Sir

Referring to my letter of 21st inst upon the subject of your proceeding to Fort Lane with funds and aiding in the removal of the Injuno train, and after friendly Indian consent at that point - to the coast reservation - I have now to direct that you will proceed with as much dispatch as the circumstances will admit - to that service -

Five thousand Dollars will be placed in your hands for that object - and should Agent Aubrey take charge of the immigrating party you will turn over the funds to him - taking his receipt ^{in duplicate} ~~as heretofore~~ to the forms herewith enclosed, should he have decline to accompany the train, you will take charge and direct the movements ~~with as~~ ^{with as} great dispatch and economy as possible.

Five hundred dollars ^{and six hundred Dollars} will also be placed in your hands - to be handed to sub agent G. P. Drew - to whom you will deliver the amount taking his receipts in duplicate - as per enclosed forms. It is not unlikely that agent Aubrey ~~is~~ ^{is} already ^{currently} ~~on the way~~ accompanied by an escort of one hundred United States troops. Should you find this the case and believe it requisite for a greater number than twenty should to remain with the immigrating party North of the Mexican to the good ends you will request the officer in command to remain ~~with~~ ^{with} the train
