Dear Mr. President:

You will be pleased to find that your early suggestion, that some  
such device as the one I am sending be adopted, was well taken.  
This is the first of many more, which will be sent to you in  
the course of time, so far as possible, to facilitate the work of  
the Bureau of Standards. It is my opinion that such a  
device would be of great value in the examination of  
certain types of materials, and particularly in the  
examination of certain types of fibers, such as  
those of cotton, wool, silk, etc., and would be  
of great assistance in the detection of  
adulteration of such materials.

I am enclosing a copy of the one I have  
on hand. I have made up the first few  
models, and will send you the rest as soon as  
I can get them made. I hope to have
