DEATH CLAIMS JOHN F. BASS

Famous Correspondent Is Victim of Pneumonia; Here Five Months

John Foster Bass, famous war correspondent since 1895 and brother of a former governor of New Hampshire, is dead, a victim of pneumonia. Mr. Bass came to Tucson with his widow, Mrs. Ebba Bass, five months ago. The body will be sent to Chicago, Ill., where funeral services and burial will be conducted.

The death of Mr. Bass brought to an end the career of one of the most widely known war correspondents. He started in 1895 when he was in Egypt with the English and Cretan insurrection and his career in that capacity continued until 1918.

Mr. Bass was born in Chicago in 1866. He graduated from Harvard University in 1891 and was admitted to the New York bar in 1894. One year later, he was in Egypt and in 1896 he went across Armenia at the time of the massacre. Mr. Bass "covered" the Cretan rebellion and Greek war in 1897 and the Spanish-American war in 1898.
