The expression "demiliterization" (or "demiliterized zone") does not possess a precise definition in international law though as it appears in several international treation it obviously has some legal definition. Organicim (paragraph 72) defines demilitarization as "The agreement of two or more States by treaty not to fortify, or station troops upon, a particular zone of territory; the purpose usually being to prevent war by removing the opportunity of conflict as a result of frontier incidents, or to gain security by prohibiting the concentration of troops on a frontier."

He warms, cuite correctly, against confusing demilitarization with neutralization and internationalization.

In the late 20's the beague of Metions also devoted some attention to the question of demilitarization and the possibility of using this device as a means of increasing international security. The following passage appears in a teport by the Greek statesman, M. Politis, published on proce 490 or the seconds of the Flenary Meeting of the Ninth "seembly or the League of Nations:

"... as regards the establishment of demilitarised zones, it was recognised that, while they are often capable of giving the nations concerned a greater sense of security, this is not always the case. Here again, all depends on circumstances. If the contracting parties or some of them consider it useful to establish such gones on their frontiers, they may do so by means of special conventions.

During the discussion before the Third committee, it was suggested that it might be well for the Preparatory Commission for the Disarmament Conference or the Committee on roitration and Security, to draw up model regulations for deadlithrised zones. Such a model might no doubt greatly facilitate negotiations between States who were prepared to establish a zone or zones along their frontiers. In the proceedings of the Inter-Parliamentary Union we already possess interesting suggestions in this connection, in partioular, a preliminary draft of General degulations" for demilitarised zones, voted by the Union at its conference at dashington in 1925."
