Finley Off on California

Speaking Tour
Mr. and Mrs. William L. Finley
will leave Portland Monday for California, where Finley, who is vice
president of the National Wild Life federation, is to present a series of motion pictures and lectures on "Woods, Waters and Wild Life." He will appear both at University of California at Berkeley and University of California at Los Angeles.

Finley will attend a meeting of the California Wild Life federation at Oakland, November 22; return for a meeting of the Washington federa-tion at Seattle, November 29, and at-tend the annual session of the Oregon federation at Corvallis, December 1 and 2.

Oregon is ahead of Washington and California in her conservation program according to Finley, who cited examples of the recent passage of the anti-pollution measure in the state and of sewage disposal plans approved in Portland and Eugene as forward steps.

Wild life enthusiasts in the three states plan to co-ordinate their efforts in furtherance of conservation

forts in furtherance of conservation measures for the sake of the tourist industry, which on the Pacific Coast amounts to about \$400,00,000 annually, Finley said.

Finley will leave for the East December 20 for a series of speaking engagements which will last till March 1. His lectures will deal largely with Oregon and her wild life resources. He will attend the National Wild Life federation meeting tional Wild Life federation meeting in Detroit, February 17.
