

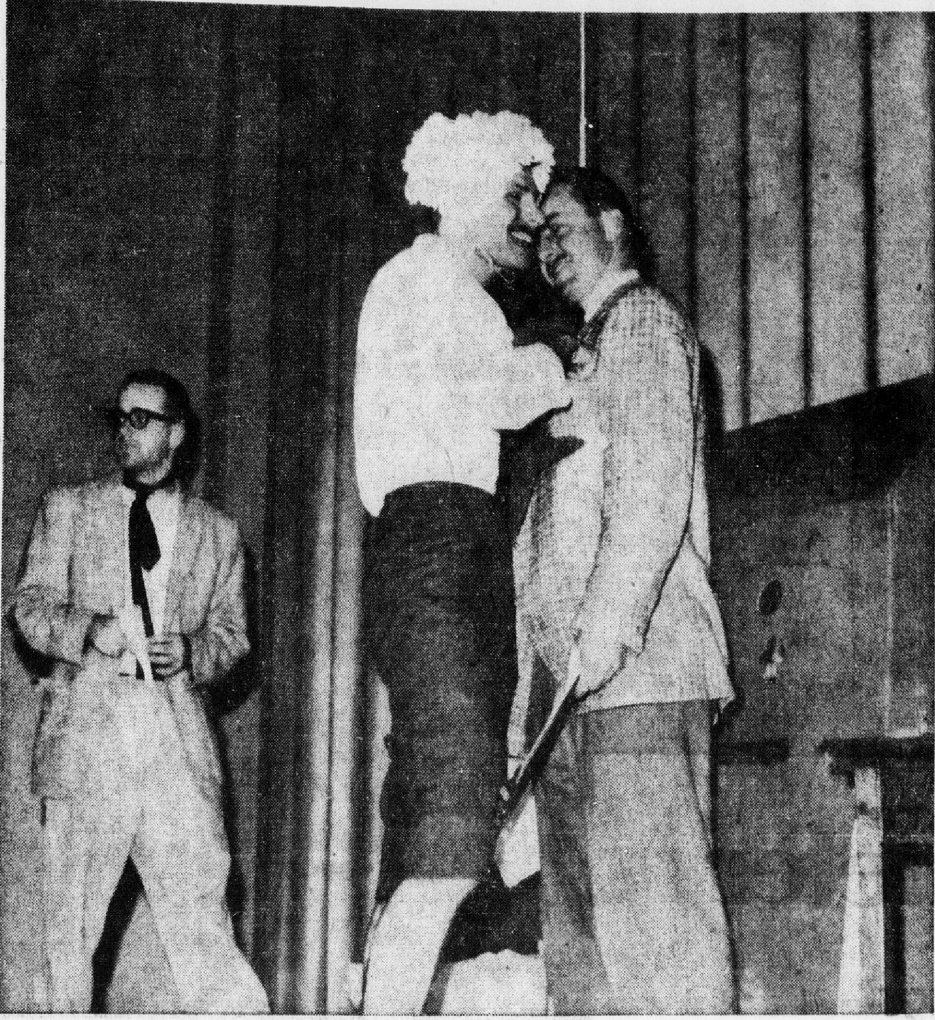

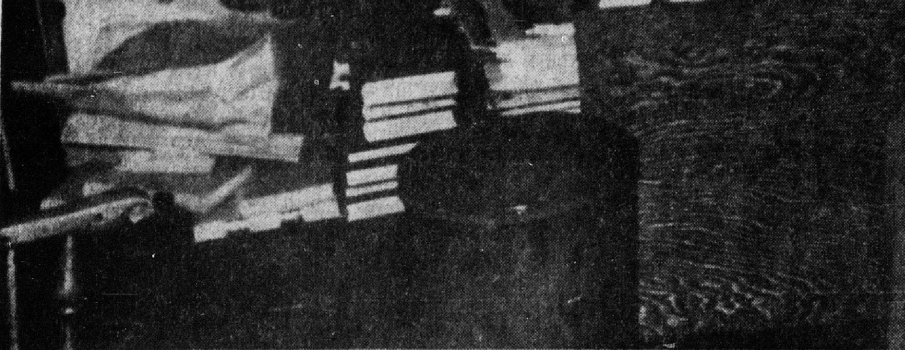
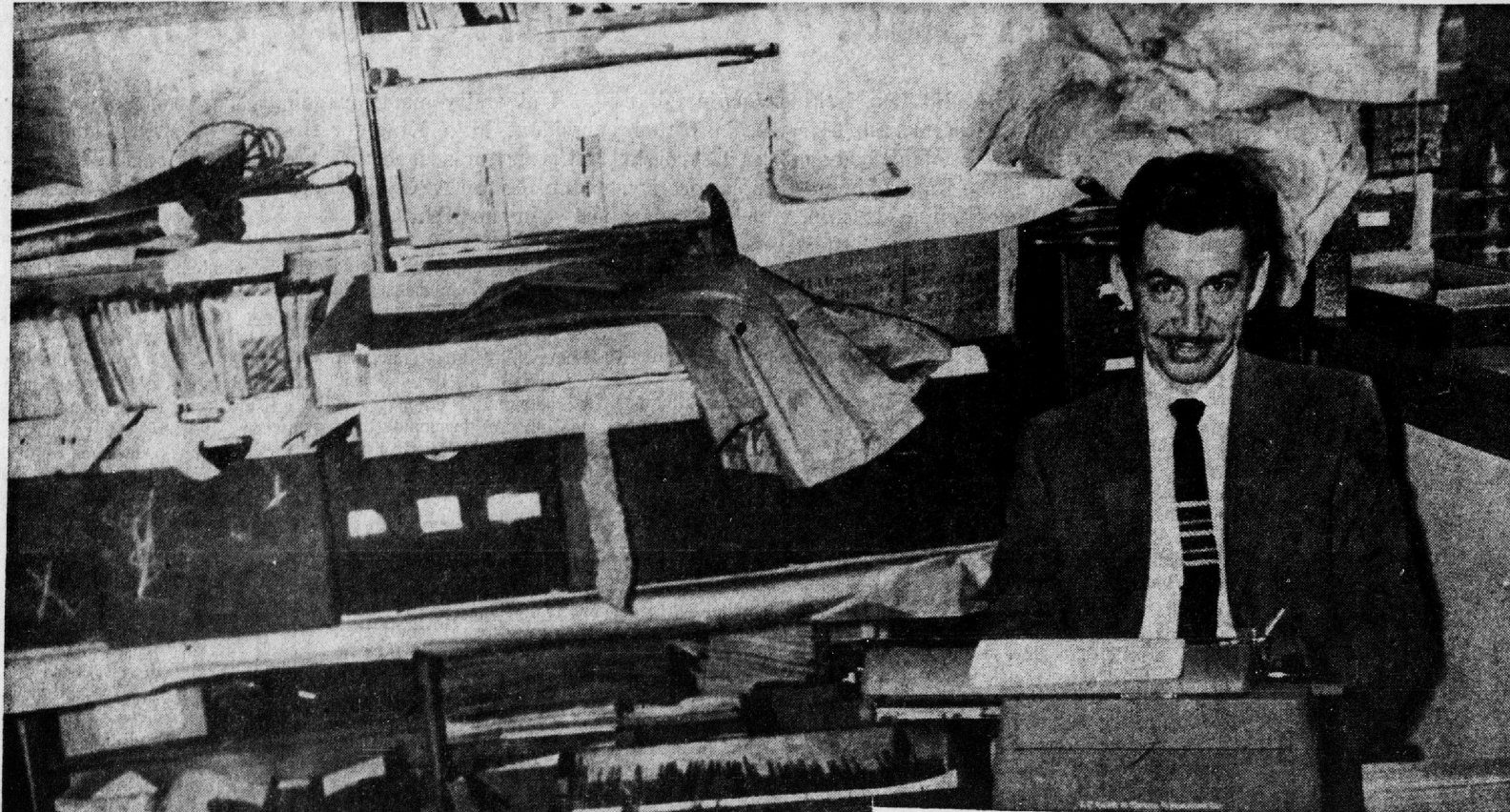

# The Library Which Cannot Be Forgotten

### Weakness of Wings

The current legislative thought about a new library building for Oregon State University is that there be no such new building, only an additional wing to the existing structure.

The state board members, Chancellor John R. Richards, Dr. A. L. Strand and other university officials including director of the library William H. Carlson all agree that addition of a new wing would be a mistake.

"Had the addition of a wing been desirable, we would have done that ten years ago," Strand said this week.

While a new wing would increase floor space and storage area, it would not alleviate chronic high temperatures and low humidity which damage many valuable books and documents stored in the old structure. It would not eliminate insects which literally eat pages and bindings. It would not eliminate seepage of drain water through walls causing mildew.

Students, too, recognize the critical problem. Their comments about the library, heart of any campus, run this way:

"The circulation desk should not be in a busy hallway — when there is a crowd, it is difficult to get through."

"Different elevations in rooms is confusing."

"Reserve Book Room and Circulation desk should be closer together. . . need more space for a college this size."

"The engineering layout is atrocious."

One student summed it up, when he wrote last year: "We obviously need a

library designed to serve students of 1960."

Dr. Strand said the board would disapprove of any legislative appropriation which would discard plans for a new library in favor of adding a wing to the existing one. OSU's present library was sufficient to serve students when it was built — in 1918.

"The board would have to be coerced into such a program," Strand said of adding a wing.

He said the board would just hold any appropriation for a new wing until the next legislative session met.

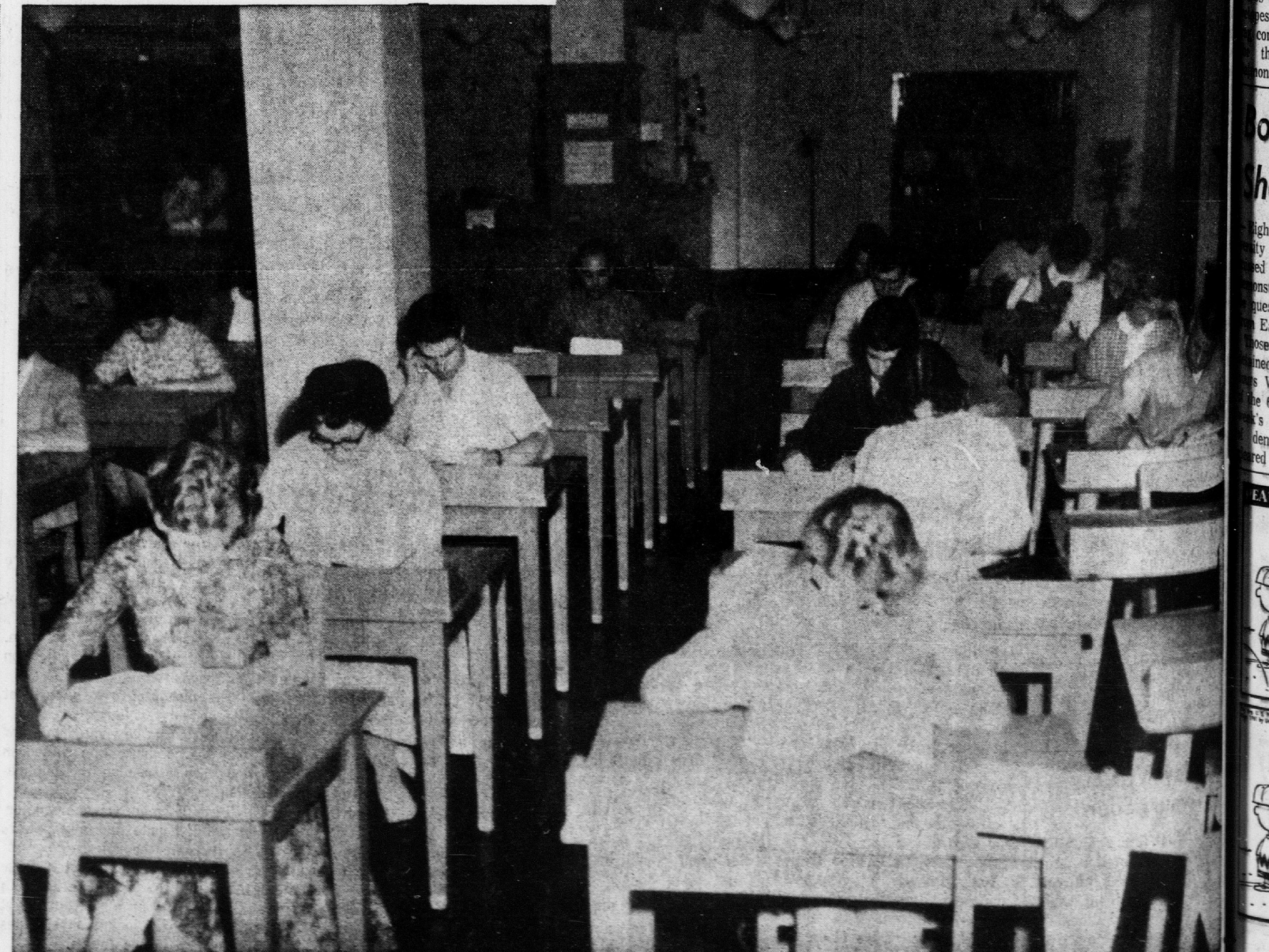
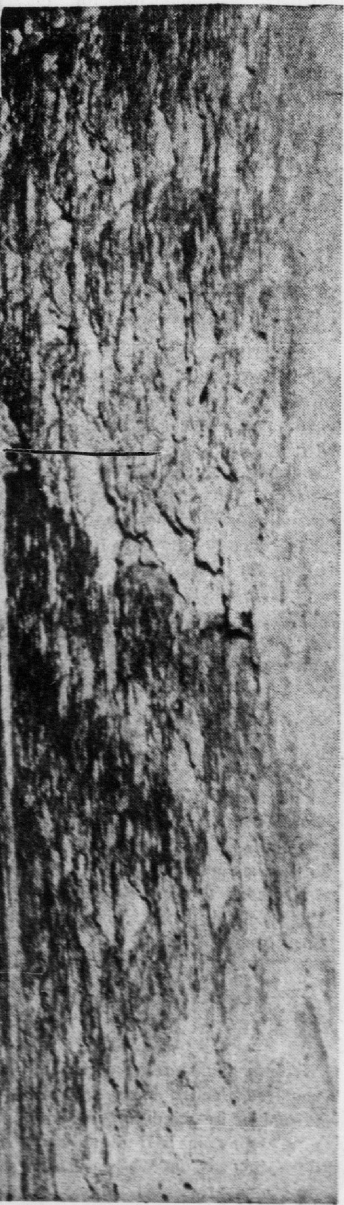
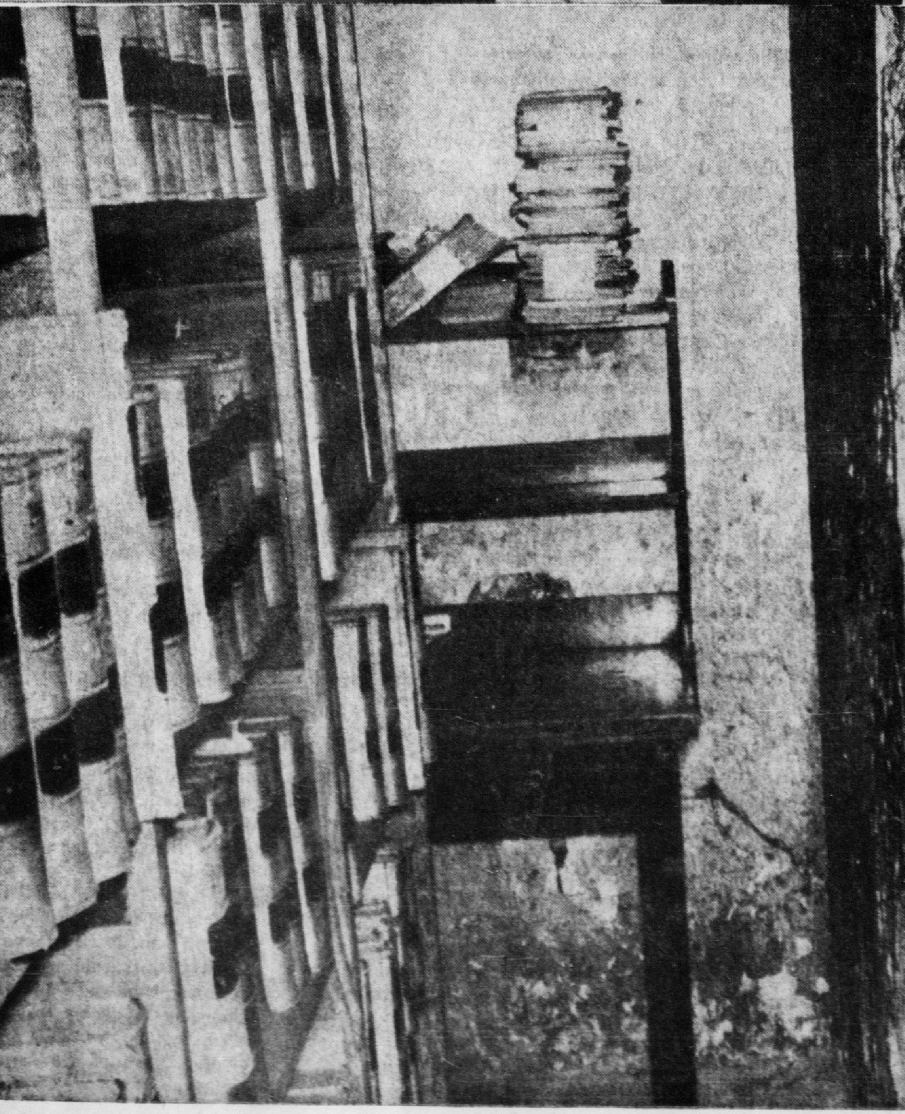
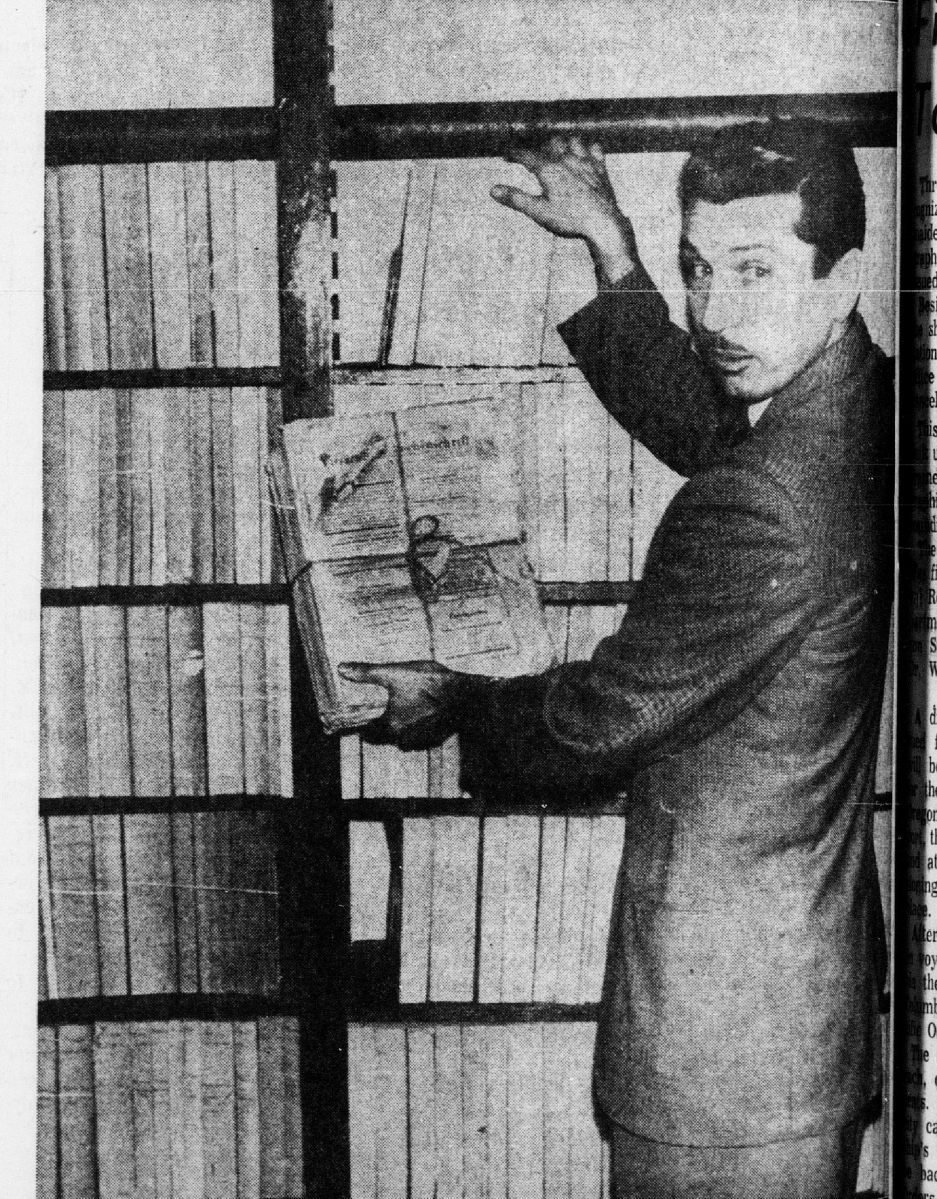
William H. Carlson explains why the library can't be efficiently expanded with a new wing or with remodeling.

"The old building is a wooden frame, brick-veneer structure. It is highly combustible. Books housed in it, valued at more than \$1.5 million, are in continuing danger of loss through fire," Carlson explains.

"... the old building is obsolete. It bears about the same relationship to the modern library building as the airplane of 1918 does to the modern streamlined airplane," he says.

"To modernize the total building, extensive alteration of the 1918 structure would be required. In earlier planning for a second wing, it was estimated that about half the total expenditure would be required for remodeling without providing substantial new space," Carlson concludes.

A patched and inefficient library cannot serve Oregon State University.



## OSU Baseballers Club Pacific, 21-2

Coach Ralph Coleman's Oregon State baseballers notched their first victory of the young 1961 season yesterday as Bill Oerding and Leon Criner combine pitching talents to record a two-hit, 21-2, romp over Pacific University.

The Beavers unleashed a 21 hit attack on three Pacific hurlers and bottled completely around in three different innings. Four doubles and two triples were included in the OSU barrage.

Centerfielder Crimm Mason topped the Beaver batsmen with a four-for-four plate performance. Mason collected a triple, three singles and two bases on balls in six trips. Shortstop Gene Hilliard contributed a double, triple and single to the Beaver cause in six at-bats.

OSU dented the scoring column for the first time in the fourth inning when eleven men trekked to the plate. Mason started it all with an infield single, and then after Larry Peterson had drawn a walk Gary Baker singled Mason home. Singles by Bill Wagner and Dave Hayward plus a Pacific error allowed five runs to cross the plate before the Beavers were retired.

In the next inning Oregon State unloaded some deadly extra-base power to tally five more times. The big blows were triples by Hilliard and Mason and doubles off the bats of Brian Bailey and Wagner.

Pacific never mustered a serious threat. The Badgers scored single runs in each the fifth and seventh innings. Two errors and an infield grounder accounted for the first Pacific score while a walk, a single and a fielder's choice was good for the visitor's second tally.

Oerding went seven innings for Coleman's "nine" and was credited with the victory. Both Pacific hits and both runs were recorded off the left hander's slants. Oerding walked only one man (the eventually scored) and struck out eight.

Criner came on in the eighth frame to retire six Badgers in a row to end the contest. He looked impressive in the brief stint, striking out three.

Pacific's first hurler, Rich Downs, was charged with the loss, but after his departure in the fourth the Beavers were not held scoreless for any inning. Wildness kept Downs in trouble as he passed six Beavers in three and one third innings.

The three Badger pitchers, Downs, Norm Weis and Tom Beenick, also violated one of the cardinal rules of baseball by walking Oerding three times.

In fact the two Beaver pitchers were not retired during the entire game. Oerding was one-for-one with a single in addition to the three walks. Criner went two-for-two with a pair of eighth inning singles.

Every member of the starting Beaver lineup collected at least one base hit, and John Whitelaw was the only one of Coleman's five substitutions who did not get into the hit column.

## OSU Crew Tops UCLA Oarsmen

In a repeat performance of their sweep over USC and Long Beach crews on Thursday, the Oregon State University varsity and freshman crews defeated the UCLA and San Diego State oarsmen last Saturday. The Beaver varsity finished a length ahead of the second place Uclan crew, and the Beaver Rooks finished easily four lengths ahead of second place San Diego.

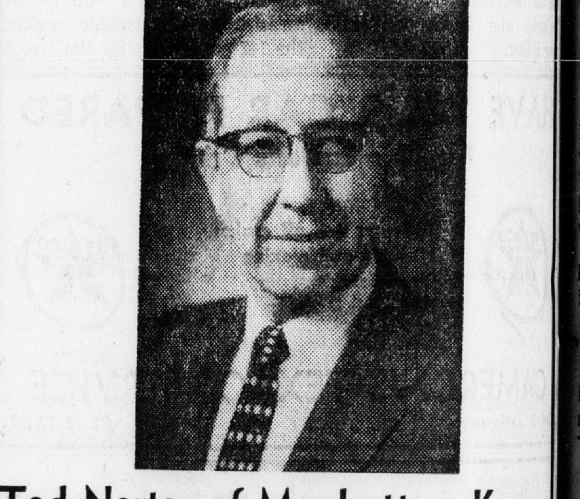
