16 Century Farms precious to area

Family farm owners must apply for Century Farm Awards before May 1 — or wait five years for the next chance.


According to Elizabeth Buenier, Oregon Historical Society field historian, 25 Silverton and Mt. Angel area family farms have been so honored in the past.

16 of the farms still qualify for

Buehler wrote that Century Farms must have not less than 10 acres with a gross income from farm uses not less than \$500 per year for three out of the five years immediately preceding application. Any farm in the process of being sold to a non-relative of the owner will be ineligible.

THE SUSIE and BOB RICHES FARM at 13166 Riches Rd. is an operation that has been in the family since 1847-48.

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In addition, some farm families may have never applied for the designation, or have become eligible since the society last named century farms in 1980.

The program to designate farms that have been worked by the same family for 100 years or more was begun by the society in 1958 on the eve of Oregon's centennial celebration in 1959. To date, more than 800 farms in the state have been honored.

"Seldom in American history has the so-called family farm been as threatened by economic and social pressures as it is today," Thomas Vaughan, society executive director, said in a news release. "The dwindling number of small farms makes those that survive even more precious to the farm family and the community.

"We want to encourage those who may be eligible for this coveted Century Farm Award to come forward proudly and be recognized. The preservation of historic properties is one of the responsibilities of our society, and the first requirement is to know where those treasures lie."

To be eligible for the award, a farm must have been operated continuously in the same family for a century or more, Buehler said. If the farm ever has been rented out, it will not qualify.

The award applicant must own the farm. He must live on and farm the land, or actively manage the farming if living away from the ancestral place. The line of ownership from the original settler or buyer may be through children, brothers, sisters, nephews, and/or nieces, Buehler said. Adopted children will be recognized equally with blood children.

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The society will work with county historical societies and other interested groups to arrange the presentations of the awards, usually at county fairs, Buehler said. Owners of century farms will have an opportunity to purchase a \$45 metal roadside sign from the society.


