My dear Gertrude:

I received your letter of the 7th instant enclosing a copy of your letter of the same date addressed to George, Jr.

George came to the office and I gave him your letter, which he read and made several comments about it and apparently was not very happy in not receiving some more money.

When he was in the office before he mentioned the fact that some of his receipts for money received were not satisfactory and he would be glad to give a blanket receipt for all money which he had received from you through me. I did not care to take a blanket receipt so I got up a statement showing each payment and their date from January 2, 1923 (which appears to be the first date at which I started sending him money) to August 22, 1934, consisting of ninety-nine (99) items and a total of \$27,815.00. I took the receipt in duplicate and am sending a duplicate receipt to you and retaining the original for my files. I gave George a copy of the receipt.

I also handed him the document in triplicate which you sent to me and stated to him that you would like to have him sign them and, after reading it, he stated that inasmuch as he had not seen the report he did not see how he could approve of the report and he would like to take it over and talk with Mr. Edmonds. I called up Mr. Edmonds and made an appointment for George and I am told by Mr. Edmonds that George did go there and he did sign the paper in triplicate, which was an appearance in the Probate Court approving of Mr. Edmonds' Final Account as Executor of the Estate of Clara F. Bass.
