

Dr. Peter Anton Criticizes, Challenges Student Government

In a speech that criticized and challenged student government at Oregon State University, Dr. Peter Anton, a member of faculty senate, told the ASOSU senate it had better investigate its motives behind legislation presented to the faculty senate.

"Student senate has no official access to the levers of power in the university," said Anton. "It can resolve, but it cannot legislate."

To get anything done, Anton continued, the student senate must have both the approval of the administration and the faculty senate.

Anton said some of the proposals presented by ASOSU senate were "born losers. They shouldn't have been made. They were defeated because they were dead wrong."

Anton made five distinct recommendations to the student senate:

- First, decide what you want and why you want it.
- Make a realistic appraisal of your prospects of getting it.
- Revise your measure in the light of reality.
- Keep everything controversial out of the Barometer until you know what you want.
- And, finally, don't avoid small issues.

The influence of the student senate in the university depends in a very critical way on your full realization of what you are, what you can hope to achieve, and proper ways to make your considered views felt," Anton said.

"Now let's come down to cases," Anton told the senators. "You have, this year, exhibited a lamentable tendency to go off at half-cock.

"You seem to suppose that what you passionately want must be right and you have tried to stuff measures embodying what you want down the throats of the reluctant dinosaurs who inhabit the windy cave of faculty senate.

"This is just plain foolish, for it will not work. The proposals you have seen go down to overwhelming defeat in the faculty senate were born losers, and you ought to have known it."

Anton then questioned the senate, asking, "Does the fact that they were born losers mean that they ought not to have been made? That is precisely what it means.

"There is no victory for principle in these defeats; no advantage to students or to anybody else in putting them forward only to have them shot down. The plain fact is that your proposals were defeated because they were dead wrong; you do not enhance your role by playing it badly."

Anton said the senate-proposed course review "not for the enlightenment of students, but for the improvement of teachers," which he called presumptuous.

"And you proposed to make such review obligatory, and indeed to make faculty members help you do it, which is coercive. It is the height of folly for those who cannot coerce to attempt to do so, and it would be amusing if you were not so serious about it," said Anton.

Anton's conversation then shifted to the student senate proposal to place the student president as an ex-officio member of faculty senate. The move was rejected by faculty senate at its last meeting.

The OSU professor said he believed the student president should be allowed to attend the meetings but that the motives of the ASOSU senate were again confused.

Anton said arrangement had been made for the student president to attend faculty senate meetings under a standing invitation from the senate and that arrangements should be made for the president to receive position papers.

He then said student senate wanted a good deal more than reasonable.

"You want your president to attend the meeting of this faculty senate as a matter of right, not merely of privilege. This again is presumptuous and coercive. Had you debated this matter openly in your own senate — and I am quite confident that you never mentioned it — you would have been clear as to the nature of your motives."

Anton said the student senate was not clear.

He then moved to the issue of Pass-Fail grading, being considered by the student senate. "I have, myself, no objection to giving such a grading system a trial here," he said.

"But when I first got wind of this," added Anton, "I gathered from what I heard that you were doing it again; you intended to force the faculty nilly-willy to adopt this system."

Anton said he thought it was a mistake for the student senate to confine itself to the big issues to the exclusion of the small ones.

"Moreover, for those who enjoy baiting dinosaurs, and what student does not, small issues are often as effective as large ones."

"And since success feeds on success, small issues, successfully prosecuted, can do much to enhance your influence."

Anton then recommended some legislation that student senate should consider:

- Anton said attendance at lectures should not be considered in arriving at a student's final grade.
- "What ought to be required of the student is that he know the subject matter of the course, as evidenced by his performance on the prescribed examinations," Anton said.
- "A student who does not, in his view, profit from the lectures of a given course is wasting his time by going to them."
- "Moreover, to require student to attend lectures is to treat him as a juvenile; it is not in keeping with academic dignity, either for students or faculty members. A clear statement of policy to this effect would be useful," Anton suggested.
- Anton said a student who has a passing grade in a course should be permitted to drop the course at any time, as a matter of right.
- "Students who now withdraw during the period prior to the 'last day for dropping' do so of right and therefore ought not to be put to the trouble of getting the instructor's signature on the drop form."
- Students, according to Anton, should be permitted to satisfy the requirement of the obligatory health course by examination over the subject matter of the text used in that course.
- Anton ended his talk by saying the "Beaver Creed" was an affront to the university and ought to be abolished.

Candidate Quiz Slated By Senate

The ASOSU senate voted Tuesday night to hold a special senate meeting next Tuesday at 7 p.m. to interview candidates running for office. The meeting will be closed to the public but the proceedings will be summarized in the Barometer.

This resolution, proposed by 13 senators, was the last item of business on an agenda which included Pass-Fail grading, constitutional amendments, university chaperones, membership in the Pacific Student Body Presidents Association (P.S.B.A.), and language requirements for PhD degrees.

The resolution concerning language requirements for PhD degrees was introduced by Ken Fowle and Gary Heesacker. The proposal asks the ASOSU senate to recommend that the Graduate Council delete general language requirements for the PhD degrees and instead allow the separate departments conducting PhD programs, to specify what foreign language proficiency, if any, should be required.

The proposal maintains that most people with PhD's do not use another language often enough to warrant its requirement. Also, that language requirements differ greatly in different departments. Fowle passed out question forms to the senators and asked them to give the forms to their favorite instructors in PhD programs. He said this would give the senate an idea of how the instructors feel about the proposal.

Many graduate students attended the senate meeting to hear the bill and left after it was presented. The proposal was tabled until the next senate meeting.

In other new business, Ozegin introduced a proposal to investigate fund raising projects on campus. He said he felt that the students should benefit from these funds raised; not just the organizations involved.

One senator said he was unaware that there was a problem and asked Ozegin if there were specific examples. Ozegin said one example would be honoraries such as those who put out the Fusser's Guide. He said money derived from this was not being used for the whole student body.

There were several objections to this example by people involved in working on the Fusser's Guide. One senator pointed out that the benefit of the resolution would be in investigating the distribution of funds raised in campus fund drives. This proposal was also automatically tabled and will be voted on later.

A proposal introduced at the last senate meeting, was to eliminate the chaperone requirement for social functions on campus was passed by a 16 to 1 vote.

The Pass-Fail proposal was discussed. Senator Jim Huegli moved that an amendment be made stating that instructors may inform the Registrar's office if they do not wish their classes to be graded on a pass-fail basis. The amendment passed and the main bill was tabled until the next meeting.

Ozegin introduced a proposal to withdraw Oregon State University as members of the P.S.-P.A. He said from his experience in attending the yearly conferences, we were not benefiting from membership. He added that the conferences have been held in California for six years and transportation is expensive. If the senate is not in favor of joining another student organization, Ozegin is in favor of forming a student organization in Oregon.

There was little discussion on this last proposal. It was automatically tabled until the next regular senate meeting to be held Wednesday, May 3.

Candidates Face Budget Question

EDITOR'S NOTE: This is the third of three articles on candidates interviewed by the Barometer editorial board Sunday night. Today's article is based on similar questions aimed at candidates for Memorial Union president. One question asked was "What is the MU budget?" The tentative 1967-68 budget is \$10,790.

Friday's primary ballot will include the names of three candidates for the office of Memorial Union president. They are Jan Blakely, Rod Ninomiya, and Dave Smith.

Blakely was interviewed first and was asked what the budget is.

"I think it was something around \$2,000-\$3,000. I think I'm not sure. I haven't discussed that for quite awhile.

"I think that most of the money would probably go towards the Forum," he continued.

Blakely's conversation shifted towards his feelings about improving the Memorial Union.

"Dances have always been this year quite a success. There's nothing much we can do as far as expanding the MU."

Blakely said he would like to develop television programming during the next year he would be elected.

He said the programming would aid events such as convocations.

Ninomiya, the next candidate to be interviewed, said the 1967-68 budget is about \$10,200.

"I would like to see more spent on tours," said Ninomiya. He added that a major increase should be given to Forums.

He said dances were "pretty much saturated as far as what you could do" and "what have been done."

"Hospitality was way over their budget this year," he said. Ninomiya said he wanted to cut most of them out for next year. He added the MU would welcome groups interested in sponsoring their own events like coffee hours.

He said one of the projects he would push is the MU Craft Center.

Dave Smith, who met the board last, said he wasn't sure what the 1967-68 budget was but said that this year it was "\$10,700 and some."

Smith said the MU tended to spend too much money on one level of the program and added that more should go to the Forum Committee.

He also said the hospitality budget should be cut because many of the events were not student-oriented.

"We're only given approximately \$1 a year per student and asked to sponsor a Memorial Union program at the student level on that budget. It seems inadequate."

Two Appearances Set By Candidates

ASOSU presidential candidates will make two official appearances on the Oregon State University campus today.

The three — Jeff Heimbuck, Kjell Krane, and Paul Schaber — will first appear for a question-answer period at 3 p.m. in the commons.

Later the three, along with the candidates for ASOSU first vice president and Memorial Union president, will make television appearances over Channel 5 at 5 p.m. The MU Television Programming Committee is sponsoring the television appearance.

Elections will be held for these and other offices tomorrow. Polls will be located on various parts of the campus.

Faculty Senate in itself is rather restrictive as it does not allow instructors or other classified employees to serve on the senate unless they have served two years.

Sigma Xi Sets Nature Lecture

Dr. Paul B. Sears, professor emeritus of conservation, Yale University, will speak tonight at 7:30 in Withycombe Hall auditorium. He is a national lecturer for Sigma Xi, research honorary.

His lecture on "Beyond the Forest" is open to the public. The special meeting was arranged by the OSU chapter of Sigma Xi to fit into a Western lecture series by Dr. Sears. He lectured last week at leading California universities.

Dr. Sears is the author of scores of publications. The best known of his books is "Deserts on the March," a discussion of the impact of modern culture on the North American landscape.

His research has centered around the history of vegetation, climate, and human activity in the United States and Mexico. His studies in the Great Lakes Basin were among the first to demonstrate the post-glacial sequence in the northeastern United States.

Sears is a past president of the American Association for the Advancement of Science, the American Society of Naturalists, the Ecological Society of America, and is a former board member of the National Science Foundation.

His Thursday night lecture here will cover the nature, causes and distribution of grassland, scrub and desert, and their role in human evolution and culture.

Owner Pays For 5 Sheep

The owner of a dog that killed five sheep in a research flock at Oregon State University had to pay \$30 a head to compensate for the damage, A. W. Oliver, associate professor of animal husbandry and a member of the county dog control board said Wednesday.

A lesser amount was paid for two sheep that were injured by the dog, Oliver said. The incident occurred in the Witham Hill area.

The owner of the dog was identified as Thomas J. Stoner, 4470 Alpha Place.

The dog was observed in the flock. Under the law the owner of the dog is held responsible, and must pay damages when the dog kills livestock, Oliver said.

While the OSU research project sustained some damage through loss of the sheep, it was not seriously hurt, Oliver added.

The bus drivers will be waiting for their passengers outside the Home Ec auditorium. They will be leaving periodically from the park back to campus for the convenience of the students.

Printed tickets will be handed out two weeks in advance. Spouse tickets will be available.

Navy Drill Team Triumphs

Clay's Lawyer Files New Papers At Court

WASHINGTON (AP) — Attorneys for heavyweight boxing champion Cassius Clay filed new papers with the Supreme Court today in an attempt to block his scheduled April 28 induction into the Army at Houston.

There has been no change in the G.I. Bill. The method for calculating benefits is different for summer term, however, than for the other terms. The method in summer is based on classroom hours per week, rather than on credit hours.

They suggested that federal courts were motivated by "political and practical considerations" in refusing to hear Clay's challenge to the Selective Service System. "Policy and practical considerations are not justification for denial of a citizen's constitutional rights," the attorneys lectured the court.

To receive full benefits, the undergraduate must be enrolled for at least 14 classroom hours per week (12 in the case of the graduate student). Classroom hours are determined by whatever combination of 2, 3, and 11-week courses the student is taking week by week. Benefits therefore may well vary as one starts and completes courses of different length.

On Monday the court refused to block Clay's induction and refused to direct the convening of a special three-judge federal panel to consider the champion's claim that the Selective Service System discriminates against Negroes. Later that day the U.S. Circuit Court in Cincinnati refused to stay a lower court decision ordering Clay to report for induction.

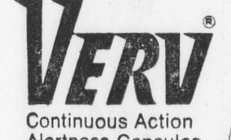

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Pharmacy Talk Set For OSU

Clifton J. Latiolais, Ohio State University associate professor of pharmacy and university hospitals director of pharmacy, will speak at Oregon State April 24-5.

Lectures concerning aspects of hospital pharmacy will be April 24 at 2 p.m. in Pharmacy 235 for faculty and graduate students; April 25 at 11 a.m. in Pharmacy 305 for undergraduates; and April 25 at 8 p.m. in Pharmacy 305 for the Oregon Society of Hospital Pharmacists.

Topics for the lectures include "The Hospital's Potential in Pharmaceutical Education," "Selection of Drugs for the Formulary," and "Establishing a Parenteral Additive Service."

Food Tech Flavorium Includes 'Taste' Panels

Three times weekly 150-180 Oregon State University students participate in food evaluation tests in the Food Technology Flavorium to help determine flavor preferences of the household consumer.

Test panels, under the direction of Mrs. Lois A. Sather, associate professor, are composed of OSU students who signed up the beginning of Spring Term.

The testers are seated in one of six isolated testing booths equipped with color control lights, sink, counter, and sliding door through which a tray containing the food samples is passed.

The tray has from two to six samples which the tester or judge rates on a IBM card according to degree of like or dislike of the sample.

Wages consist of 35 cents per test, which takes about five minutes, and coffee and punch plus a candy bar or cookies are added bonuses.

Members of the test panels are not preselected or trained but have been hired on a first come, first served basis. The results of student evaluation have a close correlation to those of household consumer panels where homemakers judge the food samples.

First on the list for the judges this term was survival wafers. These are tested for the government for their acceptance as emergency rations to be used in fallout shelters.

Determining the shelf life, or length of time a food can be stored and still retain its desirable qualities, is one of the prime goals of the staff headed by Mrs. Sather, and OSU graduate who has worked in the Food

It's a banner season for spring sports at Oregon State—at least, as of now — and three Beaver

depth-laden track squad that has won four dual meets and a triangular victory prior to a tough dual test coming up Saturday at Seattle against Washington.

The Beaver cindermen bombed Washington State, 104-41, last weekend after earlier polishing off Pacific Athletic Conference opponents California and Stanford. OSU also has whipped Idaho in dual competition and Nevada and Fresno State in the three-way affair.

Don Megale's tennis squad nailed down its second successive Pacific Northwest collegiate championship over the weekend, trouncing Washington, 8-0, and Seattle Pacific, 8-1. The Beaver netters have won 10 straight matches and other victims include Los Altos Tennis Club, College of San Mateo, San Francisco U, Foothills JC, California, Oregon, Willamette and Seattle U.

In golf, Ed Larson's plucky squad overcame a huge first-day deficit at the northern division tournament in Seattle to take over the lead after two days of play. OSU leads with 919 strokes, followed by Washington at 923 and Oregon with 924. WSU has 969. The 72-hole event winds up next weekend with one round at Eugene Friday and another at Corvallis Saturday. OSU is the defending champion, undefeated so far.

Gene Tansell's baseball squad doesn't enjoy unbeaten status, but the Beavers actually turned in a fine performance in the Bay area over the week-

end and for the entire season now stand at 11-10. OSU lost close 2-1 and 5-1 games against Stanford, the nation's No. 2 ranked team, and split a series with California. Washington State and Washington both play here this weekend in PAC action.

As coaches say, fine records can blow up in a hurry, but Beaver spring sports teams at least are off to a great start.

An Open Letter from Husnu Ozyegin, ASOSU President
