Dayton 8th September 28<sup>th</sup> 1854

Sir

My letter of 25<sup>th</sup> instant advised you of your appointment as Special Indian Agent for the Tribes in Oregon and I now proceed to give such instructions as I regard essential to aid you in the discharge of that duty. very much have must be left to your discretion which <sup>of the</sup> knowledge of the country and the Indians inhabiting ~~it~~ <sup>it</sup> part of the district ~~of Oregon~~ <sup>you</sup> will enable you to act efficiently.

Heretofore very much of the country east of the cascade mountains lying in our Territory has not been attacked to any particular extent. our limited knowledge of the country and the hostile character of the Indians ~~who inhabit it~~ <sup>therein</sup> as shewn by their repeated aggressions on the persons and property of our citizens render <sup>it</sup> necessary ~~an additional~~ agent should be stationed among them. You will therefore be apointed to duty in the part of the country lying east of the cascade mountains and between our southern boundary and the 44<sup>th</sup> parallel of latitude. It is supposed this line strikes the cascade mountains in the vicinity of the snow-beds commonly called the three sisters, <sup>and</sup> may cross the snake river at or below Fort Boise Sept ending for the bucky mountains. Mr M R Thompson who now has charge of all that portion of ~~country~~ our territory north of this line will act in concert with you, but whose extent of district and amount of labor necessary to acquire an accurate knowledge of the country and people who occupy it will not permit him to tarry long in your district.

The present hostile attitude of the Indians along snake river will doubtless render it necessary that you should remain during the winter if it be probable in that vicinity. And as military operations have been discontinued

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against them for the purpose of bringing to justice such  
 as have been engaged in the recent outrages - and those  
 aiding and protecting them and all others who are found  
 hostile to our people - whilst you will give every  
 possible facility to bring <sup>them to</sup> speedy and retributive justice  
~~those monsters guilty of these previous crimes or committed~~  
~~on our people this summer and all sides and of these~~  
 you, will equally strive to protest ~~the~~ and encourage  
 those known to be friendly. The numerous acts of ~~of~~  
 aggression of long standing, and frequent repetition  
 committed by those savages against our people, without any  
 effort to bring them to punishment - has doubtless inspired  
 them with a belief that this omnipot ~~last~~ is from meekness,  
~~complaisance~~, ~~or~~ ~~on~~ ~~on~~ an indifference to the wrongs done ~~on~~ ~~on~~  
 our citizens. Having great confidence in their own  
 ability to defend themselves against us - they will doubtless  
 require marked evidences of our ability to destroy  
 them before being disabused on this subject. and whilst  
 every effort on your part should be rendered to accomplish  
 it you will at the same time strive to lessen the  
 sacrifice of human life - by sparing the hand on  
 bonds who have thus offended from ~~the~~ the surrounding  
 tribes. And let this punishment be rather as a matter  
 of stern justice than revenge - you should not  
 forget that we are a civilized and Christian people  
 and they <sup>savages</sup> and ignorant ~~and~~ ~~on~~ an indiscriminate  
 slaughter of women and children would not seem  
 necessary to convince them of our power. A distinction  
 should always be made between the guilty &  
 innocent else no stimulus is given for good  
 conduct. The severer is your punishment the more  
 it will be impossible to forward you any considerable amount  
 of supplies - of Indian goods now do I mean - that you



will meet very many - as you expect this minute  
 will be ~~be~~ chiefly directed, after the arrest of offenders.  
 And the establishment of friendly relations, the other as you  
 such information as may enable us to act understandingly  
 hereafter, with this view you will secure the operation  
 more accurately the character of the country - the number  
 and location of the various bands & tribes of Indians,  
 their condition, means of subsistence their friendly toward  
 the whites. &c It is apprehended <sup>the capacity of</sup> ~~and~~ <sup>in full</sup> persons  
 may have contributed in the present state of affairs in that  
 region you will secure the operation whether there be any  
 just foundation for such suspicous - Reports have  
 reached me that persons in the service of the Indians  
 by coming at Fort Braine have, since the number of  
 our citizens were set loose by Indians, furnished them  
 with arms and ammunition and received in return money  
 supposed to have been taken by them from the hundred  
 persons. Should you find this to be the case, if it is  
 not already done, you will cause the arrest of such  
 persons or persons and send him or them to the sheriff  
 to be tried and punished by the proper authority - and  
 in connection with this subject I would suggest the  
 necessity of closing the doors of that fort as against  
 any Indians in the vicinity of the to be camped.  
 No licence has been granted them more day strike  
 it proper to grant licence to any one in the service  
 on to any one ~~but~~ <sup>but</sup> ever committed in the most wanton  
 with them such an indulgence is in violation of  
 the laws of the country and almost dangerous to the  
 peace and good order and security of our citizens.  
 It is very possible weak minded persons in the employ of this company  
 may by a mistaken notion conceive it <sup>in the</sup> intent  
 of this company to prejudice the minds <sup>of</sup> of the Indians against  
 our people in order to obtain their friendship and trade



~~So to exclude our own citizens.~~

It is not unlikely that many may have been committed by our own citizens on the persons of those Indians, & we too often hear nestle persons who, regardless of their own or others safety, commit acts of violence against all Indians with whom they come in contact. You will of course strive to remedy this, and when an injury has been done seek to redress the wrong, and in return demand on the part of the Indian such a reparation as the circumstances will seem to require for wrongs done by others.

It is my purpose during the coming season to enter into ~~if possible~~ conventional arrangements with all the Indian Tribes in this territory, for the extinguishment of their titles and their removal and colonization to proper districts, where they may be instructed in the arts of agriculture and civilization and with this view you will examine such portions of ~~good~~ the district ~~as you~~ as may hold out inducements for an Indian settlement. It will be very desirable if possible to locate them entirely remote from the settlements, and away from the thoroughfares leading from the states, the Oregon California & Washington Territories and yet so convenient as to be accessible with a view of transporting their supplies of subsistence and merchandise. I have recently made an examination of the country around Ilameth Lake, and from the information derived from Indians of the country around Toquoo Lake and a stream emptying in from the East I am induced to believe this lake and stream and Ilameth a very desirable location for the Indians of this & upper valley, in addition to those now occupying the



this country, it is also very likely it may afford sufficient extent of agricultural land to gather in the adjacent bands of Diggers ~~bordering~~ to the East of them. The altitude of that district is one of perhaps the greatest obstacle in the way of such a settlement and yet with proper improvement it may be less objectional than lower districts. It is desirable that the numerous small bands scattered over the country should be congregated - and the greatest possible number assembled in one district. thus avoiding the necessity of so great a number of Agents, former mechanics - teachers &c. Before any definite plan can be adopted, it is important <sup>that we</sup> ascertain accurately the number of men, women, & children, in the respective ~~districts~~ <sup>tribes</sup>. This will be one of your first object - and advise me from time to time as you may progress, giving such other information as ~~may~~ <sup>be</sup> in your judgment may be useful. No enumeration has been made of the number from the eastern boundary of county claimed by the Indians, by which we can ~~only~~ <sup>by any means</sup> ~~approximate~~ <sup>as exact</sup> and the estimate given in my annual report, a copy of which is hereto inclosed, may prove very erroneous.

You will advise me at the earliest moment of the condition of affairs in your district - and set forth the kind and quantity of supplies necessary to enable you to act efficiently - as well as the time needed. A bond which you are requested to cause sealed up and signed is herewith forwarded and should there be no person ~~so~~ <sup>so</sup> legally authorized to administer the oath of office you will call an agent Thompson who will administer the requisite oath. and then transmit the duly attested certificate of sufficiency of security - with instructions to forward to this office
