Dear Mrs. Warner:

Because of your decided interest in furthering American-Oriental relations, as expressed on the University of Oregon campus by the Art Museum and the annual essay contest bearing your name, I take the liberty of requesting your aid.

There is at the present time a delegation of four Japanese students in the United States, here for the purpose of promoting an American-Japanese student council to be held in Tokyo this summer. The purpose of this conference is to promote good will between the two nations. It is believed that a better understanding can be attained if representatives of American colleges and Universities can meet with the Japanese representatives, and in the ensuing conference exchange social, economic, and philosophic ideas.

The conference is being sponsored by the Japanese-English Student Association in Japan, and it is hoped that fifty Americans will attend the conference as representatives of their various schools. Once in Japan, the association will pay for all expenses of the visiting delegates during their six week's stay. This includes meals, housing, and transportation thru Japan, Korea, and Manchuria. The actual conference is to be held in Tokyo from July 19 to 26.

At the request of Kenzo Endo and Edwin Tabata, the two Japanese students who extended the invitation for our attendance to the conference, a committee composed of Karl Orthenk, Professor Victor Morris, and Dean Hoyt was to select the four students from this university who, in the opinion of the committee, would be best qualified to represent the University at this conference. I am one of those students selected by this committee.

It will be necessary for each individual delegate to pay for his own round trip fare to and from Japan, and for whatever incidental expenses he should incur while in Japan. This will total approximately three hundred dollars, which also includes a fifteen dollar registration fee. I have one hundred dollars, but it will be necessary for me to obtain another two hundred dollars before I can go. Actual student scholarships do not apply to extra curricular activities of this kind, so I can not obtain that amount from one of those sources.

The request I wish to make of you is that you lend me two hundred dollars, purely on a business basis. That amount, added to what I now have, would see me to the convention and back, and still enable me to attend the University next fall. I am a sophomore in Business Administration, and have two more years to complete in the University. My income from home is very small, and I make up the difference in my expenses by working here at school.

When I graduate from school, I have a position assured me with Miller-Bryant-Pierce, carbon paper manufacturers. In this respect, and for a character reference, I refer you to Mr. Dan E. Pousette, Miller-Bryant-Pierce, Portland, Oregon. May I also refer you to Professor Victor Morris and Dean Hoyt, both of the University of Oregon.

I should like to borrow the money on a scholarship basis, payable one year after graduation, or June 1, 1927. Would you be interested in making such a loan to me?

The boat the other delegates are going to take leaves Seattle June 29, and arrives in Japan four days before the conference. So I would appreciate a prompt reply.

I will remain in Eugene until the eleventh of June, after which time my address will be 3629 N.E. Fremont Street, Portland, Oregon.

At the request of Mrs. Rita and Mrs. Morris, the two women whom who planned the delegation for me, I would like to add a few more details concerning our trip. First, we will leave San Francisco on June 25th, and arrive in Japan June 29th. We will stay at the Hotel Okura, Tokyo, for the duration of the conference. The cost of our room will be approximately \$12.00 per day.

We will be staying in the same hotel during our stay in Japan, except very briefly in Kyoto and for short periods of time in Nanking, Shanghai, and Hong Kong. This will mean considerable travel and expense. I am not sure if we will be able to afford a return ticket to America. I am not worried about this, but I am worried about getting back to America without having to pay all the expenses of getting there. As I am not certain what amount I can expect to receive upon return of this trip, so I am not certain what amount I can expect to receive upon return.

The delegation which I am a part of will be kept up to date by frequent telegrams from Washington Bureau. Most probably, when we reach a conference, we will be the only Americans in both, and will, I hope, be granted the right to speak in each field. I am a specialist in Japanese Education, especially, and have the most reason to participate in our delegation. We hope to have a good meeting and I hope all the information being requested by our delegation will be received.
