Graduate Will Speak Tonight On Wild Life

Lecture to Be Illustrated With Motion Pictures of Western Animals

Close-up motion pictures of birds and animals which are seldom seen, will be shown in "Getting Personal with Mountain Lions", an illustrated lecture by William L. Finley '03, to be held at 8 p. m. tonight in Wheeler auditorium.

His new picture and lecture is the result of several expeditions with Arthur N. Pack, president of the American Nature association, into little-known regions of Utah, Colorado, Arizona and New Mexico. Several thrilling adventures while photographing lions will be related during the lecture.

William L. Finley, Noted Naturalist Is Visitor in S. R Santa Rosa Press Denne

William L. Finley, noted natural, ist, author, and lecturer on wildlife, visited in Santa Rosa yesterday and spent last night with relatives here. Finley, former president of the American Audubon Society, has just returned from a lec-

ture tour in the east.

The naturalist resides at Jennings Lodge, near Portland, Oregon, but is in this part of the state for a series of lectures at the University of California and Stanford. Today he will deliver a talk on his experiences before the Pacific Union College in St. Helena. Finley is one of the outstanding leaders in his work in the country and has gained a nation-wide reputation for his books on wild life subjects. He accompanied Theo-

dore Roosevelt on his expedition

into Africa and has written several stories on the trip.
