SAE Sets 20th Baseball Banquet *Valenti's Beaver Cagers* Slate 30-Game Trip South

OSU's outstanding baseball player of 1967 will be awarded the Victor D. Brown Trophy this Thursday evening at Sigma Alpha Epsilon fraternity. The presentation of the award will conclude the regular base-

ball season for coach Gene Tanselli's Beavers and mark the twentieth anniversary of the Brown Trophy Dinner. Another award to be given Thursday is the Bill Cloyes award 1967 for outstanding

pitcher. Coach Tanselli will also announce the team captain for 1968. The Brown Trophy, given in honor of Victor D. Brown, Jr., is awarded to the baseball player who contributed the most in inspiration, leadership, and sportsmanship to the baseball team. The recipient of the award is selected by the members of the varsity baseball team and coach Tanselli, himself the 1950 trophy winner.

Victor Brown was a former OSU baseball player, who played under Ralph Coleman in 1941-42-43. He was also a member of the Oregon Alpha chapter of Sigma Alpha Epsilon. During World War II, Brown was killed in action in Europe. The SAE's aided by Virgil

Cavagnaro, a house alumnus, initiated the idea of a memorial trophy honoring Brown and presented the first trophy to Don Bower, Beaver second baseman, in 1947. In each of the twenty years since, the award has been given at the conclusion of the baseball season.

Recent trophy winners include: 1963, Al Lehrer; 1964, Steve Clark; 1965, Morrell Cray; and 1966, Ron Lucas. The winner receives a trophy and his name is also inscribed on a larger permanent trophy kept at the Sigma Alpha Epsilon residence. The permanent trophy is now on display in the Co-op book store show case. The Cloyes award is a wrist watch, presented by Bill Cloyes, a former OSU baseball player.

Selection of the outstanding pitcher is made by John Eggers, OSU athletic publicity director, and Jack Rickard, editor of the *Corvallis Gazette-Times*.

Since 1963, recipients of the Cloyes award have been: 1963, Cecil Ira; 1964, Steve Clark; 1965, Wayne Swango; and 1966, Jack Humphrey.

Gridders

Oregon State's football players are reminded of the summer organizational meeting this Friday, May 26 at 4 p.m. in room 119 of Gill Coliseum. Head coach Dee Andros has announced that all varsity players should be there.

Coach Paul Valenti said Monday that his traveling squad for the basketball trip to Australia, New Zealand and Tahiti in June will consist of seven sophomores-to-be, three juniors and one senior.

The Beavers will depart from San Francisco on June 15 and arrive in Brisbane, Australia on June 17, returning home on August 4. They will play approximately 30 games on the trip.

Bob Franz is the only senior making the trip. Loy Peterson, who will also be a senior next fall, was excused from the trip by Valenti in order that he might keep a summer job com-

mitment. The three juniors are Vince Fritz, Jeff Kuter and Mike Markham, and the sophomores include Vic Bartolome, Billy Nickleberry, Gary Freeman, Gary Carroll, Bruce Bertrand, Steve Brewer and Elliott Levin. All but Levin played on the strong 1967 Rook squad. Levin was held out of varsity competition last winter after playing on the freshman team the season before.

While in Australia, first leg of the trip, Oregon State will perform in such places as Brisbane, Toowoomba, Sydney, Wollongong, Newcastle, Canberra, Melbourne, Adelaide, Mildura, Swan Hill, Ballarat, Bendigo, Tasmania, Devonport, Launceston and Hobart.

In New Zealand, they will be in Christchurch, Dunedin, Wanganui, Lower Hutt, Hamilton, and Auckland, departing for Tahiti on July 31. After several games in Papeeti, Tahiti, they leave for Honolulu on August 4 and from there home to Portland.

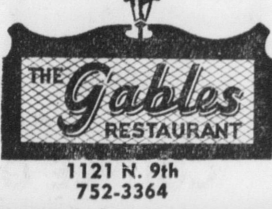
The overseas trip was approved by the NCAA and Pacific Athletic Conference, and the Beavers will be allowed 10 regular practice sessions before departing. Valenti sent his squad through its first workout Monday and said he would space the remaining drills until final examinations week.

Sponsoring the OSU trip is the Victorian Amateur Basketball Association of Australia, an basketball jaunt, other than to outfit that Oregon State met in Hawaii.

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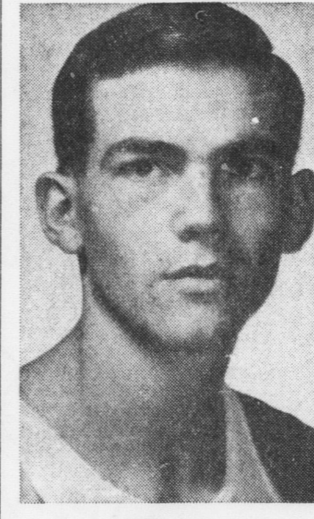
