[Text] The Judaea and Samaria Civilian Administration announced today that two residents of Shuwaykah who died several days ago were hit by a Molotov cocktail and not by IDF fire. Our correspondent Arye Gus states that according to a pathological report, pieces of a firebomb were found in the vehicle that the two were travelling in. Security forces are looking for the person who threw the bomb. All the village men were gathered in the local school yesterday for identification and investigation.

Last night, two Molotov cocktails were hurled at a bus in the village, wounding a young girl who was transferred to the hospital.

A curfew was placed on the Al-Duhayshah refugee camp near Bethlehem at noon because of disturbances, our correspondent Arye Gus reports.

There were disturbances and stone throwing incidents in other areas of Judaea and Samaria. Stones smashed the windshield of a bus in Qalqilyah. There was a symbolic funeral in the Nur al-Shams refugee camp near Tulkarm for Abu Jihad [Khalil al-Wazir], as well as stone throwing incidents.

There is a full strike in the Gaza Strip today, and several disturbances were reported. There were also several incidents in Jerusalem.

## Leaflet No 17 Detailed

[Excerpts] In the Gaza district it was relatively quiet this morning. From Gaza, reporter Steve Rodan says there were some disturbances but no serious clashes:

[Begin recording] Leaflet No 17 calls for a general strike and the slogans on the wall call for violence, but so far the 650,000 residents of the Gaza Strip are marking the 40th day of the assassination of PLO leader Khalil al-Wazir in relative calm. There are incidents of stone throwing and burning of tires, especially in Rafah, but military sources do not report any serious clashes with soldiers or injuries. [passage omitted]

Few Arab laborers left the Strip to their jobs in Israel this morning, most stores are closed, and there are virtually no Gaza motorists on the roads. But the memorial for Khalil al-Wazir, who grew up in Gaza City, was far more quiet then expected. Most Arab workers arrived to their jobs at the Civilian Administration, schools are open,

and there are again long lines of Gaza residents waiting to receive their new identity cards. But the day is still young, and security forces know it. This is Steve rodan in Gaza City. [end recording]

There was a full commercial strike in Judaea and Samaria today to mark the 40th day after the assassination of Abu Jihad [Khalil al-Wazir]. The strike was called by extremist organizations in the territories and the so-called united national leadership in leaflet No 17. However, studies at schools went on normally and attendance was very high. Public transportation is operating and Arabs working in Israel went to their jobs.

Poll Shows Right Strengthening, Left Weakening TA1305151988 Tel Aviv YEDI'OT AHARONOT in Hebrew 13 May 88 p A1

[Text] A strengthening of the right-wing bloc versus a weakening of the left-wing bloc emerged in last week's Dahaf Institute election poll directed by Dr Mina Tzemah.

A comparison with the April poll shows the Likud up slightly, and Tehiya, Citizens' Rights Movement [CRM], and the Liberal Center, down. The Labor Party maintained its stability at the top of the list.

Another interesting finding is that the "floating votes" (those who are undecided) represent about 20 percent of those polled.

The poll was conducted during the first week of May on a representative sample of 1,210 people who were individually interviewed. The poll did not include the Arab sector, and therefore the figures for the parties with a majority of Arab support should be viewed cautiously.

The question asked was: If elections were held today, who would you vote for? (The answers are quoted in Knesset seats. The results of the April poll are in brackets.)

The results show that 20 percent of those polled are undecided. An analysis of the "floating votes" indicates that about 25 percent tend to favor the right wing, while 20 percent tend to support the left. A similar tendency exists among youngsters who were not eligible voters in the previous elections.
