Time To Apply For 5087 Century Farm Status

The Oregon Historical Society and the Baker County Historical Society are looking for unregistered Baker County Farms and properties which have been owned and operated by the same family for 100 years or more—before or since 1895).

To be eligible for the Century Farm Award, a farm must have been operated continuously in the same family. If the farm was ever rented out, it will not qualify. The applicant must own the farm, live on the farm and the land, or actively manage the farming if living away from the ancestral place.

The line of ownership from the original settler or buyer may be through children, brothers, sisters, nephews or nieces. Adopted children will be recognized equally with blood children. The farm must have no less than 10 acres with a gross income from the farm uses not less than \$500 per year for three out of five years immediately preceding application for Century Farm honors.

Any farm in the process of being sold to a non-relative of the owner is ineligible. Applications must be made on blanks provided by the Oregon Historical Society. These blanks are available in Baker City at the Oregon Trail Regional Museum.

Although the deadline for the applications to be mailed into the Oregon Historical Society in Portland is May 1, 1995, "Now is the time to start the homework to assure not being disappointed because of lack of needed information." Don't wait until the last minute to do the paper work.

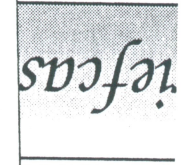
