#### A NOTE FROM THE PRESIDENT

If you have been looking for your March issue of Water International (WIN), don't blame your postal carrier for its loss. Due to unforeseen circumstances, the issue was delayed and was finally mailed on 17 May 1995. The June issue likely will be delayed as well. We applicate for the inconvenience.

I am pleased to announce that Prof. F. Lee Brown of the Department of Economics at the University of New Mexico, Albuquerque, NM, has been appointed IWRA Executive Director, effective 1 July 1995. A detailed biography will appear in the June 1995 issue of WIN. All the membership files, record keeping, organizing of meetings, editing of UPDATE and other business functions will be transferred to New Mexico in mid-July

If you plan to attend the IUGG meetings in Boulder, CO, USA from 2-13 July, you are invited to join an ad hoc meeting of IWRA officers to meet Executive Director Lee Brown. The meeting, which will be hosted by Gilbert F. White, will be held from 9 am-3 pm July 9 at the Natural Hazard Center. WIN Editor Bhowmik and I will be present to discuss and develop strategies for enhancement of IWRA's mission during the next three years.

I attended the Interim Founding Committee of the World Water Council (WWC) in Montreal on 31 March-1 April, chaired by Past President M. Abu-Zeid. Preliminary strategies for the operation and management of a WWC were developed and been circulated for comments and enlistment of sponsors. WWC membership is open to individuals and institutions who would serve in a "think tank" mode. WWC could become a leading institution to enhance the management of global water resources. IWRA recently became a partner in a dialogue between institutions in North and South America to expand interactions on water-related issues, transboundary water management activities, etc. The Organization of American States (OAS) has been asked to provide the Secretariat to coordinate various functions. Argentina has offered to host a technical conference in April, 1996. Again, watch WIN for details as they develop.

I just returned from Bangladesh where I attended a seminar on "Comparative Evaluation of Flood Control Approaches for Bangladesh and Mississippi River." Management of floods to mitigate damages in Bangladesh is almost an impossible task.

I would like to meet any IWRA member who might be present at the CWRA conference on 20-23 June in Canada; at IUGG in Boulder, CO on 9 July; Stockholm Water Symposium on 13-18 August; Radar Conference in Sao Paulo, Brazil on 20-23 August; or Bari, Italy on 16-18 September.

Several members still have failed to pay their 1995 dues. Please do so promptly so we might complete the processing before transferring the financial records to New Mexico. The University of Illinois has authorized the continued use of office space for the IWRA President in Urbana, Illinois. A directory of membership as of 15 May 1995 has been printed. #### STOCKHOLM WATER PRIZE AWARDED

WaterAid, a practical charity based in Great Britain, is the recipient of the Stockholm Water Prize for 1995. The prize, which amounts to US \$150,000, was awarded for bringing water and sanitation facilities to over three million people in the world's poorest countries. Alf Goran, chairman of the Stockholm Water Prize Nominating Committee, called WaterAid "...a standard bearer for all non-governmental organizations in the water and sanitation sector."

WaterAid was established in 1981 following a conference entitled "Thirsty Third World," held in London. It's goals were to target some of the world's poorest people, to instigate programs of self-help where drinking water, sanitation and health education were to be regarded as integral parts, to provide low-cost simple programs and highlight sustainability and replication.

The Stockholm Water Prize is awarded annually to an individual or organization in recognition of outstanding contributions in the field of water conservation. It will be awarded on 17 August 1995 during the Stockholm Water Festival. IWRA was recently selected to serve on the nominating committee for the Stockholm Water Prize.

#### WATER: A TRIGGER FOR CONFLICT; A REASON FOR COOPERATION

The Indiana Center for Global Change and World Peace is sponsoring a conference entitled, "Water: A Trigger for Conflict; A Reason for Cooperation." The conference will be held from 7-10 March 1996 on the campus of Indiana University, Bloomington, IN, USA and will focus primarily on the international aspects of water resources.

#### DAM SAFETY EVALUATION

The Second International Conference on Dam Safety Evaluation will be held from 26-30 November 1996 in Trivandrum, India. The conference is being organized by the Central Board of Irrigation and Power and the Committee for International Commission on Large Dams, India (ICOLD).

Papers are being solicited in the areas of dam safety with emphasis on: review of design and investigation data; rehabilitation of dams in distress, evaluation of spillways and strengthening structures; remedial and rehabilitation measures for arresting excess leaching and seepage; automation of flood warning systems; instrumentation of existing dams; seismic aspects of dam safety; hydrological safety of dams; case studies; research needs in dam safety and dam safety legislations.

#### WORLD WATER DAY

UNESCO has marked 22 March as World Water Day, a day to call international attention to the importance of water in its many uses.

This year the day was celebrated in many countries. A four-day celebration, with public awareness programs on Water & Technology, Water & Administration, Water & Health, Woman & Water and Water & Disasters was held held in four cities in Italy. The IWRA National Chinese Committee distributed tie pins marking the occasion. CIDA (Canada) celebrated the day with the preparation of a pamphlet titled "Water: Global Needs for the 21st Century," drawing attention to the lack of access to proper water and sanitation among the rural poor, despite the fact that 1.3 billion people have been provided with clean water in the last decade. Oman published special newpaper articles on water conservation.

#### USGS CELEBRATES 100TH ANNIVERSARY

1995 marks the 100th year of cooperative water resources investigations between the U.S. Geological Survey and state and local governments. The cooperative effort has provided the United States with an infrastructure of water data collection stations that contribute to various objectives.

A small Kansas program born in 1895 to measure the water flow of six rivers grew into the nation's largest cooperative effort to measure water resources. Now the agency monitors surface water and ground water quantity and quality at more than 40,000 sites.

Federal-state cooperative information has led to better operation of reservoir systems for water supply, flood control and hydroelectric power; development of new water supplies; flood forecasting and warning; floodplain management programs; addressing inter- and intra-state water rights; and determination of the effect of agricultural chemicals, urban storm water runoff and solid wastes on water quality.

The importance of continuity of data collection is evident in the successful growth of the Survey, as it is for any data collection agency. The United Kingdom uses volunteers to collect rainfall data for the Queen. Long term records have been kept in India and China. The United States was once a developing nation, and had to learn to keep long term records. Today's developing nations would do well to consider doing the same.
