My dear Nancy:

Your letter arrived yesterday and I have telegraphed the Registrar at the University of California asking him for information about entrance examinations and non-resident tuition.

Here at the University of Oregon, students whose homes are not in the State of Oregon have to pay \$ 50 a term (there are three terms in the school year) non-resident fee, besides the other fees which amount to between \$ 40 and \$60 a term. Neither of these include board and room which is \$ 40 a month and more.

As to comparing the schools of journalism in the two Universities, I would not know whether one was any better than the other, but in general it is better to go to a University in the state where you expect to live, so as to take advantage of your contacts made at the University.

Eugene is a town of 20,000 inhabitants and the University has around 3,000 students. The University of California is in a good size city and is close to Oakland and San Francisco. Therefore students from Berkeley, Oakland, and San Francisco and other surrounding districts and they have about 10,000 students at the University. The newspapers of these different cities are within reach of the University and the contacts with the people engaged in work on these papers are near at hand. For instance presumably the Associated Press and the United Press have branch offices there. In this way, when you had finished college, you would have had an opportunity to know these people, which would be a great advantage to you

if you expect to live in California or the Orient.

Through the Registrar's office here, we found out that the University of California charges a non-resident fee of \$ 75.00 per semester and they have two semesters, so the non-resident fee is the same in both Universities . However I wanted to make sure that there were no exceptions, so I telegraphed to California.

Of course I would like to have you here where I could see often, but from my point of view, I think the advantages for you would be greater at the University of California.

I am sending this letter off today and as soon as my answer comes from the University of California, I will send it on to you. The University of California starts the second week in September and the University of Oregon starts the third week in September.

If you go to the University of California, let me know your address and I shall hope to see you. If you come to the University of Oregon, be sure to let me know when you will be arriving.
