

Washington D.C. April 27th 1852.

Dr Sir

I herewith enclose to you a copy of forms and instructions for the preparation of Claims for Bounty Land and Pensions: for the purpose of asking your Co-operation with me in the business at which I am engaged.

There are doubtless many persons in your neighborhood entitled to Bounty Land under the Act of Sept 1850, or the recent Act of March last, who have not yet made application, and also those having other, and larger claims against the General Government and who, if made acquainted with the fact, would avail themselves of the services of some competent person in the adjustment of them.

I am desirous of connecting myself with a gentleman of the Legal profession in your section of Country, knowing that a connection of this kind proves highly advantageous to all concerned for, in the adjustment of claims of an official character difficulties frequently occur requiring personal interviews with the parties most interested as well as prompt and vigorous action by Atty. at the seat of Government, by which arrangement, vexatious delays and a lengthened correspondence may be avoided, and applicants obtain a far speedier adjustment of their demands.

My fees for obtaining Land Warrants, when the claims are received from Atty. abroad, are \$5. for those of 160 Acres, and \$2½ for those of 80 or 40 Acres. When the claim is originally presented by me, no charge is made until the warrant ^{is issued.}

If you decline this correspondence, will you please hand this to some respectable person in your County, whom you suppose to be interested in the subject matter—
