



OSBURN HOTEL

June 25th, 1933.

Dear Sam:

I reached Eugene early this morning. Mable, the hotel porter and the taxi driver were at the station to meet me.

Among the mail that had accumulated for me here was an envelope from the International Mercantile Co. After going over the folder to see how much the tickets were I wrote a check for \$606.00 and since writing the check I have discovered that the amount is the minimum rate. When you let me know how much I owe on them, I will turn it over to you.

It seems to me probable that you are in Chicago today while the appraising of Bamby's property is going on. If you are there I hope that it is not billing hot.

My plan is to leave here on Monday July third reaching Chicago Thursday morning July sixth. I had a letter from your uncle Robert asking me what my plans were and I have telegraphed him telling him that I will be in Chicago on Thursday and asking him if he would like to go over Bamby thing

things at that time, or would he prefer to do it in the Fall. Also asking if Abba should be there when we do it. The length of time that I stay in Chicago will depend on whether Robert is there and wants to work. If he is not I will go twice to the World's Fair and then on to Cambridge to the Continental Hotel.

I have found my last passport and it is out of date but I have to turn it in to get a new one. Mabel not having been out of this country has not a passport, so that will be something to attend to as promptly as possible.

I am wondering what you and Helen are doing about passports. You might send me a letter care of Perkins B in Chicago giving me the latest news about yourself and what you are doing about your passports.

I will tell you about George when I see you.
