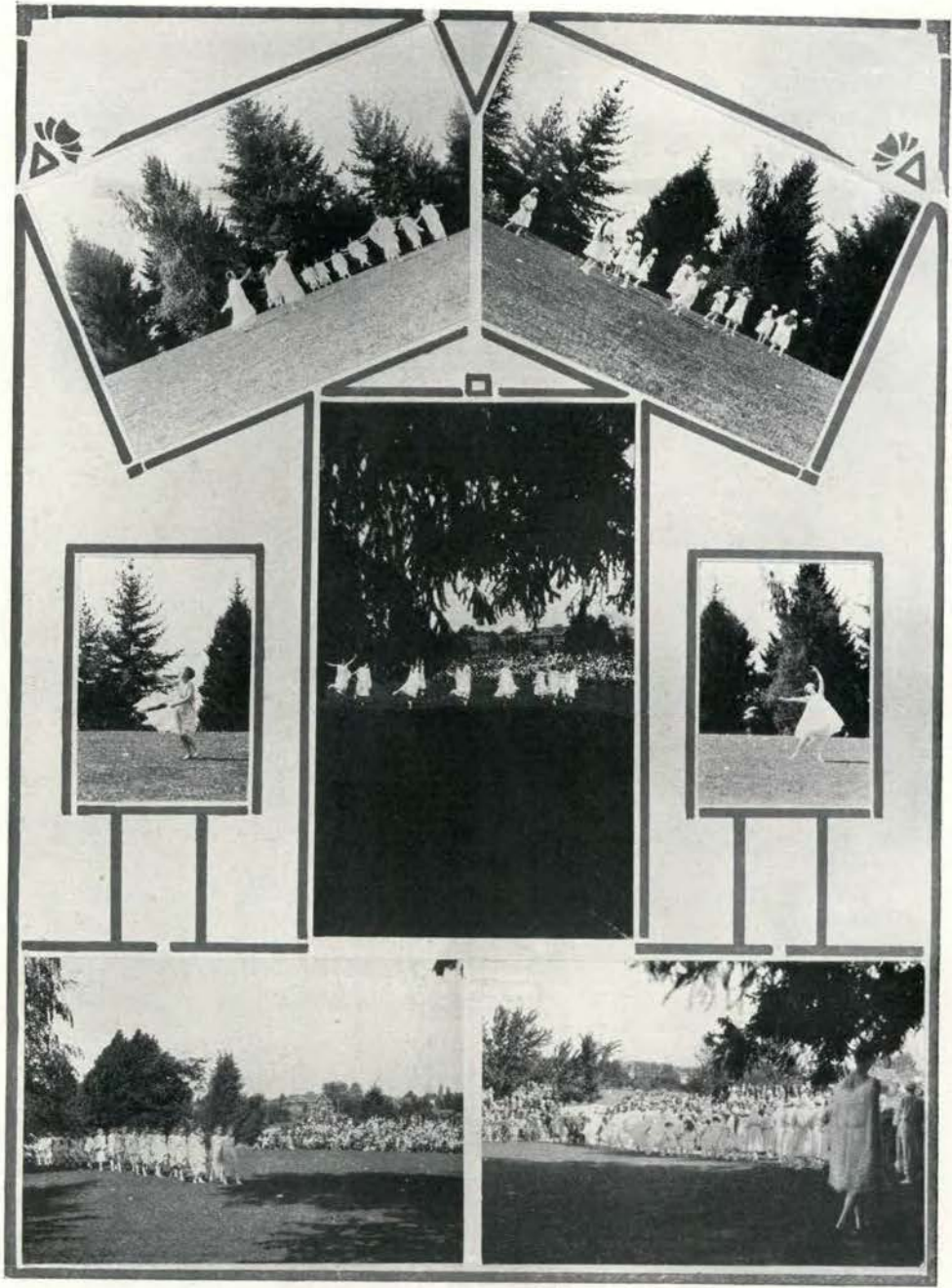




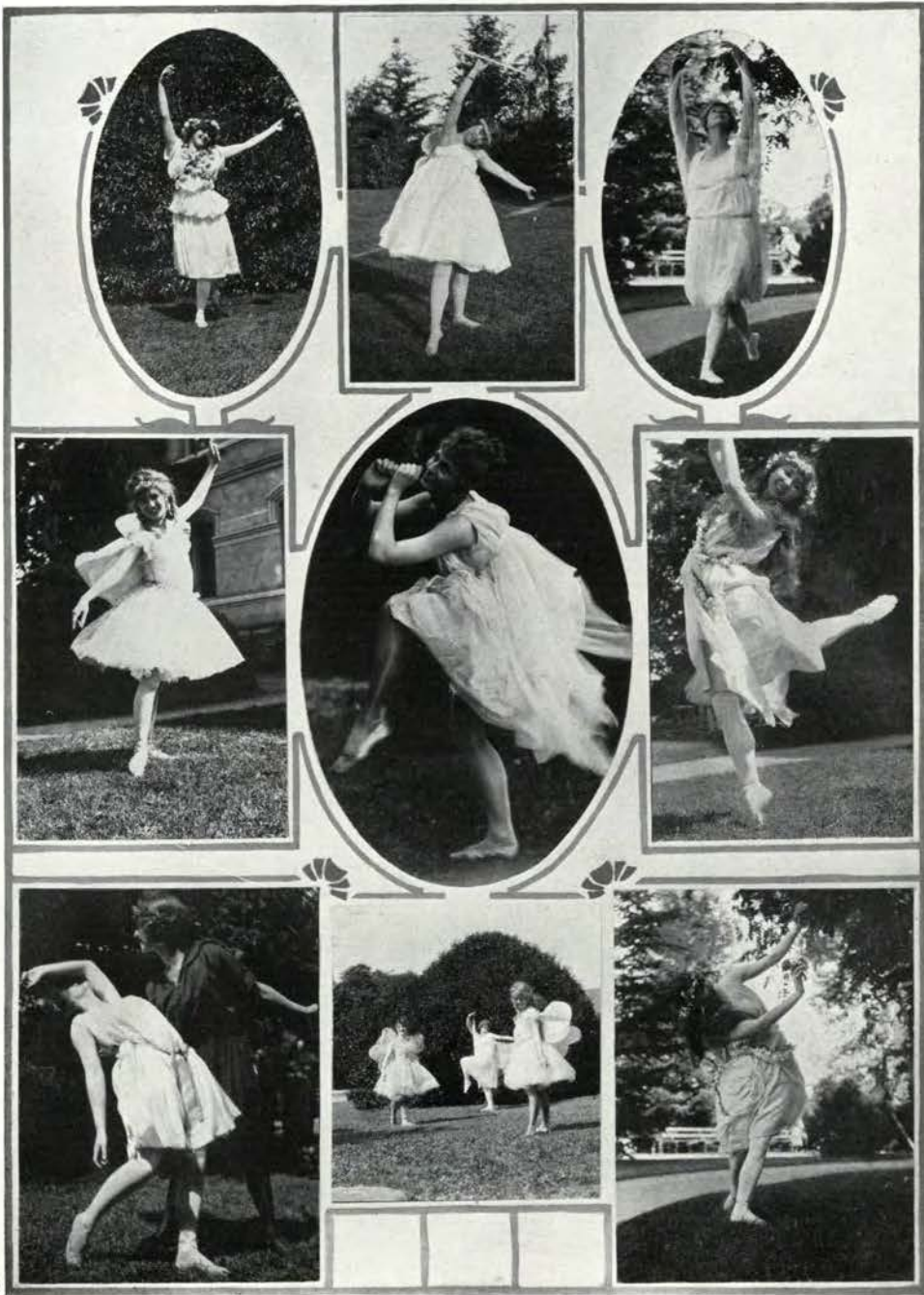
the "Rooks" and "Rookesses" took great pleasure in burning their class emblems of green upon the bonfire.

THE GLEE CLUB TOUR

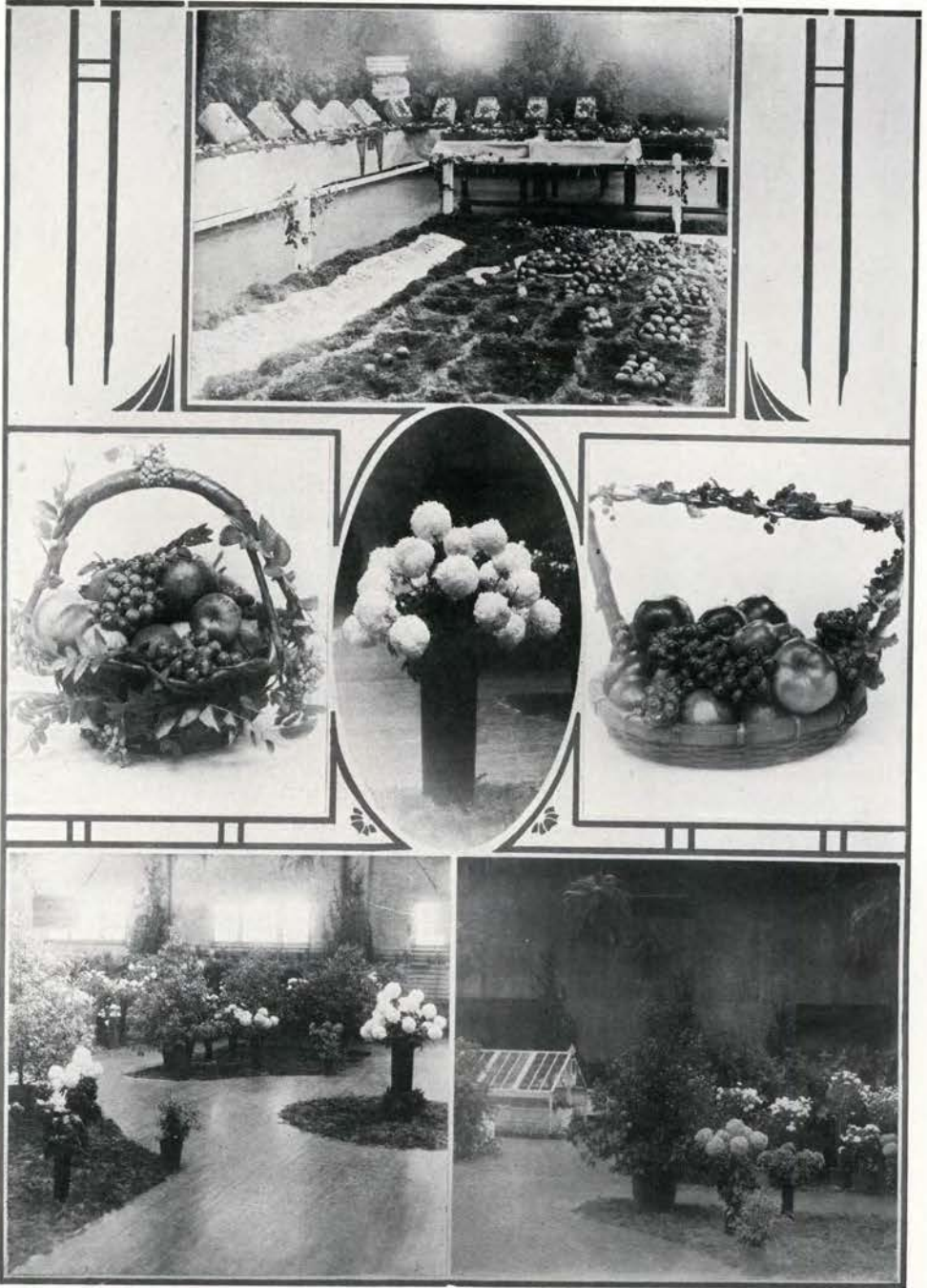

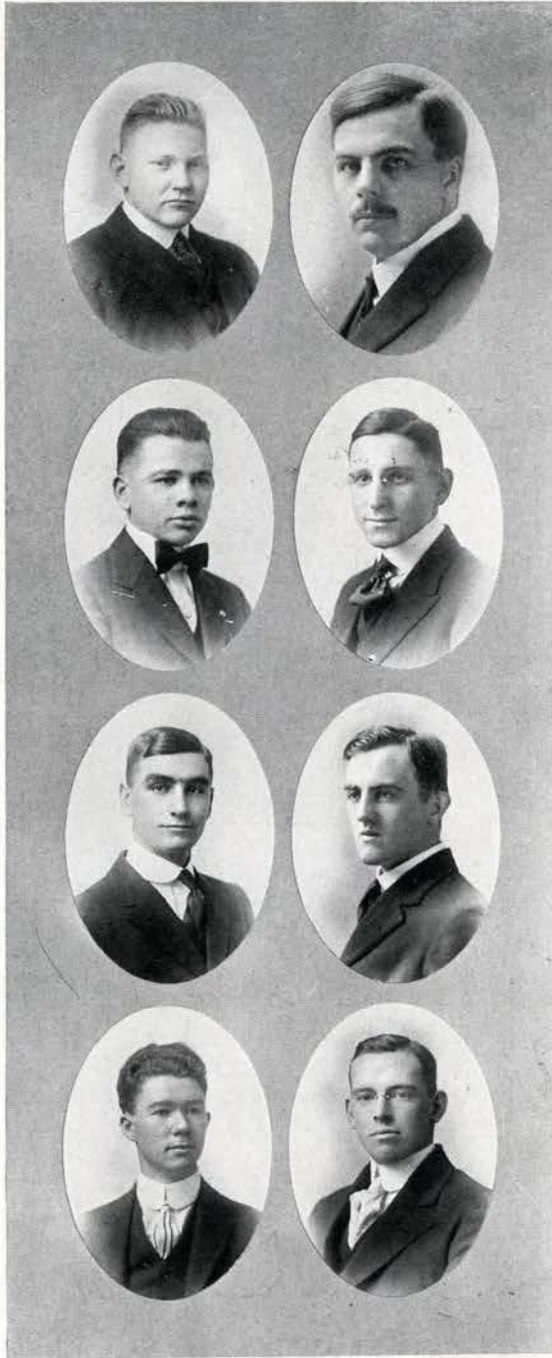

ORATORY AND DEBATE

ORATORY and Debate at the Oregon Agricultural College flourishes in a field that is rich in opportunities to perpetuate and to enhance the art of the ancients, the utility of the man of today and the conquering force of the man of tomorrow.

Early in the year plans were laid for a schedule that was prolific in contests. We will meet this year in our major intercollegiate debates the University of Oregon and Washington State College.

This year marks the time when on our campus the Intercollegiate Oratorical Convention and Contest is held. It comes to our school but once in eight years and we are indeed fortunate that we will be in a position to welcome the sister institutions of the state and their representatives to a school that believes emphatically that the experience that the students obtain from this activity is of more value in after life than the mediums of commerce.

There has been a strong effort made for a large number to try-out for the interclass teams both in oratory and debate and the results of this stimulation have been very gratifying. There is indeed a tendency of the entire student body to relinquish the old theory that to be a speaker one had to be born with the silver tongue and they have come to realize that proficiency in regard to this ability lies in experience and continued effort.

The outstanding innovation of the present year has been the inauguration of the extension debate. Simply put, it consists of taking the questions of popular interest to the voters and the taxpayers of the state, to their own homes and communities and after offering both sides of the question in their arguments the verdict is left with the individual.

It is a new field, a new world for our orators and debators to conquer. Nothing could be more instructive, nothing could yield dividends of greater cultural value than the keen application of the principles of extension work to debatable questions of state importance. The day of the question that involves some fine and complicated point in our code of international law, or that deals with world politics, or that permits of the academic discussion of some abstract point or principle of conduct is on the wane and the entrance and birth of the question that is live, that pulsates with the energy and vitality of our lives as we lead them has arrived. May its birth be a mile stone in the advance of intercollegiate forensics.

To those who have been our friends and advisers; to those who have aided us in our work for the betterment of the citizenship of this state, we pay our respects for their appreciation of our own weak efforts. To our coach who has labored without stint that success might be ours at the end of the race we owe a debt of honor and obligation that can never be repaid.

Forensics are invaluable in our daily life, they recall the patriotism of the pioneer, the justice and the mercy of the statesmen of our national condition and the glory of a peace that passeth all understanding.

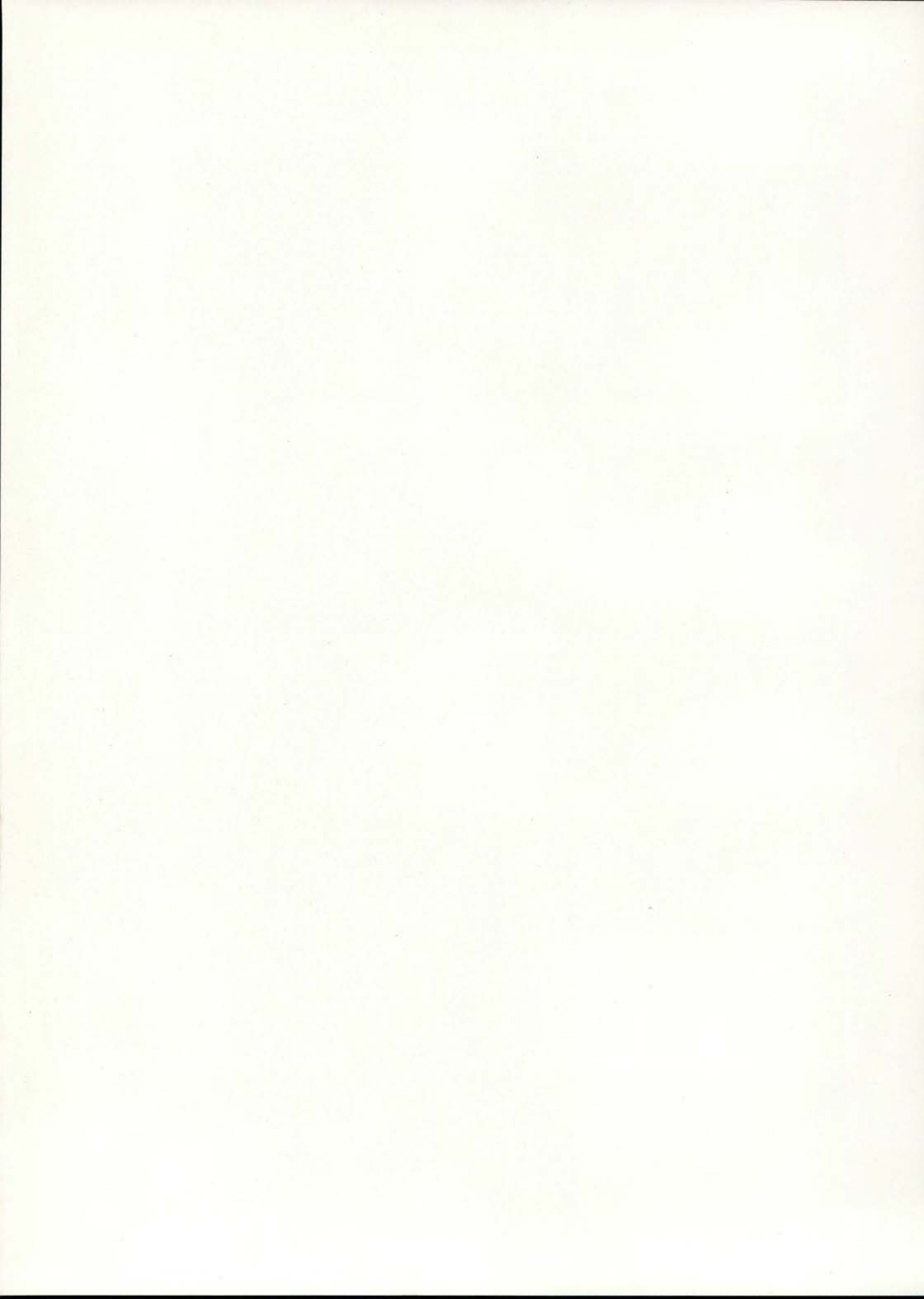


WALDO HALL

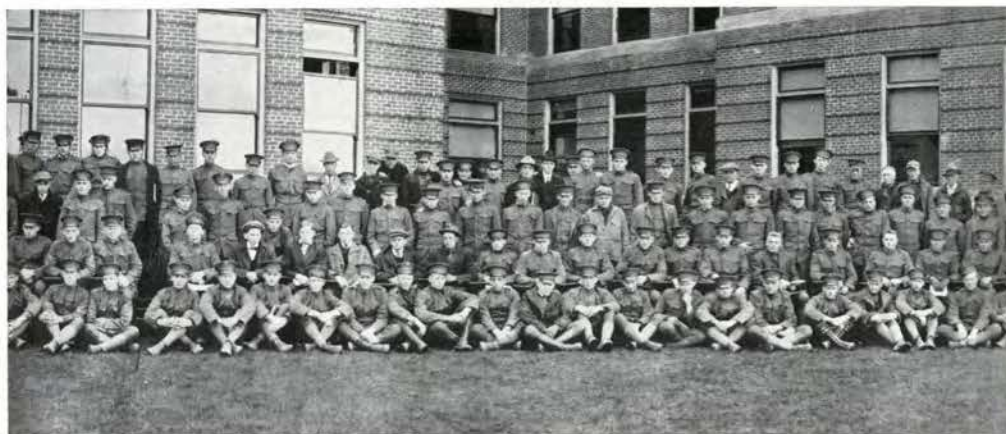


THE AGRICULTURAL CLUB

The Club publishes a monthly magazine, "The Oregon Countryman," which now stands among the most efficient and reliable publications of its kind.

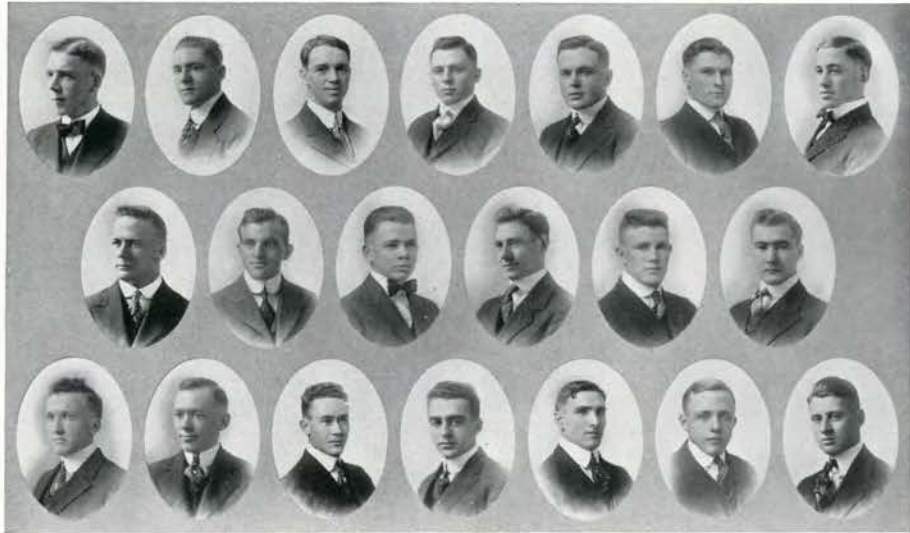

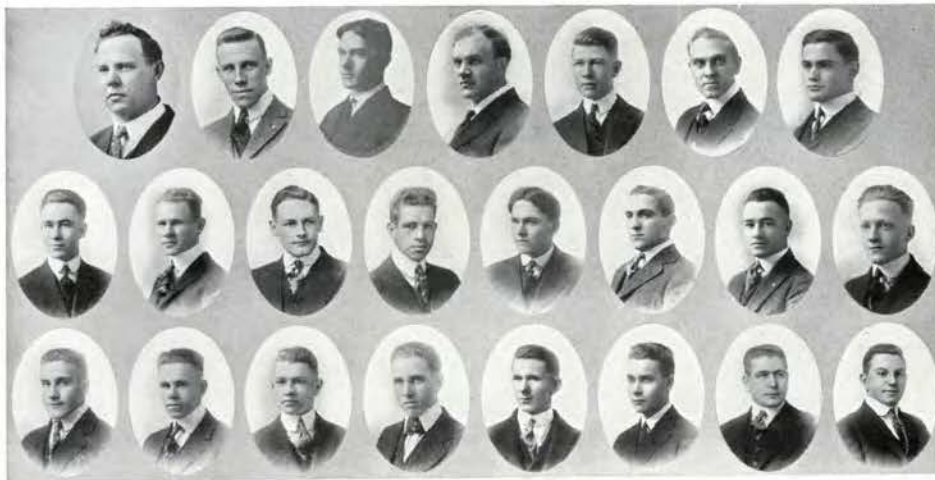

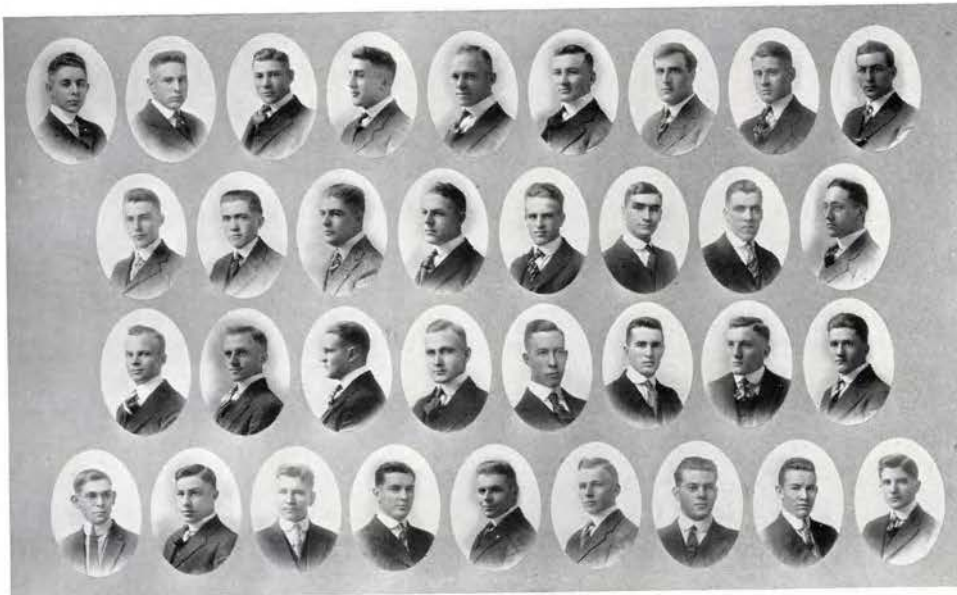

AMERICAN INSTITUTE OF ELECTRICAL ENGINEERS

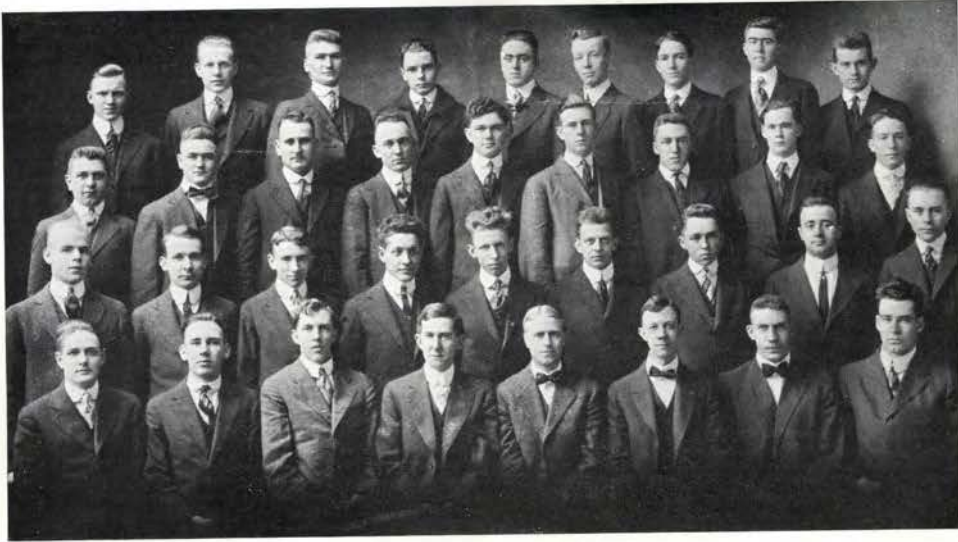
THE American Institute of Electrical Engineers is the national organization representing the electrical engineering profession. It was founded in 1884 when the possibilities which might follow from an organization which would foster and encourage electrical development were beginning to be realized.

The objects of the Institute are the advancement of the theory and practice of electrical engineering and of the allied arts and sciences, the maintenance of a high professional standing among its members, and the development of the individual engineer.

The Institute membership is now the largest of any of the national engineering societies. This membership is made up of honorary members, fellows, members, and associates. In addition to these there are several hundred students in the various engineering colleges who may transfer to associates on graduation.

Under the provision of the Institute's by-laws, "any person registered as a student in any educational institution, and pursuing regular course of study in electrical subjects, and attending classes therein" may be enrolled as a student of the Institute upon payment of the annual fee. This entitles students to receive the regular publications and to attend all meetings. The student branch meetings afford opportunity for independent activity and initiative on the part of students, and also opportunity for cultivating many of those qualities needed by the engineer which are not afforded by the class room and laboratory, such as the preparation and presentation of engineering topics not covered by class room work and which in many cases are better presented by individual students as a result of their own reading or investigation.

The Oregon Agricultural Student Branch of the Institute has been a successful organization for nine years. The earliest plan was to confine the membership to the upper classes, but all classes are now welcome and urged to be present at the meetings. It has been the purpose of the program committee to have discussions of questions which will be of interest to all students interested in electrical subjects and to vary these discussions with talks from prominent engineers in touch with practical work, and an occasional debate on some live topic.

THE FOREST CLUB

THE Forest Club of the Oregon Agricultural College is a club composed of the students taking the courses of General Forestry and Logging Engineering enrolled in The School of Forestry. The club has steadily increased from its founding seven years ago to over eighty members at the present time.

The club holds its meetings bi-monthly, alternating with technical and social gatherings. In the technical meetings either some one of the students outlines his summer's experience, or a forester or lumberman is secured to give a talk on some side of the work. These lectures are occasionally illustrated by stereoptican slides or by moving pictures.

The School of Forestry was fortunate last fall in being able to move into its new \$40,000 home which gives it ample room to expand and to have the laboratories in which the students may do practical study and research work.

Many trips are taken each year by the students in the different courses to the woods to practice some of their theory, and also to the various logging and milling operations in the state. This year the seniors in Logging Engineering are to take a trip of two weeks working in the logging operations at Cathlamet, Wash., while later in the spring the rest of the school will be gone for two weeks to the National forests of the Cascade Mountains working in connection with the United States Forest Service.

The members of the club always take an active interest in the college affairs and the sports on the campus and hold a reputation for their "pep" displayed at all of their gatherings.

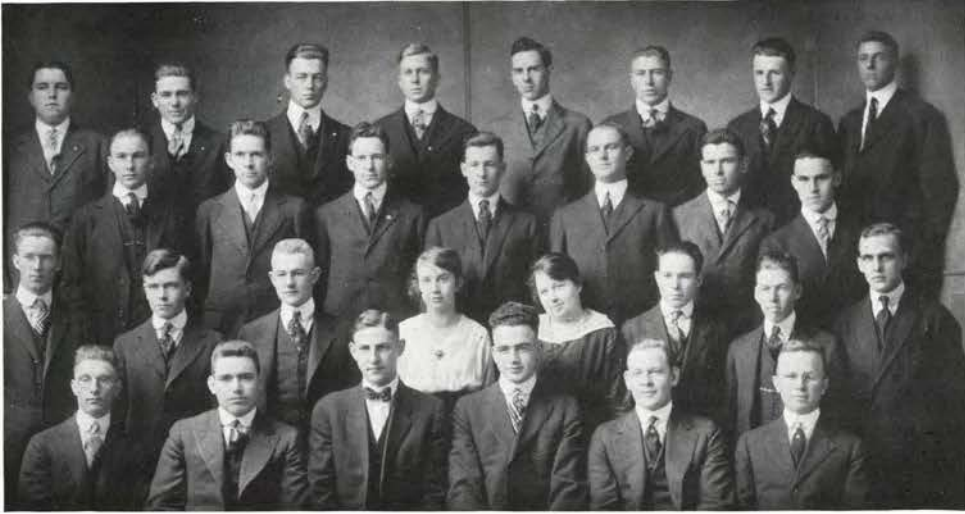
THE PHARMACEUTICAL ASSOCIATION

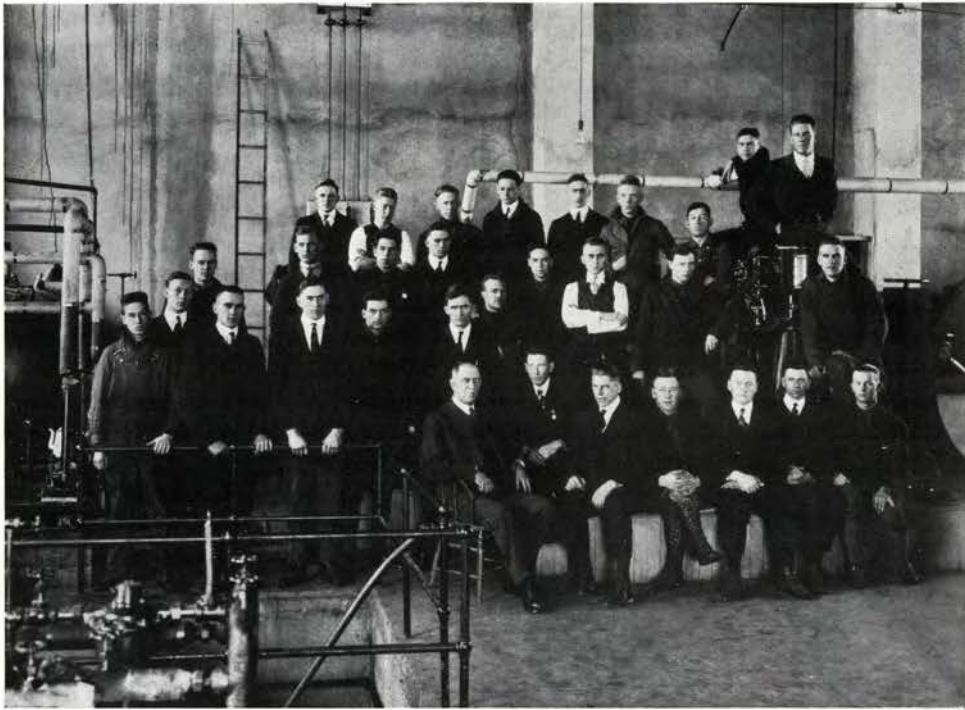

F. Winston Walton, the present president, has kept up the Club's former record and has proven that sectional clubs, if managed correctly, are a benefit rather than a deterrent to the College.

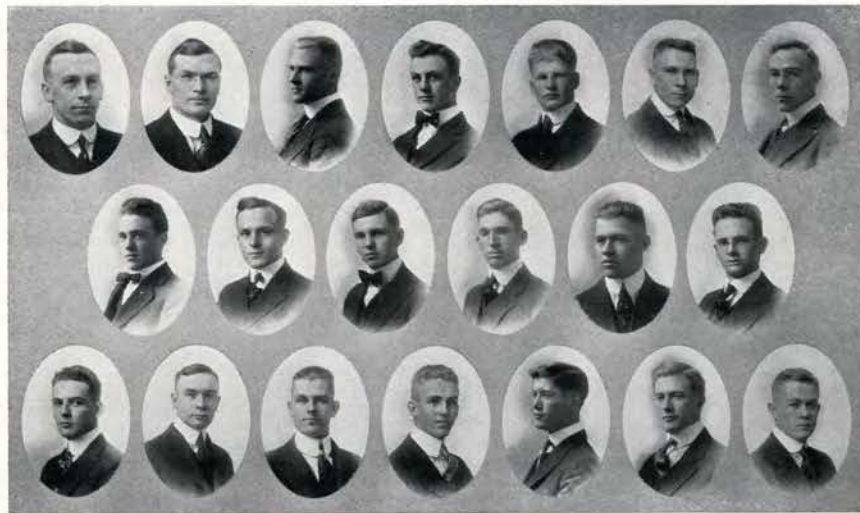

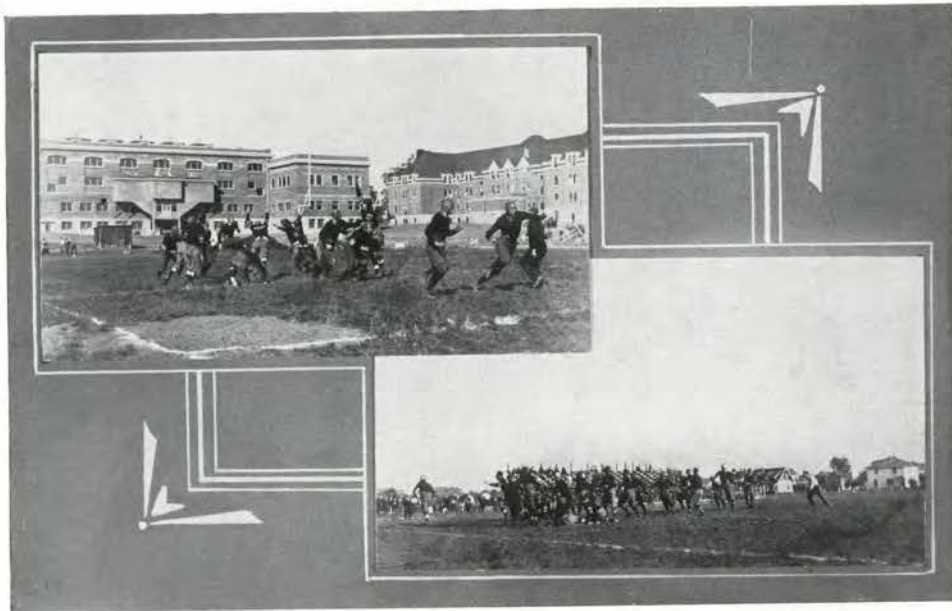


FOOTBALL REVIEW

IT was with a feeling of anxiety that our new coach Pipal, awaited the response to his call for early foot-ball practice last fall. Of the twenty men who had won their letters in action last year, graduation had taken heavy toll, and as a result only six veterans were left, and of these, Cole was the only man who had held down a regular position. Brooks, Newman, Bissett, Moist, Dutton and "Dad" King were in the harness and showed some of the stuff that won them a place on the team the year before.

The season opened with the Alumni game, Sept. 23, '16, in which the "old warriors" downed the Beavers by a score of 14-7. The next game was with Multnomah Sept. 30, Altho the "Aggies" were defeated 3-0 in the last three minutes of play, they showed marked improvement in defensive play but lacked the driving power. The greatest loss to the team was Half-back Dutton who was taken out with a broken leg.

On the fifth of October The Beavers, with Captain Lee Bissett at their head, and with the weakest line-up that ever represented the Orange and Black, left for Moscow, Idaho, to play their first Conference game. Contrary to expectations they overwhelmed Idaho and came back with a 26-0 victory. One week later the team left to oppose Coach William Dietz's champions. In one of the most spectacular games ever played in the Northwest, O. A. C. defeated W. S. C. 13-10. Pipal's men fought the far-famed Dietz's team to a stand-still. The work of Newman and Conn was a revelation to the fans. The Dietz machine was puzzled by fake plays, which were for the first time used in the Northwest and were dis-



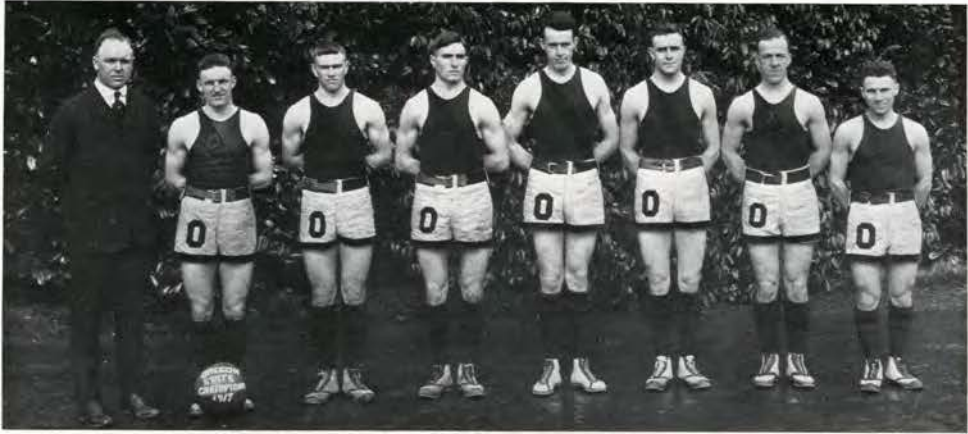
tinctly a Pipal product. The crippled Beavers left for Portland the twenty-first of October to tackle Nebraska, the Middlewest Champions. Fighting to the last minute of play, the Beavers held the husky "corn huskers" at bay for over three quarters, when superior weight of the visitors began to tell. The final score being 17-7. The sensation of the day was Tuffy Conns 103-yard run for a touchdown just as Nebraska had hammered its way down to the Beavers' goal line. In this game O. A. C. lost another valuable man, "Oz" Walker as he was taken out with a broken leg.

On November 4 O. A. C. won its third Conference victory by defeating Whitman 23-0. One week later, November 9, '16. Coach Pipal with his Beaver team minus his Freshman stars left for Seattle. In a hard fought game the Beavers succumbed to the terrific onslaughts of Dobies backfield and went down to defeat, 35-0.

On November 25 the "Oregon Classic" was played at Corvallis, doped to lose by forty or fifty points, the Beavers, with that same old fight which they showed all season, held the powerful Bezdek machine to twenty-eight points.

The season was brought to a close in Los Angeles, Cal., where the Beavers defeated U. S. C., Southern California champions, by the score of 16-7.

Newman, the smashing "All Coast Fullback," was elected to lead the 1917 Beavers, and with the promising Freshmen O. A. C. should be well up among the leaders.

BASKETBALL REVIEW

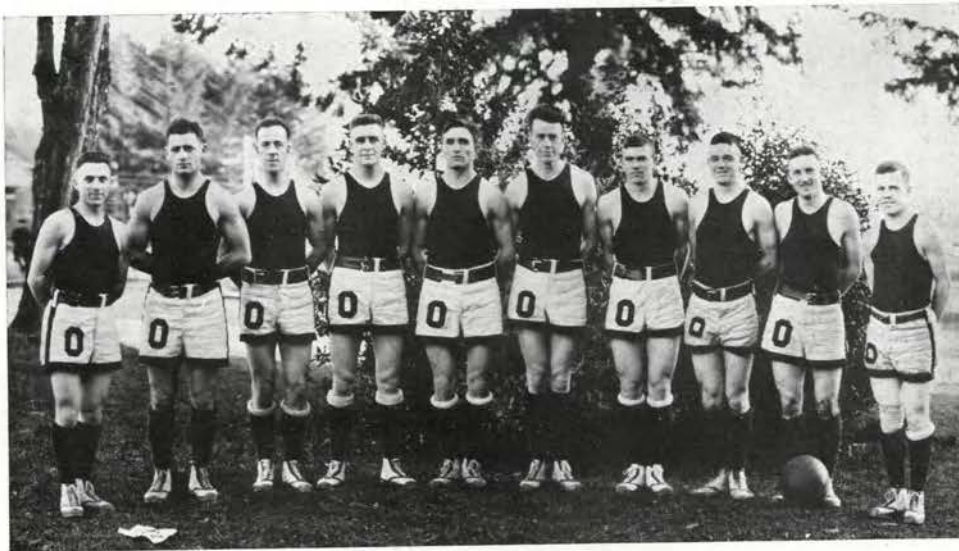
WITH five letter men back in school everything pointed to a favorable season in basket-ball, but the loss of Mix, the Varsity captain, at the beginning of the season made a hole in the defense that could not be filled by anyone except Mix alone. However, with the four remaining men and few good substitutes Coach May went through the season in good style.

The season opened January 5th with a pre-season trip to McMinnville and Newberg, the Varsity winning two easy games from the McMinnville Firemen by scores of 28-15 and 28-5 respectively. With a substitute line-up the Varsity lost the next game to Pacific College by a score of 34-25.

The Conference season opened at Eugene where the Beavers, playing sensational ball, took two games from Oregon by scores of 41-8 and 24-7. One week later the Oregon team made its appearance on the O. A. C. campus and lost the two remaining games, the Beavers making a clean sweep of the series, annexing the championship of Oregon. On February 3rd Pacific College played the return game in Corvallis and were decisively defeated by the score of 42-9.

The next conference games were with the University of Washington February 5-6. The Washingtonians played a fast game and won the first battle 27-20 but the Beavers came back the next night and took the second game 27-14. On February 9th, W. S. C., fresh from a victorious trip to California won from O. A. C. by a score of 28-17.

The Beavers closed the season with a trip to Washington and California and played six games. On February 14-15 they were defeated by Washington in two of the freakiest games seen in the Northwest. The luckiest team won and as dame fortune wasn't with the Beavers they lost. Doped to lose by a large score to California the Varsity held that wonderful aggregation of stars to a tie score, but in the



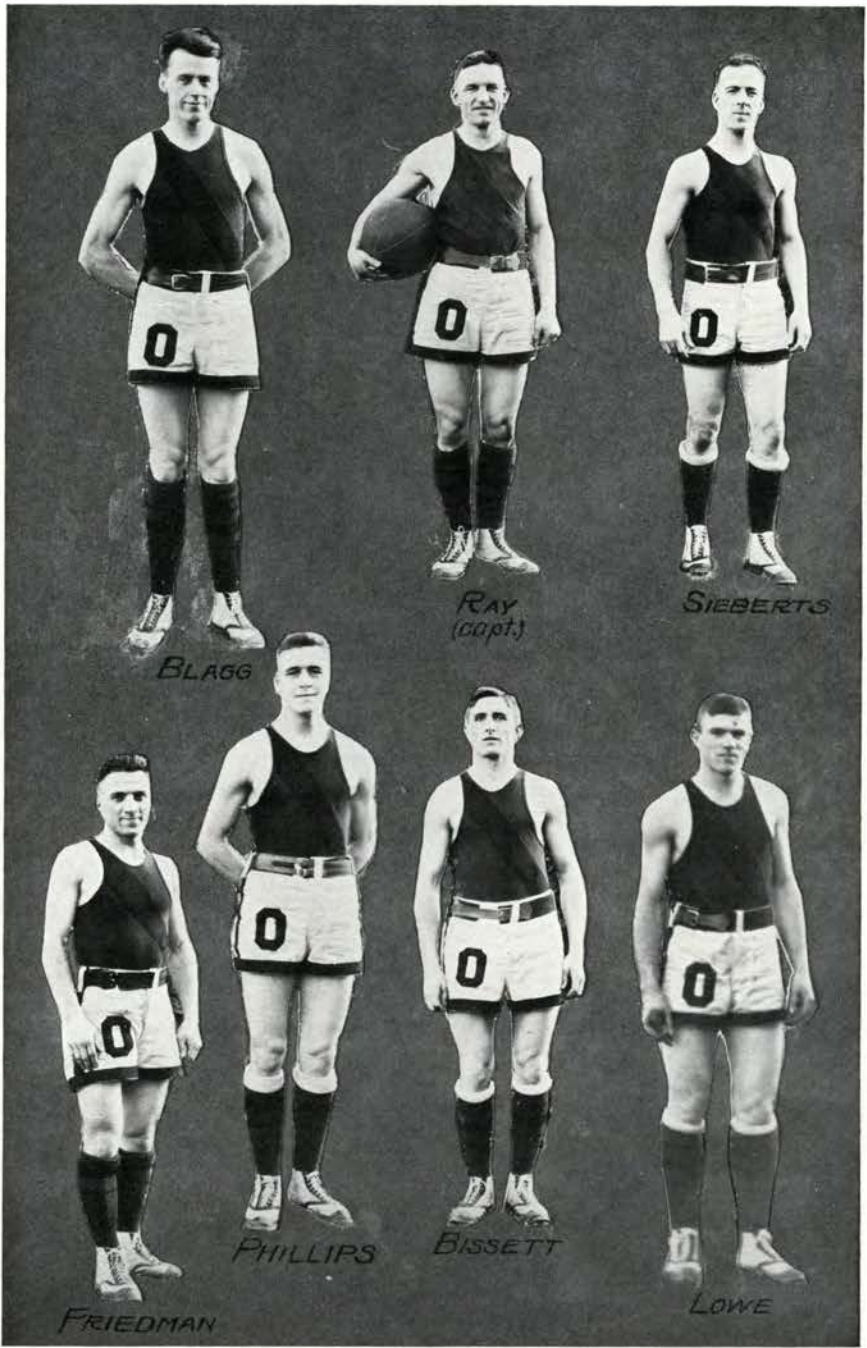
play-off were defeated by two field baskets. In the second game, which was also hard fought, the Bears emerged the victors by the score of 20-11.

The last two games were with the University of Stanford and, although tired, out, the Beavers still had the old fight and won by scores of 23-17 and 19-13. Although losing five conference games the Beavers finished third in the standing.

Are men of Varsity material and they are expected to do things next season.





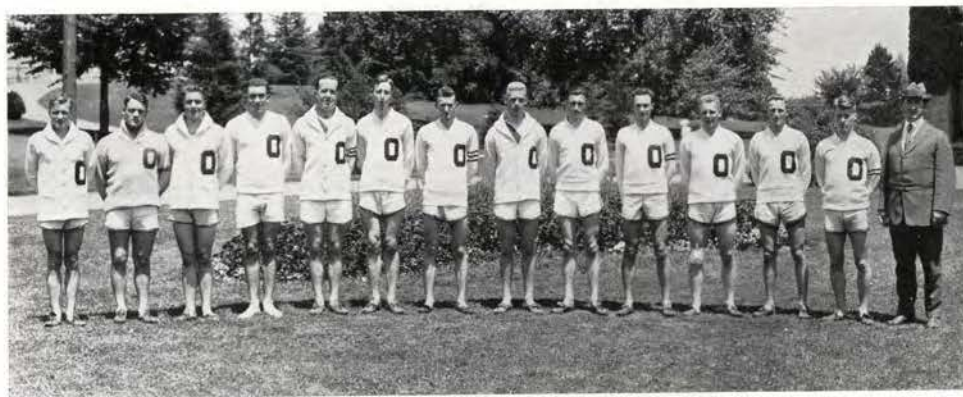
TRACK REVIEW

THE season of 1915 was a most successful one, even though we lost to Oregon, our bitter rival. To start out with, Coach Stuart had good material on the squad and developed a good team. The first big meet was the Far Western Meet, held on April 1, in the Armory, in which O. A. C. emerged victorious. Four world's indoor records were broken and one coast record was tied. Coleman tied the Coast record for the half mile in 2' 4-5"; Cole broke his own indoor record by heaving the discus 140 feet, 9½ inches.

The next meet on the program was with Multnomah on the outside oval, held on April 29th. Beaver speed men were too much for the Portland Club men and they were humbled by a score of 76 to 55.

April 27 saw the University of Washington invade the Beaver territory and go away defeated by a 79½ to 51½ score. Clyde of U. of W. lowered his own Coast record in the mile, being closely pressed by Coleman.





On May the 13th the Beavers went to Eugene for their annual dual meet. By taking 9 first out of 15 events and their portion of second places and thirds the Lemon-Yellow athletes defeated the Aggies 71 to 60. Fee of Oregon broke the Northwest record in the pole vault when he cleared the bar at 12' 4". Aggie Records were made by Coleman in the Mile, Bryant in the High Jump, Damon in the Javelin and the relay team also made a new record.

The Northwest conference meet was held at Pullman on June 3. According to dope Oregon won by a score of 37 with Idaho next, 29, and O. A. C. third at 28. Two records were broken. Capt. Kadderly broke the Coast record in the 440 yard sprint in the phenomenal time of 48 3-5 seconds. Hoover of Whitman made a new conference record in the low hurdles.

The conference meet closed the 1916 season. Coleman was elected to lead the 1917 track team, and a more worthy man never donned an O. A. C. track suit.

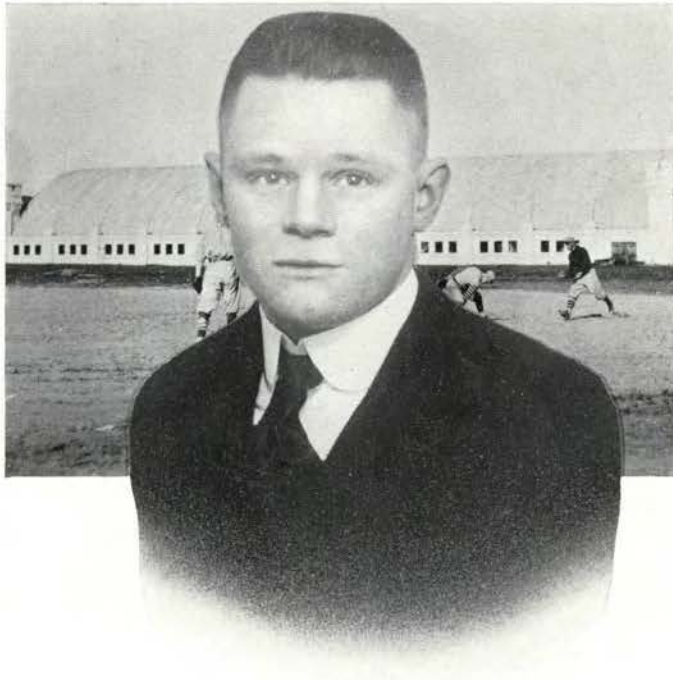

BASEBALL REVIEW

THE Varsity opened the season with a ten days' trip to the Inland Empire and came back with a record of four wins, three defeats; winning from Baker High, two from the College of Idaho, two defeats from the Spokane Northwestern League team, 1 defeat from the U. of Idaho, and a ten inning tie with W. S. C. The big score was from Willamette—16 to 1.

On April 20 the team left for Seattle for the first Conference games, to be held on the 21st and 22nd. The games were hard fought and showed real baseball on both sides. The first game resulted in a victory for O. A. C.—7 to 2. Williams, of the Beavers' pitching staff won decisively over Rogers of U. of W. In the second game, however, Rogers came back and let the Beavers off with only two runs and seven hits, U. of W. winning the game by a score of 3 to 2. The Beavers took both games at Corvallis—9 to 3, and 2 to 1—which put the Orange and Black at the top of the Western Division.

The dope was upset when the Beavers dropped two games to Oregon, at Eugene, on May 3rd and 4th, by scores of 6 to 5 and 10 to 2 respectively. These defeats seemed to put the pep in the Beavers for they came back with the aid of Siebert's twirling and took both games at Corvallis and the Championship of the Western Division. These winnings entitled the Beavers to the California trip, but

on account of a demoralized pitching staff the Southerners took three games and the Pacific Coast Championship.

This ended the 1916 season. Because of injuries and pressing exams the Beavers could not make the Pullman trip for the Northwest Championship.

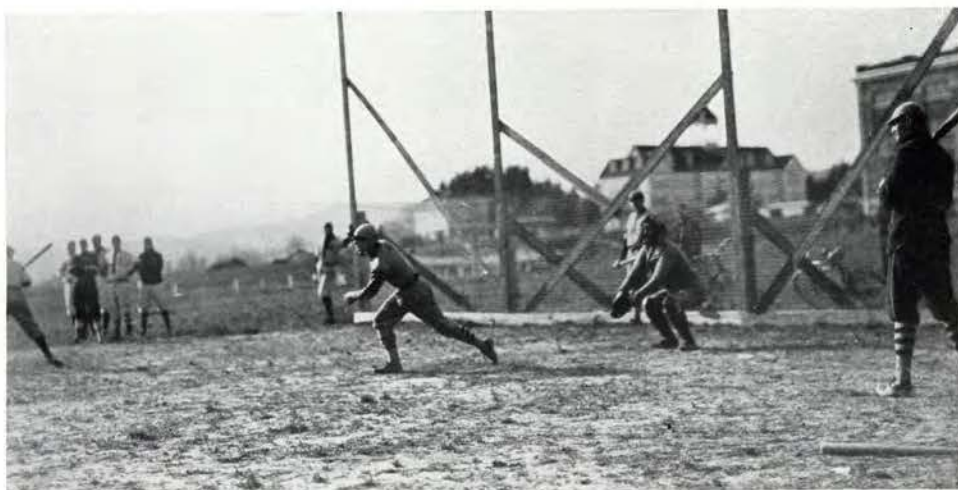

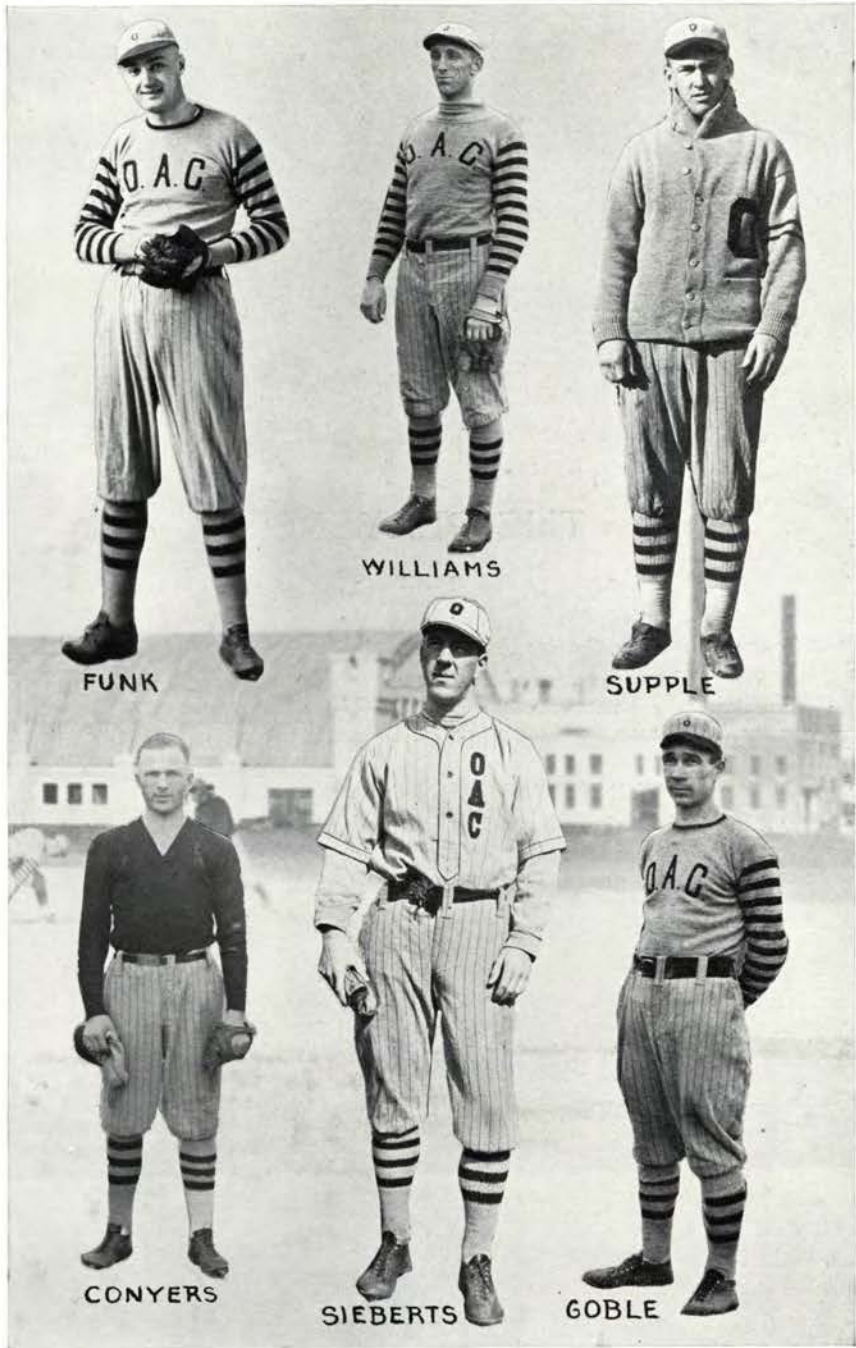

WRESTLING REVIEW

ONCE again the "Beavers," by taking another Championship, have demonstrated that when it comes to wrestling they are in a class by themselves. The result of this season gives them six out of seven championships for seven years' wrestling, a record which speaks for itself.

With three of last years' grapplers back—Hawkins, 145 lb.; Bolin, 125 lb., and Allworth, 165 lb.—everything pointed to a good year. Due to the failure of Watters to return to school Allworth was elected Captain. After many hard and interesting pre-season bouts the team was selected, including some new men in: Strome, 115 lb.; Watson, 135 lb., and Cramer, 135 lb.

The first battle was with the U. of O., the "Beavers" winning easily by taking all the matches except the 145 lb., which was declared a draw after a fierce tussle between Hawkins and Rutherford.

The next match, with the University of Washington, was close and hard fought. It was not decided until the last match, when Captain Allworth won over McAdams of Washington by two close decisions.

On March 9th the "Beavers" journeyed to W. S. C. for the last meet of the season. Here, by taking four out of five matches, they annexed the Conference Championship. Allworth, 165; Bolin, 125; and Hawkins, 145 lbs.; also won individual Conference Championships in their respective weights.

Too much credit cannot be given Coach "Jim" Arbuthnot. During his stay at O. A. C. he has won six out of seven Conference Wrestling Championships, which is a wonderful record. Losing only two men this year and with a bunch of available material on hand Coach "Jim" should have no trouble in annexing another championship next year.

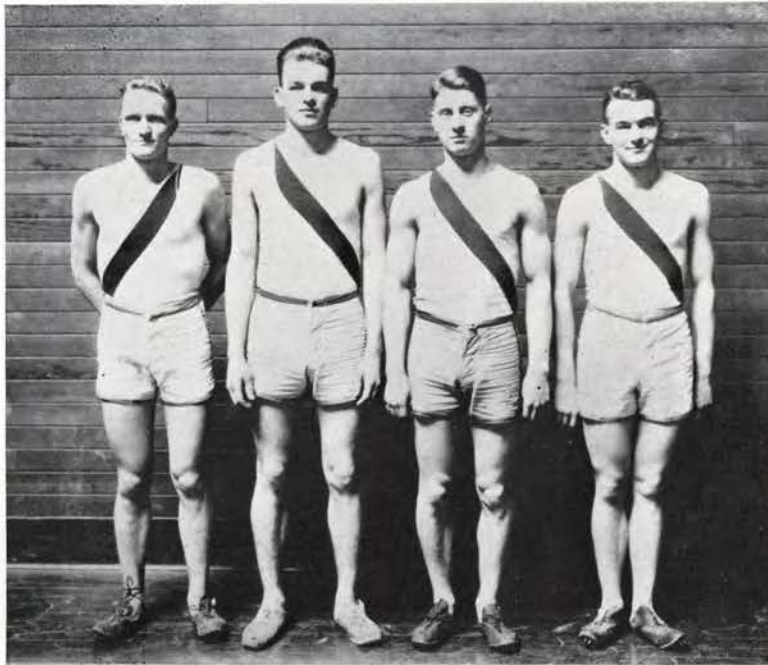

The prospects for next year are very promising as only a few of the old men will not be back, and there are quite a number of men who have played in the High School Leagues.

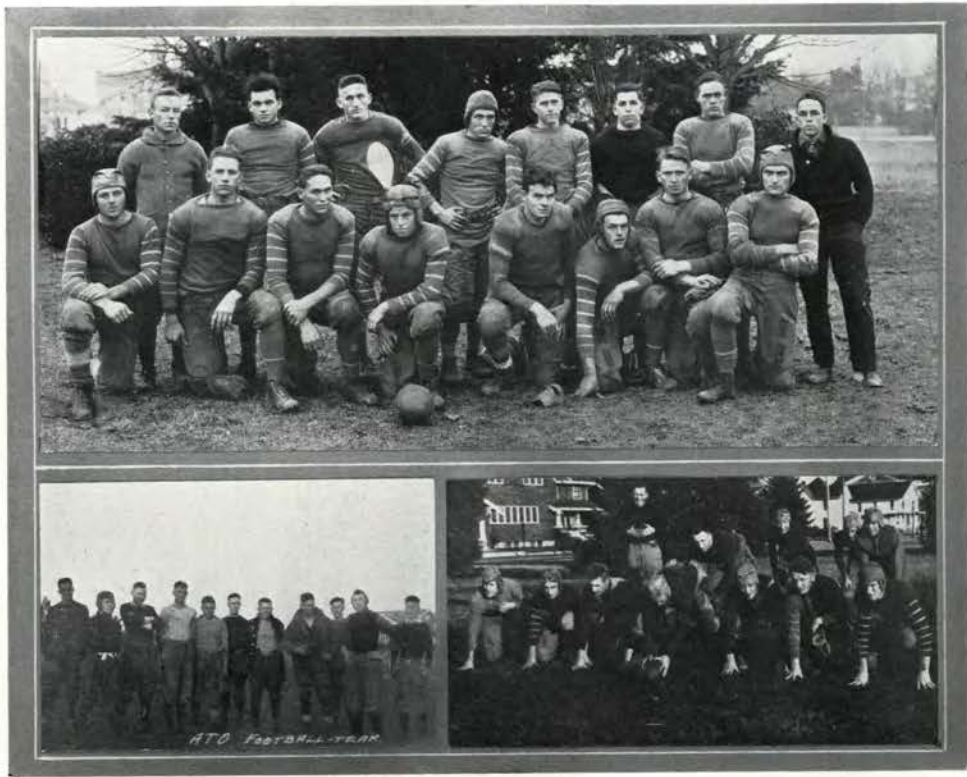
Probably there is no one man to whom more credit can be given for starting this new sport at O. A. C. than the Captain, Neal Ford.

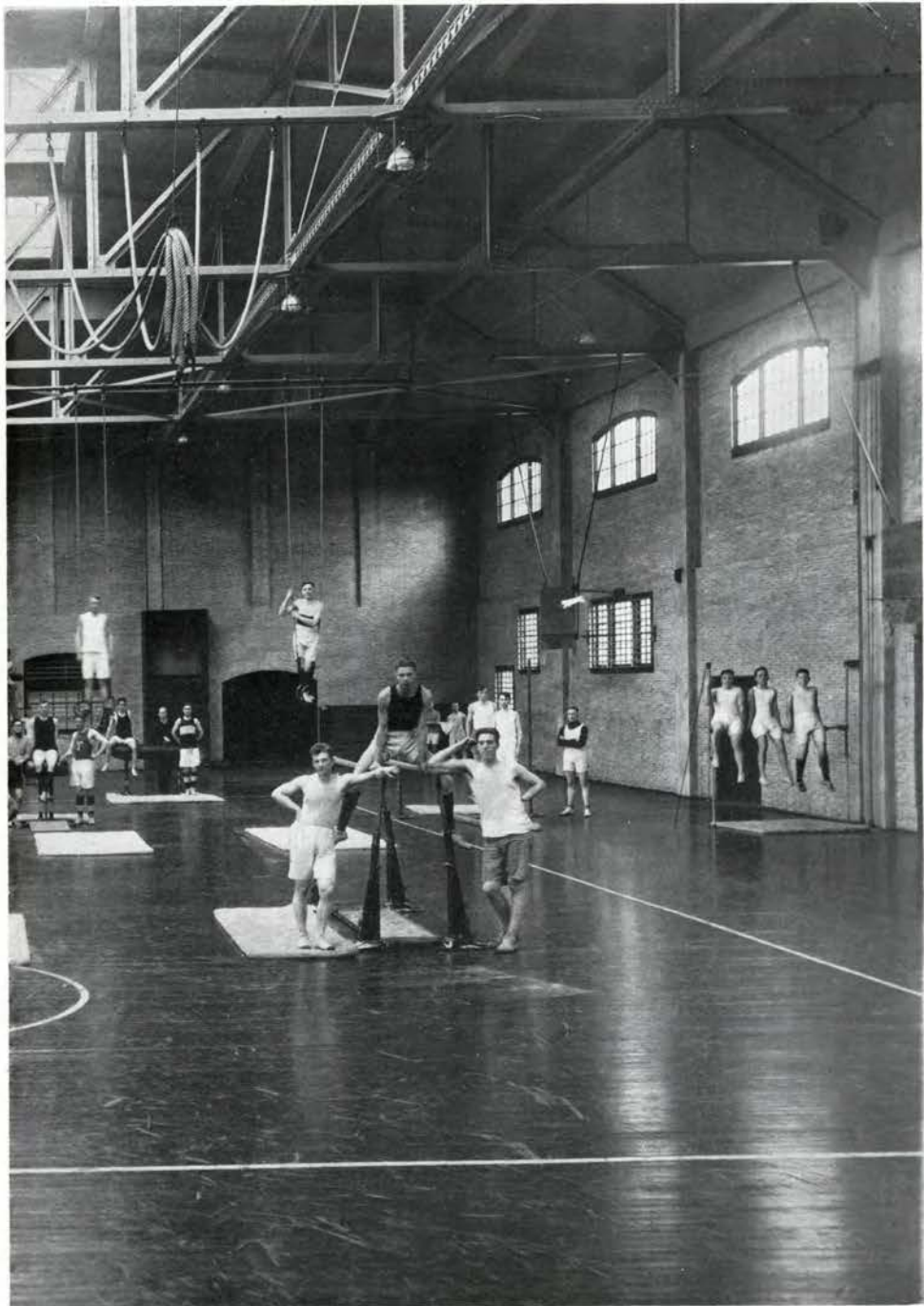

With this last speech the sister at the altar tightened her belt and the meeting came to an end.

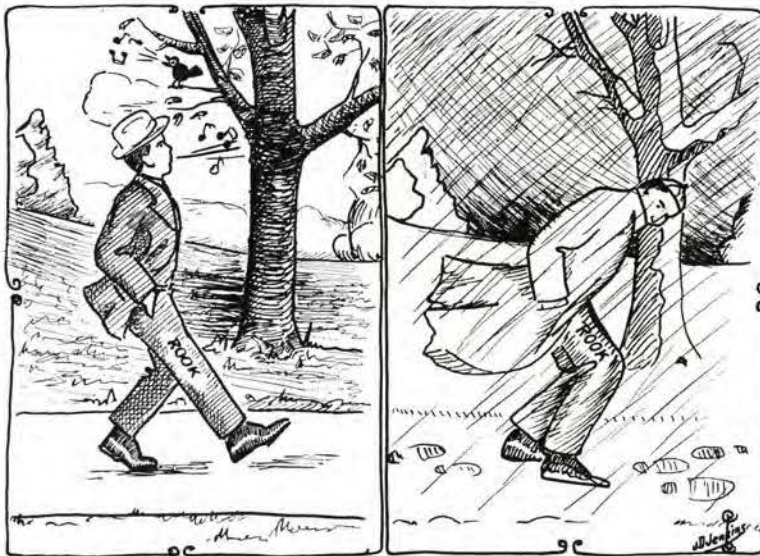

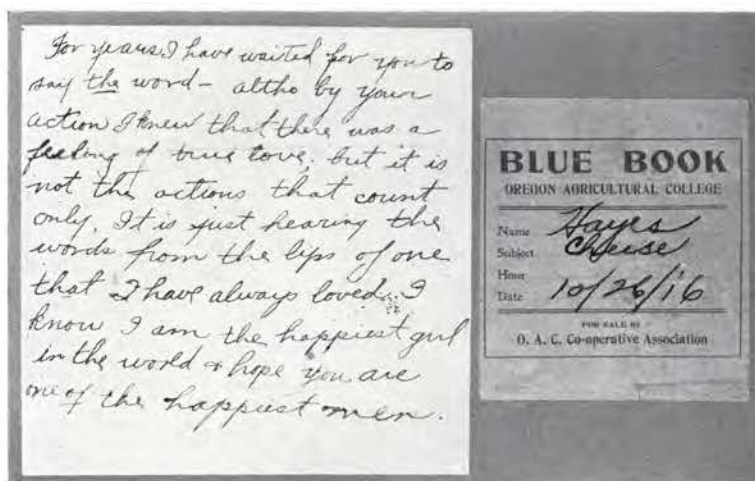

September 27th.*

Students taking a regular degree course are required to enter at the beginning of the session.

REQUIREMENTS FOR ADMISSION

To the Course in Dentistry—High school graduation or equivalent, fifteen units.

To the Course in Pharmacy—The *Two-year Course* for druggists and drug clerks leading to the degree of graduate in Pharmacy (Ph.G.) two years of high school training or equivalent, eight units.

The *Three-year Course* for physicians' assistants and manufacturing chemists leading to the degree of Pharmaceutical Chemist (Ph. C.)—High school graduation or equivalent, fifteen units.

Physicians' Assistant Course—The first two years are identical with the two-year course in pharmacy, which establishes a broad and thorough foundation for the special work of the third year. The third year is devoted to advanced subjects not given in the two-year course and designed to qualify the student to do efficient laboratory work for the physician, such as microscopical examinations



of sputum, pus, pathological tissues, chemical analyses of urine, stomach contents, physiological secretions, and bacteriological tests and preparations like autogenous vaccines, bacterial suspensions, Widal and Wasserman tests, and radiography.
