"We plan to make our headquar-ters on Admiralty island and operate from there on the Westward into the inlets along the Alaskan coast where this huge brown bear-largest of all flesh-eating animals-comes to catch salmon in July and August. "We believe we will get some ex-cellent motion pictures of these fierce beasts, as well as good pictures of whales in Alaskan waters-for it is believed this summer will be most op-portune for whaling activities." About 10,000 feet of motion picture film will be taken along, said Mr. Fin-ley. Asked if it was not dangerous to attempt motion pictures of the bears, Mr. Finley said that if one doesn't "bother" the bears they are not like-ly to bother in return.
