SALEM (Special) - Century Farms will be honored again this year when Oregon State Fair observes its own century run, Aug. 29- Sept. 6.

Announcement was made jointly today by J.F.Short, director of agriculture, and Howard Maple, manager of the Oregon State Fair. Thomas Vaughn, Oregon Historical Society director will assist in the program.

Century Farms were honored at the 1958 through 1960 Oregon State Fairs.

Engible to the Century Farm program- a farm must have been owned and operated continously in the same family for 100 years or more. By the end of the 1960 program 416 Century Farms had been recognized.

Application blanks and rules for Century Farm honors can be had from the State Department of Agriculture at Salem.

RULES FOR 1965 CENTURY FARM PROGRAM

Sponsored Jointly by

OREGON HISTORICAL SOCIETY AND STATE DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE

Application blanks are available from the State Department of Agriculture, Agriculture Building, Salem, Oregon, 97310, and must be returned, with verification, to the Department at Salem.

To qualify, these requirements must be met:

- 1. Your farm must have been operated continuously in the same family for one hundred years or more (since 1865). If the farm has ever been rented it will not qualify.
- 2. You must own the farm and must reside in Oregon.
- 3. You must live on the farm and farm the land or, if you live off the historic farm, you must actively manage and direct the farming of the land.
- 4. The line of ownership from the original settler or buyer may be through children, brothers and sisters, nephews and nieces. Adopted children will be recognized equally with blood children.
- 5. Only one person--the 1965 owner of record--will receive the coveted Century Farm Award. If husband and wife own, the award will be made to them jointly.
- 6. A farm settled any time in the year 1865 (or earlier) will be eligible if it meets the other requirements.
- 7. Deadline for filing applications is June 15, 1965. All applications bearing postmark by midnight of that date will be considered.
- 8. Application must be on blanks provided by the Department, with all questions answered. The applicant may submit as much additional information as he or she desires. (All information will eventually be deposited with the Oregon Historical Society, which provides the beautiful Century Farm document.)
- 9. Print all names and addresses appearing on the application blank.
- 10. Applicants must submit with their completed application blanks a verification of their claims to continuous ownership. This may be in the form of the signature of one of your county commissioners or your county recorder on the form "A" which is supplied with the application blank.
- ll. No notary is required. Submission of supporting documents to substantiate the application is encouraged and will, if you wish, be filed with Oregon Historical Society for preservation.
- 12. A farm (U.S. Census definition) must have 10 or more acres with crop or livestock sales of \$50 or more a year; or, if less than 10 acres, sales of at least \$250 a year.
 - Any farm in process of being sold to a non-relative is ineligible.

U.S. Census Definition of a Farm: 10 acres or more with agricultural sales of \$50 or more a year; or, if less than 10 acres, sales of at least \$250 a year.
