Dear Mrs. Garner;

I was very sorry to learn of your husband's accident; hope his injuries are not severe, and that he will recover rapidly.

Yesterday, in accordance with your kind offer and our previous conversations, I took various cases and documents for storage at the Museum. They are of two types: (1) cases of my books for closed storage, to be added to boxes of my books previously stored there; (2) several cartons of various documents and publications of the US Occupation authorities in Japan and Korea. I wish to retain title to the latter, but if some serious student should appear who wished to make use of them, I wish he could have the opportunity. You kindly offered to make available an empty trunk for the storage of these latter materials. If it were possible I would be glad to have the cartons emptied into this trunk.

I believe the following statement is correct as to the number of boxes and other cases of my property now in storage at the Museum:


10 closed boxes of books and papers
1 open box of books
1 roped but unlocked trunk of books
2 roped but unlocked wicker baskets of books and papers
an uncounted number of open cartons of papers, documents, and publications of GHQ Tokyo and XXIV Corps Seoul, as mentioned above, for transfer to an empty trunk.
