On December 18 the league will present "Pinocchio," under the direction of Larrae Haydon. This will be followed by two concerts by the Portland Symphony orchestra on January 15 and February 13. Willem van Hoogstraten will conduct the orchestra and will talk informally to the children about the music as he did last year. To bring to a close another year's series Tony Sarg and his marionettes will give several short plays on April 30.
