## Forestry seminar brings director

Tom Tuchmann, director of U.S. Forestry and Economic Development, will present a seminar Tuesday from 4 p.m. to 5:30 p.m. in Peavy Hall room 130 (auditorium).

The seminar is entitled, "Forestry's New Era: Ecosystem Management and the Forest Plan."

Tuchmann is responsible for implementing President Clinton's forest plan with the seven federal departments accountable for both the forest management and economic assistance features of the plan.

Tuchmann served as special assistant to Secretary of Interior Bruce Babbitt. In this capacity he was a member of the White House

Executive Committee which organized President Clinton's Forest Conference and the ensuing planning effort.

In other capacities Tuchmann has served as professional staff member for the U.S. Senate Committee on Agriculture, Nutrition and Forestry. Tuchmann also served as a legislative assistant to the committee's chairman, Senator Patrick Leahy (D-VT) on environmental and appropriations issues as well as being a former director of resource policy for the Society of American Foresters.

Tuchmann holds a BS degree in forest management from Northern Arizona University and an MS degree in forest resources from Pennsylvania University.

## Minimum wage cap dies in House

Waiters and waitresses in the state of Oregon can breathe a little easier now that House Bill 2543 is dead.

Because of the outpouring of waiters and waitresses at last Monday's hearing, the House committee decided to kill the legislative bill which would have allowed restaurant owners to permanently cap the minimum wage for tipped employees at \$4.75 an hour and count tips as part of the minimum wage.

Jane Lesser, Oregon Student Lobby (OSL) legislative director, said prior to the hearing that the bill would likely pass unless opposition was demonstrated.

Rep. John Watt, R-Medford, chief of the House Labor Committee, said the issue will not be discussed again in the House, but doesn't know if the Oregon Restaurant Association (ORA), who proposed the bill, will modify the bill and try their chances with the Senate.

Due to the possibility of the ORA's success, many restaurant workers are concerned.

"We've been talking about it a lot," said Eva Andersen, a waitress at McGrath's Fish House in Corvallis.

Andersen, a graduate student in the Master of Arts in Teaching program at OSU, said many of her co-workers might try and find work elsewhere if the bill eventually succeeds.

"Certainly I would," Andersen said.

Andersen said she could work elsewhere, but doesn't plan to stay in the restaurant industry for that much longer because she wants to teach at the elementary school level when she graduates from OSU this summer.

"For me it helps me get through school."

Aaron Cross, student body president at Portland State University and a waiter, feels the same as Andersen.

In a prepared press release by the OSL, Cross said that many students work during school and in the summer as food servers, bartenders, and bussing staff, to pay for tuition, books and living expenses.

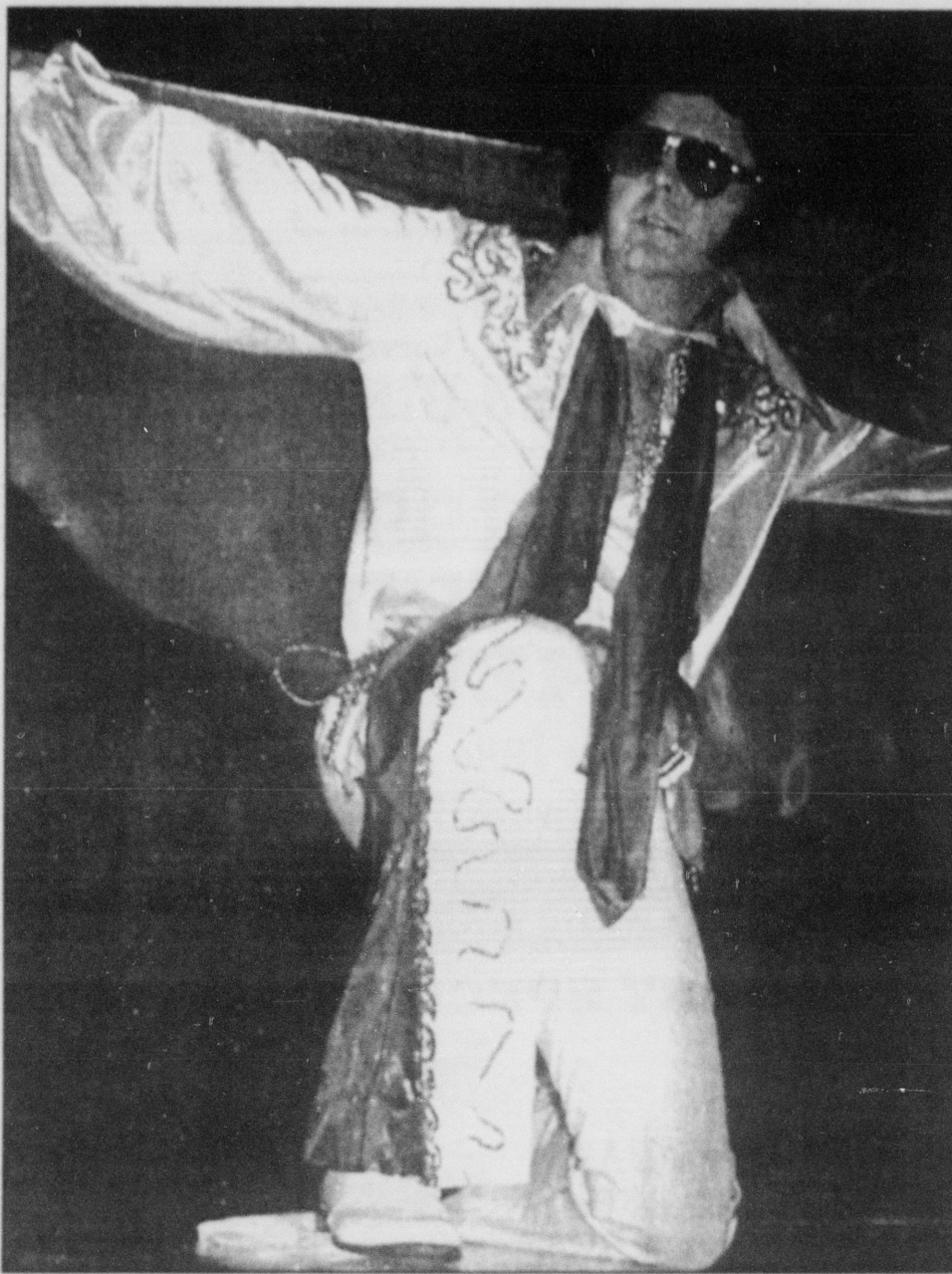
"Over half of the student body statewide works to afford an education. Along with tuition increases this is only going to make it harder for people to afford a college education and avoid even more borrowing," Cross said.

Oregon is one of 12 states that does not have a tip credit law. In 1966, the federal government passed legislation that allowed employers of tip-earning employees to lower wages below the state's minimum wage.

One of the provisions of the tip-credit law is that tip-earning employees make at least 50 percent of the minimum wage in wages alone.

Currently, the national minimum wage is \$4.25 an hour, which means that employers in states that have the tip-credit law can pay their employees as little as \$2.13 an hour.

## Governor kicks students off OHP

Governor John Kitzhaber's proposed budget attempts to kick college students off the Oregon Health Plan (OHP).

Although the OHP was created by the Legislature to provide universal access to health insurance for all Oregonians, Ballot Measure 5 and a delay in a law requiring employers to provide health insurance have delayed its total implementation.

The Governor's proposed budget threatens to eliminate full-time college students from the OHP in order to save an estimated \$7.2 million of savings over two years on a \$6 billion budget, according to the Oregon Student Lobby (OSL).

"There are many problems with this pro-

posal, not the least of which is removing people's health care simply because they are trying to get an education," said Oregon Senator Cliff Trow.

"Keeping the Oregon Health Plan available to students is of considerable importance. I will be fully participating in the efforts to prevent their proposed elimination."

"We want to hear from students affected by this proposal. This is a serious matter and we are here to help," Trow said.

The Governor's proposal is based on the rationale that college students already have access to health care.

However, according to a 1994 OSL survey, 22 percent of all Oregon State System of Higher Education (OSSHE) students indicated that they did not have health insurance of

## NROTC travels to competition

OSU's Naval Reserve Officer Training Corps Battalion travelled the weekend of Feb. 17 to Feb. 19 to compete in 1995 Northwest Navy.

Northwest Navy is an annual competition pitting NROTC units in the northwestern U.S. against each other.

Other schools competing were the University of Idaho, Washington State University, the University of Utah, and the University of Washington. The event, held in Moscow, Idaho, was hosted by the University of Idaho and Washington State University.

Though Northwest Navy is an opportunity to compete with other NROTC students, it also gave an opportunity to meet with other NROTC members in the region and see how other schools perform in their NROTC activities.

"I think it was an experience that promoted group awareness between the

schools in the Northwest," said John Richerson, OSU NROTC battalion member and also a member of the battalion's rifle team. "We also had the opportunity to experience what the other teams at our unit respectively accomplish during their arduous months of practice and preparation."

Northwest Navy is perhaps the key event of the NROTC battalion's year, with the daily practices of each team focusing on the competition as far back as the beginning of the school year. OSU's NROTC unit fared well in the competition.

Both the pistol and the rifle teams excelled in their competitions, each taking first place honors with winning margins of over 100 points. Dave Banning captured individual honors by finishing first in both the rifle competitions high prone score and high kneeling score.

Both the basketball team and the swim team finished second—the basketball

## Oregon legislature to take on lawsuit reform

SALEM — Tort reform — meaning injury lawsuit reform — rears its head in the Oregon Legislature's coming week as the Senate Judiciary Committee delves into the issue.

A subcommittee opens hearings Wednesday on a measure to eliminate punitive damages in civil damage lawsuits.

The Senate is considering a variety of other bills to rein in what backers of the measures consider to be an avalanche of litigation that produces excessive damage awards.

Opponents of the bills say they could shut off access to the courts for people who have legitimate grievances.

Punitive damages do not have anything to do with actual monetary expenses or even the compensation for pain and suffering from an injury.

Those are covered by other kinds of damages. Punitive damages are to chasten wrongdoers and deter others from similar conduct.

An Oregon case on punitive damages got national attention in legal circles last year when the U.S. Supreme Court ruled that the state could not bar judges from reviewing juries' punitive damage awards.

Oregon was the only state that had such a prohibition, which was in the state constitution. The nation's highest court said the provision violated due process rights under

the U.S. Constitution.

The case involved a \$5 million punitive damage award against Honda to a Salem man injured while riding a Honda recreational vehicle. When the case returned to Oregon, the state Supreme Court reviewed it and again decided the award was justified.

Advocates of banning punitive damages say the other available damage awards provide fair compensation.

Other highlights of the Legislature's coming week:

**LOTTERY** — Lawmakers are expected to complete action on a bill setting a May 16 mail election on a measure to allow using Lottery revenue for schools and creating an education trust fund. The measure itself has passed both houses.

**SCHOOLS** — The House Human Resources and Education Committee on Monday begins considering changes to 1991 education reform law.

**CRIME** — A House Judiciary subcommittee on Tuesday will work on a measure to change an anti-stalking law that several courts have declared unconstitutional.

**BUDGET** — State economists on Wednesday will issue the latest state revenue forecast, which will play a key role in work to adopt a 1995-97 state budget.

**MANDATES** — The House General Government and Regulatory Reform Committee begins hearings Thursday on measures to require the state to reimburse local governments for costs of programs required by state.

any kind. "Sixteen percent of OSSHE's students indicated that they purchased 'low cost, no-frills campus-based student health insurance plans,' according to the OSL. "Unfortunately these policies are technically being offered in a way that is not in compliance with current insurance statutes and unless this is fixed, that 16 percent will either have to purchase an expensive private plan or go without insurance." "I don't agree with the flawed rationale that students have access to cheap health insurance programs because the OHP is for people who can't even afford those programs," said John Isaacs, ASOSU State Affairs Task Force Director. Even though student populations generally tend to be

healthy and have the potential to earn higher incomes in the future, the Governor's proposal penalizes those individuals obtaining a college education. The proposal will be enacted through an administrative rule's change, not through the Legislature. Therefore, open debate and discussion is limited. According to sources, three possible solutions have been discussed to address the problem: introduction of independent legislation in the Legislature to address the issue of health care for college students; increasing pressure on the governor not to implement his proposal; or renewing the ten cent tax on cigarettes to provide the necessary funding required to allow students to remain on the OHP.

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## U.S. and China avert trade war

WASHINGTON — The Clinton administration on Sunday hailed a last-minute agreement with China to avert a trade war between the two nations as a victory for U.S. exporters. But American businesses said the real benefits will come only if China enforces the deal.

President Clinton said the agreement by the Chinese would eliminate rampant piracy that has cost Americans thousands of jobs and over \$1 billion in high-value exports in such key U.S. industries as computer software, pharmaceuticals, chemicals, books, music and films.

"This is a strong agreement for American companies and American workers," Clinton said in a written statement.

Because of the deal, U.S. Trade Representative Mickey Kantor said the United States was withdrawing trade sanctions which would have imposed punitive, 100 percent tariffs on \$1.08 billion of Chinese products. Scheduled to take effect Sunday, they were the largest potential trade sanctions in U.S. history.

The United States suffered a \$29.5 billion trade deficit with China last year, up 30 percent from the previous year and second only to America's deficit with Japan.

For this reason, the administration views it as critical that China not only halt copyright piracy but also go much further to lower trade barriers to U.S. manufactured goods and farm products.

Kantor was flanked at a Washington news conference by more than a dozen representatives of American companies who have pushed the administration to take a tough line in the negotiations because of their losses from copyright piracy.

"This is not the end. It is a beginning,"

said Jack Valenti, president of the Motion Picture Association, who said it is critical that the Chinese now enforce the agreements.

"Piracy must be rooted out and a climate established that is congenial to creators of intellectual property," he said.

Robert Holleyman, president of the Business Software Alliance, said his industry views the agreement as critical because the rate of software piracy in China exceeds 98 percent.

"Although not a quick and easy remedy, the agreement reached today is an important milestone for all industries that rely on the protection of intellectual property," he said.

Rep. Phil Crane, R-Ill., the head of the House Ways and Means trade subcommittee, also voiced support for the deal but said Congress will be closely monitoring enforcement by the Chinese.

"We will keep a watchful eye on developments in this area," Crane said in a written statement.

The next big trade dispute between the United States and China is likely to be China's request for membership in the World Trade Organization, the new organization created to govern trade.

Kantor said that, while China's entry into the WTO was not directly linked to the piracy issue, the ability to reach an agreement on intellectual property "creates a better atmosphere" for U.S. consideration of the membership request.

He said that discussions with China over its WTO membership, which the United States is effectively blocking, will proceed this year along with further negotiations on opening up China's markets to more U.S. products.

## Suspect turns police station purple

SUNNYSIDE, Wash. — The police station in this Yakima Valley town got an unplanned new color scheme — eye-searing purple — when a smoke grenade was detonated in a locker.

Serafin Nava Perez, 15, of Yakima, is being held for investigation of first-degree arson in the episode, police said.

Perez was arrested Friday for investigation of selling merchandise door-to-door without a solicitor's license and was being held until one of his parents could come and get him.

The next day, waiting by himself in a police area, he apparently reached a finger through the grate of a locker and managed

to pull the pin on a smoke grenade, officers said.

A dispatcher, monitoring the teen-ager on closed-circuit television, saw the grenade ignite. The station was evacuated, and firefighters were summoned to extinguish a small cardboard fire in the locker.

The smoke stained much of the room a purple even brighter than the colors used in explosive dye packs that are typically inserted into the loot taken in bank holdups to make it easier to identify the robbers, an officer commented on Sunday.

"It clashes with everything we've got," she said.

The new color scheme will probably remain until police move into a new building in about a year, Violon said.

## Let's humor the lawyers and get their JOCKEYS in a knot

The article, by Kim Dominique-Plouffe, concerns a Sudbury, Ontario, woman named Dot Brousseau, who was pouring some Kellogg's brand CORN FLAKES cereal into a bowl when—please try to remain calm—out came a hard, fist-sized clump of CORN FLAKES all wadded together.

Here in the United States, a typical consumer, confronted with this situation, would probably just take it in stride, by which I mean don a STYROFOAM brand neck brace and sue Kellogg's for \$4.7 million. But Canada is not part of the United

## Bosnian Serbs need our support to end war, not twisted facts

I was expecting someone supporting the Serb position to disagree with my call for help to lift the arms embargo on Bosnia-Herzegovina on Feb 16, 1995. Therefore, I was not at all surprised to see the response of Mr. Bjelica on Barometer, Feb 22, 1995. What was surprising though was his way of looking for unintended messages in my letter, twisting the facts about the war on Bosnia-Herzegovina, and, most of all, his attacks on Turkey because of the fact that the signature gathering event was organized by the Turkish Student Association.

There are some points in Mr. Bjelica's response which I wholeheartedly agree: His admissions of Bosnian Serbs being the ones who committed most atrocities, Bosnian muslims being the party that suffered the most as a result of the war, his calling of Milosevich and Karadzich as fascist leaders, and his hope and desire to see the ones responsible for all the bloodshed to be held accountable, and, the arrival of the day which all people of Bosnia-Herzegovina will live in peace. I also appreciated his acknowledgement of Bosnia-Herzegovina being a proper country entitled to her international rights, something that his country denied to do so far (Montenegro, where Mr. Bjelica is from, is a part of the Yugoslavian Federation that also includes Serbia).

Unfortunately, after all these admissions he can bring himself to claim that Bosnian SERBS "cannot be aggressors in their own country" (!). His labeling of this conflict as a "civil war" is, I believe, incorrect given the fact that there has been no doubt about the close coordination between the Serbia proper and Bosnian Serbs. Even Russians who have sided with Bosnian Serbs consistently acknowledged this be allowing the sanctions to be imposed on Serbia. Even if we, for a moment, call the situation in Bosnia-Herzegovina a "civil war", a country's right to defend and arm herself is not something that can be waived as arbitrarily as Mr. Bjelica thinks. Vast majority of the world communities agrees that the OPPRESSORS ARE THE BOSNIAN SERBS. The arms embargo was aimed to stop all three parties, however, it hasn't worked against Bosnian SERBS at all due to their organic connection to Serbia. And unfortunately, all the diplomatic efforts made by the U.N., even some military tactics employed by NATO, have been proven unsuccessful to isolate Bosnian SERBS, and convince them to stop their aggression. Bosnian Serbs have come up with unthinkable ways to mock the world, the most recent one being the call for mediation by former President Jim Carter. They are not afraid, because they know there are no "sticks", but all "carrots" in this game.

I think Mr. Bjelica is very upset because I have called for an action to influence the U.S. Congress TO DO SOMETHING TO CHANGE THE STATUS-QUO, A GREAT INJUSTICE, THAT FAVORS HIS SERB BROTHERS. He calls me and my "followers" "muslim radicals" because I referred to Bosnia-Herzegovina as simply Bosnia. Now, who are my "followers"? He must mean the 255 students, staff, faculty, and residents of Corvallis who signed the letter so far! In my letter I have referred to Bosnia-Herzegovina as both Bosnia and with its full name due to my laziness in writing long words. However, he chooses to ignore this and tries to distort what I had to say. I guess many of the world journalists are "muslim radicals" too (!). Then, he calls those of us who support the idea of letting Bosnia-Herzegovina exercise her right to arm and defend herself as a means to convince Bosnian-SERBS to sign the peace treaty "pro-fascists" (!). Apparently, according to Mr.

Bjelica, Bosnian-SERBS are non-aggressors (!), but we are the "pro-fascists" (!). Pretty interesting argument indeed! I am afraid he doesn't comprehend the meaning of his words, however eloquently he uses them.

In a reference to my previous letter, he argues that Russians are brothers of Bosnian muslims and Croats as well as Serbs due to their Slavic ethnic origin. However, it is obviously not a very common or popular idea among Bosnian Serbs knowing that many of them engaged in POLLUTING THE GENE POOL OF BOSNIAN MUSLIMS, as they put it, raping their women systematically in rape camps, not allowing them to leave until their pregnancy came to a point where abortion was not an option. It is hard to imagine one would forcefully remove his "brothers" from their homes in Bosnia-Herzegovina and Croatia, making them refugees in a few "safe" havens left or in neighboring countries as well as Europe. I am not even mentioning the dead and the wounded. All his fancy talk of "brotherhood" is swell, but the U.N. observers have documented overwhelmingly, most Serbs apparently see themselves differently, and feel that they have the right to "cleanse" the territory they think as theirs from its "impurities", namely, anyone else who is not an Orthodox Serb.

My intention in supporting the arms sales to Bosnia is to make the Serbs stop and think, and sign the peace agreement they have been balking at, not to accelerate the war. My heart goes out to all the children, women, men affected by this war. I sincerely wish that there could have been a way to go back to the pre-war arrangements, where all the different ethnic and religious groups could live peacefully in Bosnia-Herzegovina. Prior to the ultranationalist call for a "Great Serbia" by Milosevich, 95% of the people of Bosnia-Herzegovina agreed to live as a separate state in a referendum, which would be led by muslims, Croats and Serbs taking turns to govern. It was during the turn of Muslims, Bosnian Serbs, encouraged and supported by Serbia proper, took arms and started ethnic cleansing, and bloodshed. Many observers reported that all opposition to the expansionist policies within the Serbia proper have been stopped forcefully. In fact, they testify that Serbs in former Yugoslavia only hear of nationalistic propaganda that conveys the message that they have been singled out and victimized by the world community. Mr. Bjelica's views are, in my opinion, a perfect example of how such propaganda can be used to blind intelligent sensible people like him. It is puzzling to me how he points out to the Serb sufferings without questioning what right Bosnian SERBS have to keep Sarajevo, and most of Bosnia-Herzegovina and eastern Croatia hostage, under siege, and fire for more than three (!!!) years.

Mr. Bjelica also purposely tries to bring irrelevant issues to the table since he has not many facts supporting his views. Some of those are the human rights violations in Turkey, Cyprus, genocide claims etc. Answering all his allegations would take another op-ed piece, I do not intend to let him achieve his goal of changing the focus of this op-ed from the injustices and atrocities committed by Bosnian SERBS. I must say, though, his recollection of the issues related to Turkey is extremely one-sided and biased, as most of the readers have already guessed from his generalized statements (Turkish women being "second class citizens" etc.). I urge and invite all readers to further investigate these issues before taking his claims as truths.

I sense Mr. Bjelica believes that the Ottoman reign in the region is responsible for all the hate between the groups, and that his brethren had converted to Islam during their rule. He is incorrect in both accounts. Should I remind him that it was a

SERB who killed the Austrian Archduke Ferdinand in 1914 in Sarajevo (AUSTRIA was the ruler of Bosnia at the time) and started the World War I? And again contrary to his belief, Bosnian muslims started to accept Islam PRIOR to the Ottoman rule. They belonged to a different religion and were called "Bogomiles" before accepting Islam in 15th and 16th centuries. He complains that "the Ottoman 'rule' left this region backward compared to the rest of Europe." I take backwardness in the sense that there remained a muslim population in Bosnia, apparently something Mr. Bjelica finds very disturbing. Had Ottomans employed the tactics and techniques used by contemporary Bosnian Serbs, one doubts that there would exist anyone else but muslims in the region. He also, to my disappointment, cannot prevent himself from speaking of a long-lived Orthodox-Christian dream, and declares that "FOLLOWING MY LOGIC" (arming Bosnians to defend themselves against aggressors), "ISTANBUL" (again he calls it first, Constantinople) "SHOULD BE RETURNED TO GREEKS"! I am sorry, I am unable to follow HIS LOGIC to come to such a conclusion. He goes on to explain that muslim population of Bosnia has been "Europeanized", they do not observe all the duties and traditions of Islam, in fact they "eat pork, drink wine, celebrate Christmas and Easter" etc. One might conclude that the kind of muslims Mr. Bjelica can tolerate are only the ones who are almost behaving according to what he considers the norm, Christianity and Slavism! He then comments that Bosnian muslims do not need any outsiders' help and patronizing. His claim is pretty ironic when one recalls the fact the Bosnia-Herzegovina government INVITED the U.N. and NATO to observe and stop the SERB aggression. I don't want to believe that what Mr. Bjelica desires is the world communities to turn their backs, close their eyes, as Bosnian SERBS subject Bosnian muslims to genocide and ethnic cleansing, get a big chunk of Bosnia, and join in with Serbia proper!

I was appalled by his sarcastic questioning of why I was not helping the Bosnian muslims by being there, if I care so much for them. Are we not to have compassion? And do what we can to help ease human suffering? Mr. Bjelica admits to himself that he sympathizes with Bosnian muslims who suffered the most. I really wonder what he did to stop the war or help them. Is his conscious comfortable with doing nothing but calling for INACTION (studying in his warm and cozy Electrical Engineering lab (something he accuses me of doing!)) as he

# Oregon State wrestlers barely edged out of Pac-10 title Beavers sending six to nationals

The Oregon State wrestlers took 2nd this past weekend at the Pac-10 Championships. The top finisher for the tournament was Arizona State University, who beat the Beavers by a mere 2.5 points.

The 1995 Pac-10 Championships Final Team Results are as follows:

The battle between OSU and ASU for first place was inevitable. It could have gone either way depending on the luck of the draw. The Beavers stayed tough and wrestled hard but ASU had a couple of breaks in their favor.

The Sun Devils are coached by head coach Lee Roy Smith, who is in his third season at ASU. The 1993 *Amateur Wrestling News* Rookie Coach of the Year has led the Sun Devils to back-to-back NCAA appearances. In 1993 the team took third at nationals and in 1994 they took eighth.

"We had a goal to come here and do well," head coach Lee Roy Smith said. "We had a tough dual meet season and this really brings our season to a highlight at a time when it's most important. We did about as good as we could have. Our wrestlers wrestled well for the most part and I'm just excited for these guys to take home the conference championship."

ASU will be sending six wrestlers to the NCAAs. Three first-place finishers, one second-place finisher and two third-place finishers will attend.

The Sun Devils had an upset when No. 3-ranked Jeff Thieler took third place at 150 lbs. He was favored as the No. 1 seed going into the competition. Smith feels that they had some upsets and some high points but it all evened out.

"It was a disappointment," Smith said. "But we were able to win as a team and I know he (Jeff Thieler) feels better about that. He can correct the problems that occurred in his matches. Those things kind of balance themselves out."

"I was sad about Jeff," ASU assistant

coach and Olympic Silver Medalist Zeke Jones said. "Being a senior and ranked No. 3 in the country, it would have been nice to have seen Jeff be able to pull it off. I think Jeff will rebound. He's a strong kid. But we put in a super performance. I'm real pleased."

Oregon State put their best foot forward and wrestled to their potential. Six wrestlers from OSU will be going to nationals. "I was real pleased with our performance," head coach Joe Wells said. "There were two or three things that could have happened to go our way that didn't."

"Now we have to look forward. We have three weeks to prepare for nationals. If we perform like we did this weekend, we'll be in good shape."

"I think overall the performance was real good," assistant coach Randy Couture said. "It was a tough fight. We knew it was going to be close but we fought hard."

Glen Nieradka at 126 lbs won his championship title in style. Nieradka got after it and pinned Boise State's Chris Ward. The crowd roared with excitement when he stuck Ward.

"I feel good right now," Nieradka said. "I was a little nervous at first. We haven't had this many fans before. But I felt fine once I started to get going. It was my last match here and winning in that style was fun."

Babak Mohammadi at 134 lbs won another Pac-10 title. He wrestled hard against one of his tougher rivals, No.3-ranked Steve St. John from ASU, with a one-point spread. Every time the two have wrestled this year, Mohammadi has come out on top.

"It was a good match," Mohammadi said. "It was our last home match and it was good to finish hard. (We had some) good scrambles. He wrestled hard. I wrestled hard."

Chad Renner at 167 lbs took third place. In the semi-finals he lost to Boise States Charles Burton. It was a close match that went into overtime. Burton scored the first take-down points to win the match. Renner came back to beat Neal Mason of Cal Poly in the consolations to take third and move onto the nationals.

"The match I lost can help me," Renner said. "I know I have to get better. I have to work on developing some more offensive moves. I was happy to win today, but I wasn't overjoyed. It didn't make up for last night."

The Pac-10 Outstanding Wrestler Award was given to Les Gutches at 177 lbs. Gutches

had an excellent tournament with two pins and two major decisions for a total of 22 team points.

"I did alright," Gutches said. "I won and that's what I came here to do. You never know what he's (Derek Scott CSUB) going to do. He's sneaky, but it was good practice for nationals."

"I think we wrestled good as a team. I think we wrestled as good as we could have. Maybe Jason Buce could have placed. I think he had the potential to place, but he was injured. Chad Flack was out the first day last year. He made it to the finals this year and that shows a lot of improvement."

Chad Flack (190 lbs) took second place. He lost to Jassen Froehlich of CSUB. "We need to attack a little bit more and wrestle our style," assistant coach Terry Steiner said. "If something does go wrong we have to be

able to come back from it. He (Flack) has to realize who he is instead of looking at who the other guy is."

Senior Reynold Gardner took the championship title at heavyweight by beating Boise States Chris Stipich. The crowd cheered hard for his last home match.

The wild cards that were chosen were Neal Mason (167 lbs) from Cal Poly, Jimmy Aguirre (134 lbs) from Stanford, Rob McMinn (142 lbs) from ASU, Matt Cano (126 lbs) from Stanford, Jeremy Ensrud (126 lbs) from U of O, Tim Cano (150 lbs) from Cal Poly SLO, Can Tran (118 lbs) from CS Fullerton and Paschal Dure (heavyweight) for CS Bakersfield.

"We have a lot of work to do from now until nationals," Steiner said. "A lot of little things. We need to keep focused on what we're doing. Again, this was a step up. We have to keep moving forward."

## Gymnasts stumble against ASU

The Oregon State gymnastics tasted their first defeat in six weeks as they fell to host Arizona State this past weekend in Tempe.

The Beavers, who were going for their sixth straight win, struggled from the start and were never able to get into any kind of rhythm as they lost 194.225 to 192.350.

The Beavers knew what kind of night it was going to be very early on as they had three falls in their first event, the bars. The top score for the Beavers was freshman Amy Slack, who posted a 9.65. On the flip side every Sun Devil score that counted on the event was above a 9.675. The Sun Devils won the event with a score of 48.700 to 47.425.

The Sun Devils also won this event by a score of 48.925 to 48.45.

The third event was the beam and the

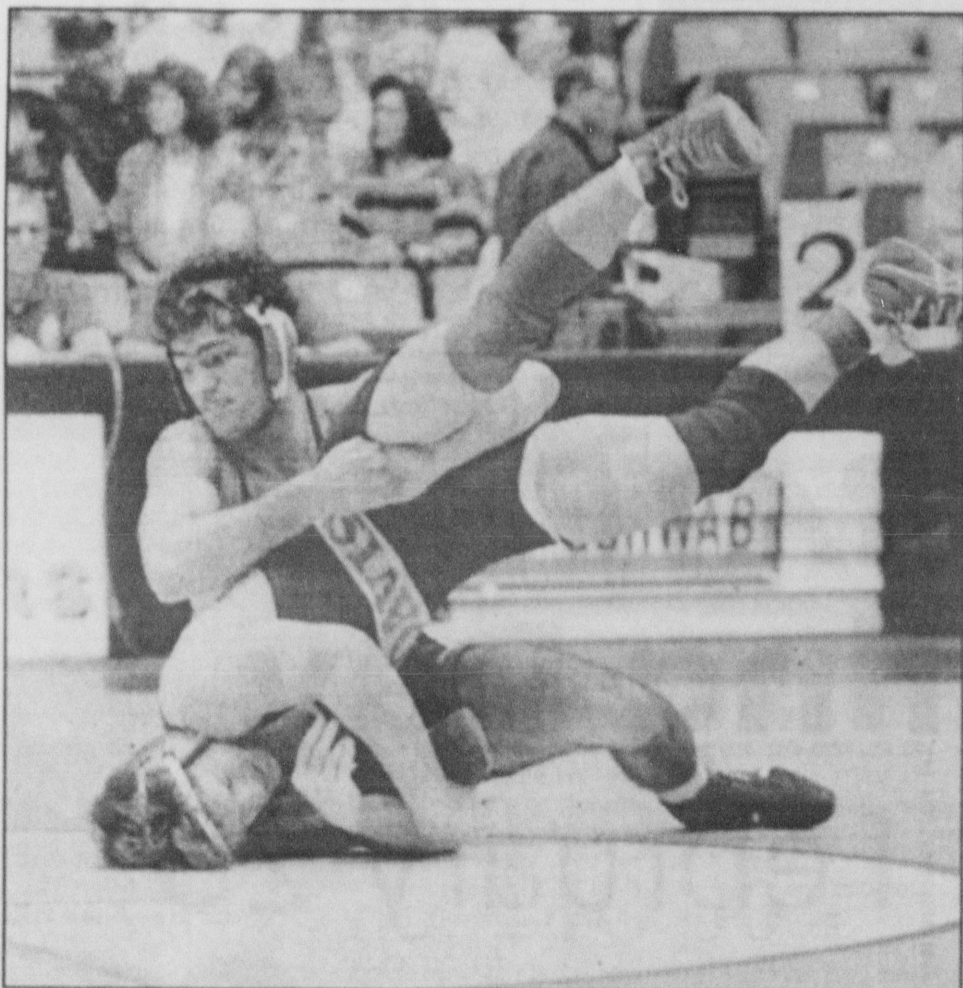

Sophomore Randi Miller led the way with a score of 9.750. Sun Devil Tina Brinkman led all gymnasts with a score of 9.9 in her return from an automobile accident earlier this year.

The Beavers are hoping this meet will be a positive thing, as they will host the Shanico Invitational this weekend. "I hope this will serve as a wake-up call because we've got a great meet coming up," said Beavers head coach Jim Turpin.

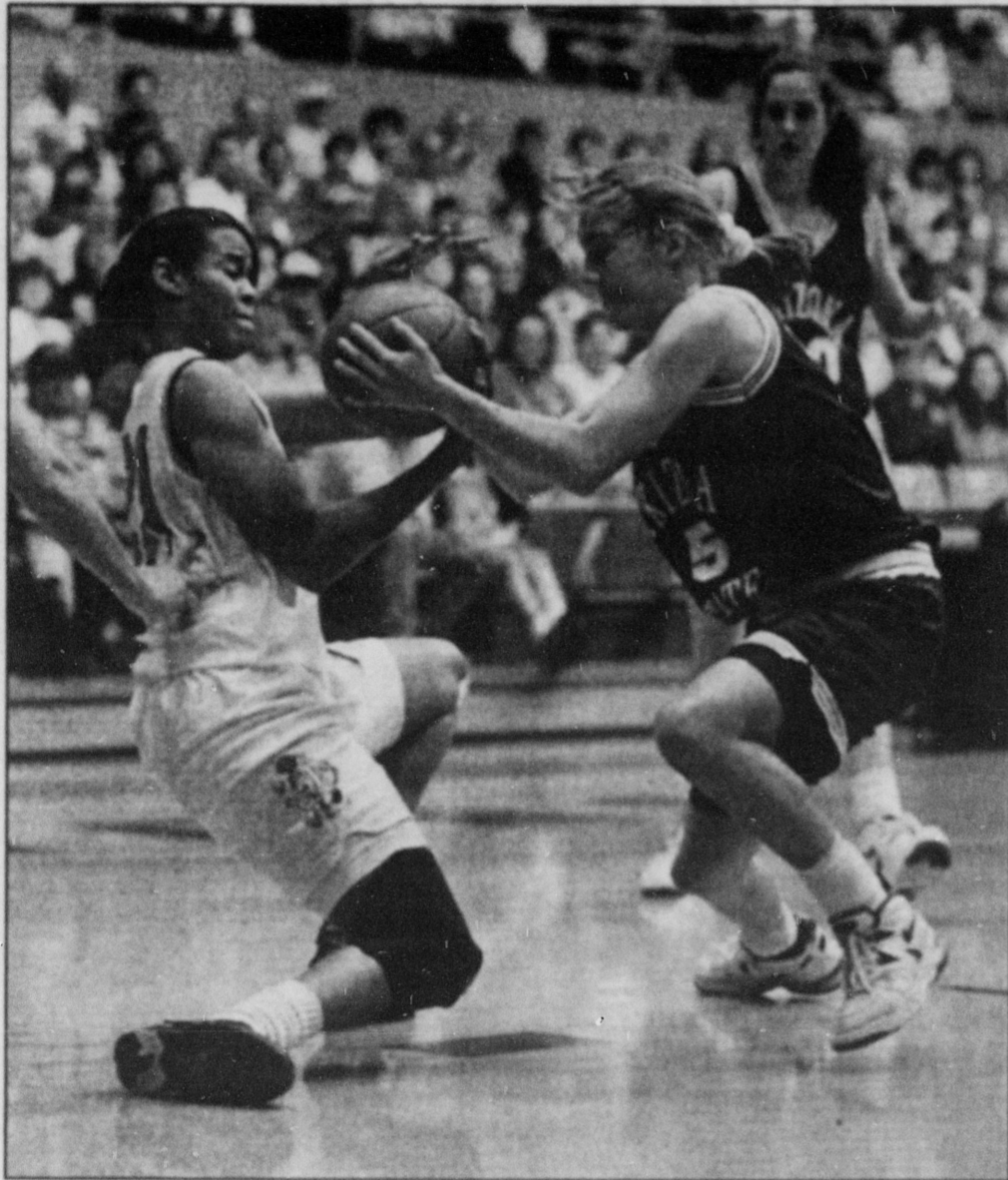

# Women's hoops makes short work of Sun Devils, bench gets time

As expected, the Oregon State women's basketball team thundered by Arizona State at Gill Coliseum Sunday afternoon, by a score of 92-49. The Beavers improved to 10-4 in the Pac-10, 18-5 overall; the Sun Devils fell to 2-13 conference, 8-16 overall.

Coupled with Washington State's 72-67 upset over Washington on Saturday evening, the victory moves the Beavers back into a second-place tie in the Pac-10. The Beavers and Huskies are both 10-4, with 13-1 Stanford holding a comfortable lead in first.

Yesterday's victory also marks the first time that OSU has reached a double-figure conference win mark in the nine-year history of Pac-10 women's basketball. Oregon State had achieved nine wins three times before, in 1991, 1993, and 1994.

Although the Beavers started slow against Arizona State, the contest was all Oregon State and then some, as the Beavers used their fast-break offense and a ferocious defense to completely smother the Sun Devils. Arizona State scored just two points in the game's first 11 minutes, and Oregon State led 39-6 a couple minutes before the half.

"Today we're very, very pleased," OSU head coach Aki Hill said. "In the past we've prepared well mentally for the big games; today we showed some consistency in mental preparation for all games."

"The biggest thing is that we came out and didn't take ASU lightly," junior guard A.J. Dionne said. "I was proud of the team for playing with intensity throughout."

Arizona State's futility was on open display for all to see in the first half. With around 11:15 remaining, Sun Devil junior guard Christy Kellams put up a three-point attempt as the shot-clock buzzer went off. Most of OSU's players headed downcourt, but an Arizona State player got the long offensive rebound, and found teammate freshman forward Chandra Lambert wide open under the basket. There was no one within 10 feet, but the stationary Lambert missed the lay-in.

Due to that and a host of other misses, with 7:31 remaining in the first half Arizona State had a field goal percentage of just 14 percent.

The Sun Devils' defense wasn't much better.

Near the end of the first half, Dionne swiped a Sun Devil pass near mid-court and went hunting for an easy basket. Kellams was ready and waiting for Dionne, but became so preoccupied with telling her onrushing teammates that she had "ball," that Dionne went right around her for an easy deuce.

About the only excitement of the first half was seeing if the Beavers could hold ASU to single-digit scoring. It appeared to be a good bet with a minute left in the half, but Kellams scored all three of her points in the half's final 13 seconds to cut OSU's lead to 43-11.

Arizona State ended the half with more turnovers (22) and personal fouls (15) than points (11), and shot 24 percent from the field (5 of 21) and 25 percent from the free throw line (1 of 4).

"Arizona State didn't play as well today as I expected," junior guard Moneka Staton said. "I'd better not say anything more than that."

The second half was an opportunity for OSU's non-starters to shine. Freshmen guards Lisa Macy and Nicole McAllister saw major playing time, as did center Dawn Lewis and forward Kim McGrew. McAllister's three-point basket with 5:45 remaining extended the Beaver lead to its largest margin, 46 points, and Lewis had a game-high 17 points.

"It was really great that the bench got some playing time," Macy said. "It's the second time we've gotten some playing time against ASU."

Junior forward Tanja Kostic was limited to her lowest offensive output of the season, 11 points, as she played only 18 minutes. Kostic entered the contest working on a school-record streak of 18 straight free-throws made, but missed her first two attempts yesterday.

Junior forward Anette Mollerstrom's parents are visiting from Sweden; this is the first time they have seen their daughter play basketball in America.

"It's great; I haven't seen her play since 1990," father Mats Mollerstrom said. "But I hope the games next weekend are a little more exciting."

"I'm very impressed by the friendliness and openness of all the people here," mother Birthe Mollerstrom added.

The Beavers will travel to the Bay Area this weekend, with road games at Stanford Thursday evening and at California Saturday afternoon.

## Swimmers take eighth place at Pac-10s

The Oregon State University women's swim team finished the 1995 Pac-10 Conference swimming championships in eighth place Saturday, 56.6 points ahead of conference rival Washington State.

Oregon State's 200-yd. medley team of Heather Lavell, Heather Simmons, Jessica McMilin and Amy van Loben Sels set a new Oregon State school record, swimming the event in 1:48.08, beating the old record of 1:49.04 set last year.

Individually, Oregon State did not send a swimmer to the finals, but four Oregon State swimmers placed: Traci Lamoure

placed 19th in the 200-yd. freestyle, Heather Simmons placed 21st in the 100-yd. breaststroke, van Loben Sels 21st in the 100-yd. butterfly and Tori Eisenbies 13th in the 100-yd. backstroke.

"We feel really good about moving up a notch in the conference," said OSU head coach Julie Saunders. "It's been a while since we've been out of that ninth-place spot. The teams directly in front of us (Washington, Cal) beat us on depth. We set a number of records this weekend and overall feel pretty good."

Stanford won the Pac-10 title, followed by UCLA and Arizona State.

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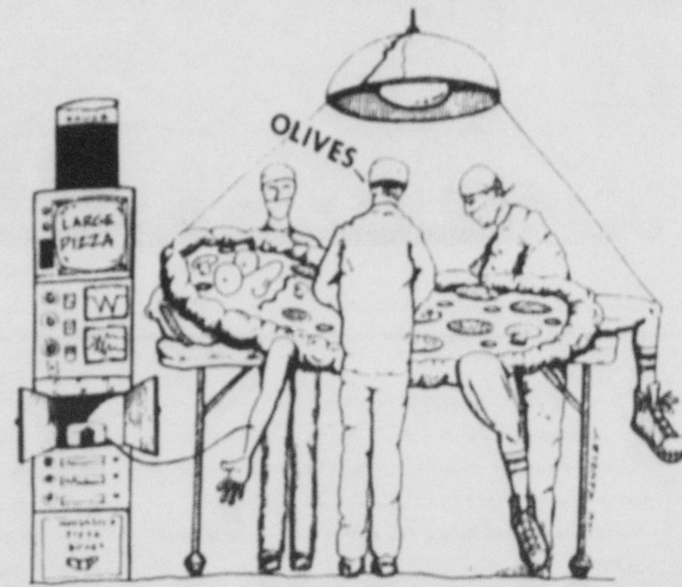

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## No Beav scores double digits in loss to ASU

TEMPE, Ariz. — First-half emotion gave way to second-half dominance for Arizona State junior Mario Bennett Saturday night. Bennett, who cried during a pre-game ceremony honoring the Sun Devils' four seniors, scored 14 of his 18 points in the second half as 15th-ranked Arizona State routed Oregon State 82-44.

"It was an emotional game because all my fellas were leaving," said Bennett, who scored all of his points in an 11-minute span as the Sun Devils (20-7, 10-5) used a 23-2 run for a 65-24 lead with 9:01 to play.

Whether Bennett will return for his senior season or enter the NBA draft has been a subject of speculation during the Pac-10 season, but the 6-foot-9 junior said he made a decision.

"I've made a decision," he said. "I decided we're going to the NCAA tournament."

Arizona State, which beat the Beavers for the fifth time in six games, reached the 20-win mark for the second time in coach Bill Frieder's six seasons with the Sun Devils.

"I think that's huge," said Frieder, who is 6-0 in home finales with Arizona State. "We're excited about that. Winning 20 is

great, but we don't want to stop there. We want to get another win or two before we go into the tournament."

Arizona State scored the game's first seven points, then Ron Riley scored six of his 20 as the Sun Devils took a 13-1 lead with 13:12 left in the first half.

"We got out to the 13-1 lead and I think they gave up," said senior guard Marcell Capers, who had a 3-pointer during the Sun Devils' run. "They said, 'Let's go through the motions and finish the game up.'"

Oregon State (6-17, 3-11) missed its first six shots, with Brent Barry ending the drought when he made a 3-pointer with 12:51 to play in the first half.

Barry, who entered the game averaging nearly 21 points per game, scored five points on 2 of 11 shooting.

"We didn't fight fire with fire," said Oregon State coach Jim Anderson, whose Beavers lost their sixth straight game. "We didn't execute with precision on offense. We turned the ball over. We hung our heads and took it for a while."

Mustapha Hoff and Jerohn Brown each scored eight points to lead Oregon State.

## San Antonio sets records in win over Golden State

SAN ANTONIO — San Antonio coach Bob Hill finally enjoyed a game.

The Spurs set season marks for points, rebounds and margin of victory Sunday night in a 129-99 win over the Golden State Warriors.

"I had fun tonight," Hill said after his team won its fifth straight game. "This was a win we needed. It was nice to win that way."

David Robinson scored 30 points to pace a balanced San Antonio attack that had eight players reach double figures. The San Antonio starters rested during the fourth quarter.

"We needed a game like this," Robinson said. "We've been looking for a knockout. We were playing against a below .500

team and we've got to take care of business. We are getting better at that."

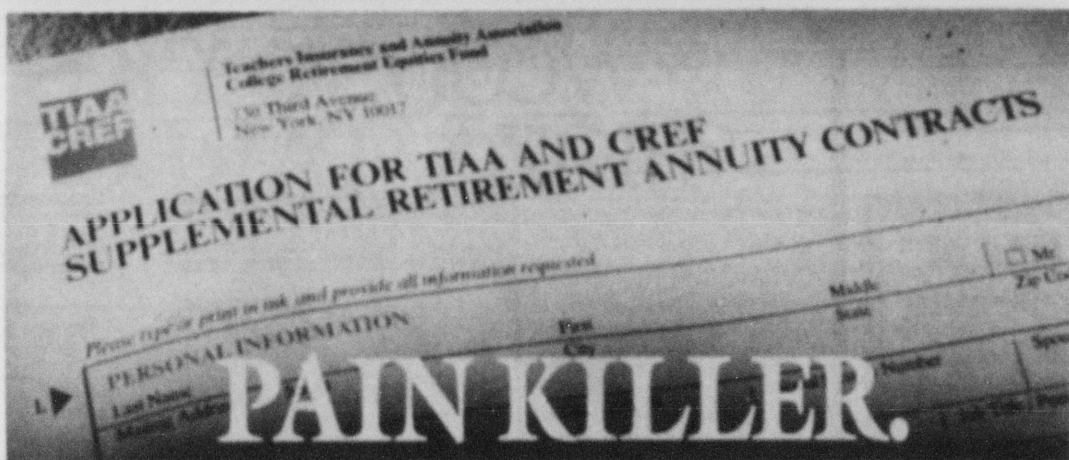
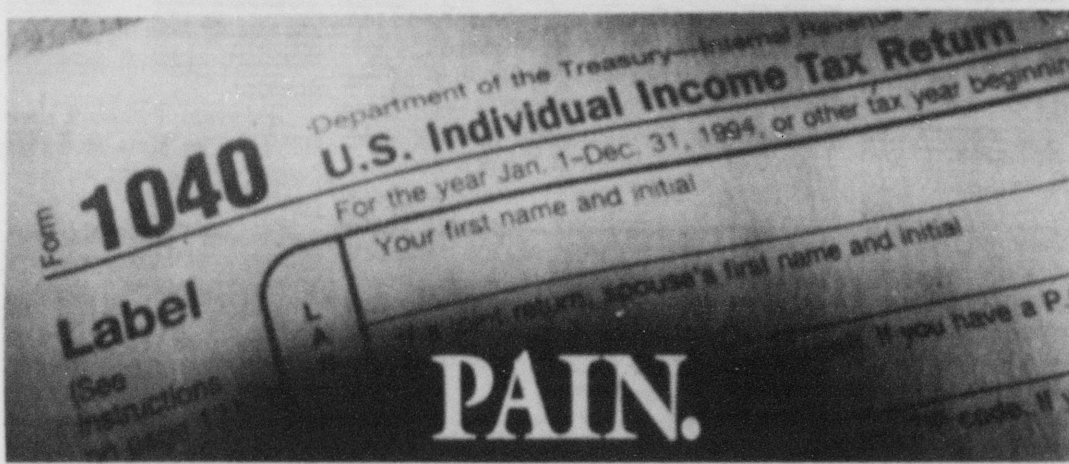
Robinson said the big victory, which pulled the Spurs within 1 game of first-place Utah in the Midwest Division, should have alleviated some of Hill's worries.

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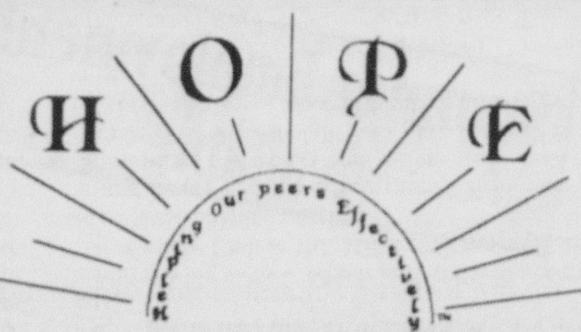
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
