14 Envelopes, containing material about 14 Shrines.

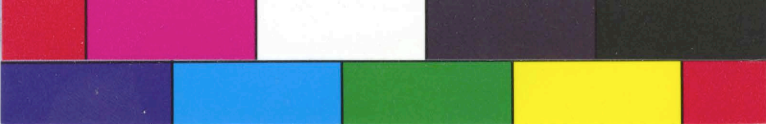
