

Tax by Numbers

The following editorial is reprinted curity numbers may serve for those who from a recent issue of the Livestock Reporter, East St. Louis, III.

Come each new year, most of us sweat and moan, and eventually file an income tax return. Chances are most of us are reasonably honest, but even that doesn't necessarily mean that the return is correct. There are plenty of chances for error.

In the past, the government's spot checks included only a small fraction of tax-paying citizens, but Uncle Sam is about to inaugurate a system that will make the checking-up a mite easier, and the out-and-out cheat had best look carefully to his figuring. Under the terms of a new law, each taxpayer, starting in 1962, will be assigned an identification number and required to use it in filing income tax returns. Social se- however!

are under that law, but numbers will also be assigned to those who don't come under the social security law.

The new system will depend on a comparison basis, and will enable tax agents to cross-check for accuracy on a much broader scale. The law provides for a \$5 penalty tax on a taxpayer each time he fails to attach his number to his tax return, refuses to give the number to employer, broker or anyone else who is required to file reports about his income with the Internal Revenue Bur-
