SIGNIFICANCE STATEMENT:

The Tillamook County Courthouse was built with county funds (no WPA/PWA funds were involved). It is significant for the quality of its design & workmanship. It is built of pinkish-tan brick with chevron & soldier course patterns & restrained stone trim including twin matching entryway panels & columns. The interior has marble floors & wainscotting. The courthouse houses the courtroom, county officials' offices, & jail. This is the only built courthouse designed by Lawrence's firms. Ormond R. Bean and William Holford, partners of Lawrence, were involved with this project; but Lawrence surely played a central role in its design. Bean later became a Portland City Commissioner and influential politician. The building is also significant for its relatively intact quality, especially of the exterior and the most important interior spaces.


