"I will add, in conclusion, that I much rely upon you for the prompt and discreet performance of the important duties herein assigned, and hope to meet you, well & hearty, at Port Oxford, or vicinity."

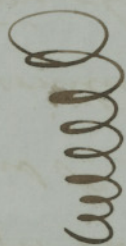

By direction of the Superintendent Ind. Affairs, you will, at once, discharge from & sever the

The remainder of the men now constituting the Guard Company, under your command, at the Grand Ronde Reservation; On the same being done you will render to this office a Complete Muster Roll of the said Company, duly certified.

The public property remaining in the hands of Mr. John Fleming, as Quartermaster and Commissary of the Company will be transferred to the sub Agent at the Grand Ronde, taking duplicate receipts therefor in the name of the Superintendent. The Oxen, Wagon, Chairs &c. received of Mr. Lamson will be brought down to this Superintendency.

The instructions of the Superintendent which were this evening read to you in detail, touching the necessary preparations to be made in going to Port Orford District with a party of men and animals, will be embodied in another communication. It is necessary, however, to state herein that the Superintendent has designated Mr. Fleming, Mr. Cluff and Mr. Smith to accompany you, with three others, of your own selection, of the men in your Company.

By direction of the Supt. Indian Affairs  
You will immediately upon your arrival at the Grand  
Ronde Reservation, relieve Sub Agent R. P. Metcalfe in  
the duties at that place, receiving from, and receipting to  
him for all the public property of the Indian Department  
at the Agency, and on the reservation, which he may  
transfer to you.

Specific instructions as to the operations  
to be carried on, and the number of mechanics, farmers  
&c. to be retained in service on the Reservation; the  
subsistence &c. of the Indians will be written out and  
forwarded you in a few days.
