

well known in Oregon before he became chief of the biological survey in Washington, is coming to the state to be the principal visiting speaker at the annual Oregon Wild Life federation conference in Corvallis November 27-29. The name of the service headed by Dr. Gabrielson has been changed recently, so that he is now chief of the United States Fish and Wild Life service.

All citizens interested in wild life matters are invited to attend this year's conference, whether they represent any organization or not, says R. E. Dimick, head of the fish and game management department at Oregon State college, who is in charge of local arrangements.

William Smith, Portland, president of the federation, has arranged a program which he says will be of general interest. Among the problems listed for discussion are correction of stream pollution, the effect of flood control dams on fish life, recent advancements in wild life management, and proposed legislation affecting fish and game in this state.

The first two days of the conference will be devoted to general meetings, with the annual banquet the evening of Wednesday at which Gabrielson will speak. The final day will be devoted to committee meetings growing out of the conference.

Gabrielson will speak on trends of conservation and conservation problems. In another outstanding address of the day, Dr. William L. Finley, vice president of the national wildlife federation, will speak on dams of the Willamette river.

Sessions of the convention will be held in room 105 of the Memorial Union building.
