TILLAMOOK, July 27 (Special)—H. Abbott Lawrence of Portland was elected president of the Oregon council, Izaak Walton league, Saturday at the concluding business session of the 18th annual convention here.

Judge Harland M. Woods, Tillamook, was elected vice-president; Dr. David Charlton, Portland, secretary; J. Stanley Emery, Marshfield, Dr. T. A. Loar, Silverton; John B. Ebinger, Klamath Falls; Arthur I. Moulton, Portland; R. H. Gardner, Tillamook; Walter Johnson, Astoria, and Chester McCarty, Portland, directors.

### Proposals Gain Approval

Resolutions adopted included: Requesting appropriation of \$3000 of state funds to investigate an algae condition in the Columbia river detrimental to fish life; requesting congressional legislation to establish the maritime boundary of the United States at a point not less than 100 miles beyond the present maritime boundary in order that the commercial fisheries of Oregon, Washington and California can be controlled, as well as assisting in national defense and immigration control; requesting that the state game fund be used exclusively in conservation, preservation and propagation of wild life, that no part should be diverted for any purpose, and that the state police department should be supported from Oregon's general fund.

Requesting use of levees and revetments rather than high dams on the North and South forks of the Santiam, McKenzie and upper Willamette rivers in connection with the Willamette valley flood control project to preserve the natural chinook salmon spawning beds; requesting stricter control of mining interests on the Rogue river in order to abolish river sedimentation; commending the game commission for its steps taken in wild life research and investigation; commending the state sanitary authority for its excellent work toward relieving stream pollution although handicapped by limited funds; condolence to the family of S. M. Batterson of Nehalem, state fire warden, who died Saturday from injuries received in line of duty, and appreciation for his many years of activity in the interests of wild life.
