Finley Lectures
Nature Magazine Jan. 1934
Choosing the alliterative title of "Birds, Bergs and Kodiak Bears" as the title of one of his 1933-34 lectures, William L. Finley will bring his famous wild life motion pictures east again this winter on his annual tour. His lectures and the splendid pictures are of particular interest to the readers of NATURE MAGAZINE since some of the experiences connected with obtaining the films have been told in the magazine by Arthur Newton Pack, President of the American Nature Association. In addition to the aforementioned lecture, Mr. Finley also has available his films and lecture entitled "Camera Hunting on the Continental Divide" and "Getting Personal with Mountain Lions". The first presents the spectacular mountain goat pictures, some of which were taken by Mr. Finley while himself disguised as a mountain goat, and the second tells the story of a thrilling camera hunt of a mountain lion in the southwest. In this last film Mr. Finley took pictures from a tree top with the treed lion in the next tree within easy jumping distance. All three of these lectures testify to the fearless work of the wild life photographer who is noted for thinking of the picture first and danger afterward.
