Dear "Alumni" and Friends:

We greet you in the New Year with the final plans for the Seventh Cultural Expedition to the Orient, summer of 1933.

We will sail outward in two groups, each under a capable leader. Mr. Upton Close will probably go with the earlier group all the way to Manila. Both groups arrive in Shanghai harbor at the same time (extended Itinerary "B" group coming "east-bound" from Manila and Hong Kong). Then will follow the inland program in China, two weeks in Japan, with Manchuria and Korea in between if conditions justify.

The quotations this year are inclusive of the \$20.00 Library and Lecture Fee charged last year; so the only addition to the prices quoted is the \$5.00 U.S. Government tax on the steamship ticket, which we will bear on bookings made by April 1.

ITINERARY "A" -- Embark on the EMPRESS OF RUSSIA, Vancouver, B. C., July 1, debark in Shanghai, July 16, for one month of education and adventuring inland: Hangchow, Soochow, Nanking, Sacred Mount Tai, Tientsin, Peiping, (Manchuria-Korea, if possible); thence across the Yellow Sea to Japan for two weeks there: Beppu, Kobe Kyoto, Nara, Toba Peninsula, Karuizawa, Nikko, Kamakura, Tokyo, Yokohama, and aboard the EMPRESS OF JAPAN, August 18, for the homeward voyage, arriving in Vancouver August 29.

EXTENDED ITINERARY "B" -- Embark on the EMPRESS OF CANADA, Vancouver, June 17, to Hong Kong, Manila, and debark in Shanghai, July 16 (same date as the EMPRESS OF RUSSIA bringing members from Vancouver). The entire expedition will then travel together over the same inland itinerary outlined above and return also on the EMPRESS OF JAPAN from Yokohama, arriving in Vancouver on August 29.
