My dear Perkins:

I have just received a letter from Sam in which he says:

"I am writing Harry to pay your income taxes if he has sufficient funds, and if not to let me know and I shall pay them; to be reimbursed when you are in funds.

I have written Harry to attend to your Massachusetts and Federal income tax returns. Please send him the necessary information, especially about gifts."

I have also received a letter from you, Perkins, in which you suggest that our friends The Illinois Continental Bank and Trust Company make out my income tax returns. I prefer that Mr. Edmonds should make it out. Some time back I sent you the list of my gifts. Please turn these over to Mr. Edmonds. If by any chance you have already sent them over to the Illinois Continental Bank and Trust Company please write and tell Sam about it. Of course it is very important to keep on perfectly friendly terms with the members of the bank.

That very small piece of residential property located in the outskirts of Eugene I have turned over to the University as a gift to the Museum toward keeping up the collection. As I have just made this transfer I will ask Mr. Bryson for description of the property, and when I get it I will send the description to Mr. Edmonds.

By the way, Sam writes me Mr. Edmonds is taking a ten-day rest and will not be back until February 25. I notice in a copy of Sam's letter to Mr. Bryson that he has sent me, in speaking of Mr. Edmonds he says to Mr. Bryson, "I shall be obliged if you will send him the necessary forms and information so that he and you can make out my mother's Oregon and Federal tax returns."

I note that Sam has written Mr. Miller, Income Tax Division, 40 Court Street, Boston, asking for an extension of time until March 15 to file my income tax returns, and Mr. Bryson here has also asked for an extension of time. I believe the State tax is to be paid here, including income received up to May 15, 1934. From that time on it is to be paid in Massachusetts.

I have written you all this as I would like you to understand the situation.
