Dear Mrs. Warner:

Because of your decided interest in furthering American-Oriental relations, as expressed on the University of Oregon campus by the Art Museum and the annual essay contest bearing your name, I take the liberty of requesting your aid.

There is at the present time a delegation of four Japanese students in the United States, here for the purpose of promoting an American-Japanese student council to be held in Tokyo this summer. The purpose of this conference is to promote good will between the two nations. It is believed that a better understanding can be obtained if representatives of American colleges and Universities can meet with like Japanese representatives, and in the ensuing conference exchange social, economic, and philosophic ideas.

The conference is being sponsored by the Japanese-English Student Association in Japan, and it is hoped that fifty Americans will attend the conference as representatives of their various schools. Once in Japan, the association will pay for all expenses of the visiting delegates during their six week's stay. This includes meals, housing, and transportation thru Japan, Korea, and Manchuria. The actual conference is to be held in Tokyo from July 19 to 26.

At the request of Kuroo Ino and Etsuin Tebata, the two Japanese students who extended the invitation for our attendance to the conference, a committee composed of Earl Outhank, Professor Victor Morris, and Dean Hoyt was to select the four students from this university who, in the opinion of the committee, would be best qualified to represent the University at this conference. I am one of those students selected by this committee.

It will be necessary for each individual delegate to pay for his own round trip fare to and from Japan, and for whatever incidental expenses he should incur while in Japan. This will total approximately three hundred dollars, which also includes a fifteen dollar registration fee. I have one hundred dollars, but it will be necessary for me to obtain another two hundred dollars before I can go. Actual student scholarships do not apply to extra curricular activities of this kind, so I can not obtain that amount from one of those sources.

The request I wish to make of you is that you loan me two hundred dollars, purely on a business basis. That amount, added to what I now have, would see me to the convention and back, and still enable me to attend the University next fall. I am a sophomore in Business Administration, and have two more years to complete in the University. My income from home is very small, and I make up the difference in my expenses by working here at school.
