#### SIGNIFICANCE OF LAWRENCE FIRM'S DESIGN:

EXTER.DETAILS/CRAFTSMANSHIP: Better than average workmanship and materials. INTER.DETAILS/CRAFTSMANSHIP: Better than average workmanship and materials.

EXTERIOR INTEGRITY: Moderate changes; some original character remains.

INTERIOR INTEGRITY: Minor changes, but original character intact.

SETTING INTEGR: Major changes to character and relationship of surroundings. SIGNIFICANCE STATEMENT:

St. Paul's is relatively intact. The interior particularily retains its integrity and was possibly influenced by Nevius's design for St. Paul's in The Dalles (1875) where Lawrence's partner William Holford designed a Parish House shortly prior to this project. The original designs indicate compromises made mostly in the number of dormers and front entry location, in apparent attempts at cost reduction. According to the opening announcement the model for this project was a "historic parish church of England". All the major additions were by Howard R. Perrin, a prominent Klamath Falls architect from 1922-69. He was the designer of many commercial structures in downtown Klamath Falls, plus works for the armed forces at Camp White, and Klamath and Lakeview Naval Air Stations. It is probable that Perrin was the on-site architect for the original Holford construction. No other association between Lawrence firms and Perrin is known.
