the quietest case. They should not be unnecessarily shown. In rolling them up they must be firmly and lightly rolled up, the least slack breaks the rolls. The rolls should be rolled up evenly and firmly. When you have one that stands up - put one end of the roll against the top of a table. About four middle fingers (right or left, as it suits you) firmly on the top center part of the roll, grasp the roll around the middle with your full other hand. Now turn the roll with the full hand, tightening up the roll; four middle-fingers pressing the roll against the table, thus making the cone of the roll act as a pivot. If you do this every time, you will be able to tighten up the roll properly.
