## 85 Oregon farm families join coveted Century Farms rolls

whose farms have been worked by the same family for 100 years or more have been included on the roll of Century Farms by the Oregon Historical Society, an honor granted only once every five years.

The total number of farms now designated as Century Farms is about 900, said Thomas Vaughan, executive director of the society.

The program was started in 1958, before the Oregon Centennial in 1959. It is an honor for farmers, who receive a Century Farm sign to display on their property. Presentations of the awards certificates are to be made in ceremonies in the various counties.

To be eligible, a farm has to have been operated continuously in the same family for a century or more. Farms which have been rented out don't qualify, and the applicant must own, live upon and farm the land, or actively manage the farming if he or she lives off the ancestral place.

In addition, the farm must have not less than 10 acres with a gross income from farm uses not less than \$500 annually for three out of the five years immediately preceding the application for designation. Farms in the process of being sold to non-relatives also are ineligible.

"Seldom in American history has the so-called family farm been as threatened by economic and social pressures as it is today," Vaughan said. "The dwindling number of small farms makes those that survive even more precious to the farm family and the community."

Among the 85 to join the list this year were 10 Morrow County farms. Umatilla County was second with nine and Washington County was third with eight new Century Farms. Twenty-four of the state's 36 counties are represented this year.

The Doerfler family of Marion County was among them. Their family farm of about 230 acres in the rolling hills south of Silverton was founded in 1877 by Martin Doerfler, who came to America from Austria in 1867 and lived on another nearby farm until buying the home place 10 years later.

As many of the Doerflers as possible gathered Thursday during their busiest season of the year for a family picture in front of the 1880-era house with the gingerbread designs over the front porch. Four generations showed up,

arriving in pickups, cars, combines and, in the case of the youngest, a kid-

David A. Doerfler owns and operates the farm now, with his wife, Rita, and children. They live up the hill from the original place. Doerfler's sister, Shirley Doerfler Duerst, and her husband. John, and their boys live in the old house, which has been enlarged and restored over the years. David and Shirley's mother, Alice Doerfler, also live nearby.

Wheat and oats were among the crops grown by the farm founder, and still are cultivated by his descendants today. But the emphasis on crops has changed over the years, too.

Doerfler's mainstay is fine fescue, grass seed used for lawns and turf. He still has "a fair amount of wheat" and grows oats for the California horse market. He also cultivates sugar beets for seed under contract with Great

Western Sugar Co. and started experimenting with a new crop, meadowfoam, last year. From last year's 20 acres. Doerfler has expanded to 140 acres of the meadowfoam seed from which oils for cosmetics and specialty products are extracted.

With that amount of diversification, the Doerflers are managing to smooth out the bumps of the recession in agriculture. They've dealt with the same bank, Salem's Ladd and Bush U.S.

National branch, since David Doerfler's grandfather opened an account there decades ago.

Generally, though, Doerfler said, "things are fairly tough. We've been here awhile, so we inherited some ground. But we have bought some, too. So financially, it's tough. We owe the bank, but we pay the bills."
