My dear Mrs. Warner:

This answer to your letter of some time ago has been delayed, pending our decisions relative to the house to be occupied by the International Club next year.

First, may I express appreciation for your very great generosity to the house for this coming year. The \$1000 toward the rent, and the furniture which you mention, together with lamps which Miss Perkins has spoken about to me since I received your letter, are most certainly a very generous gift to the organization. The boys who have been here and to whom I have mentioned your gift have certainly been enthusiastic over it and have taken on new interest.

As Mr. Onthank probably told you, it is our hope that the International Club will be made the center for nearly all of the activities of the University bearing on international relations and especially designed to foster better relations. We had hoped also to be able to carry on a much more extensive social program, in the entertainment of visiting consuls and others. The financial problem of this last year was a very difficult one. Your generosity in assisting in such a material way with the rent will make it possible for the other part of the program to be put through with very great success.

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Now, a word as to our arrangements for a house, which have been completed. A committee, consisting of Dean Gilbert, Dean Faville and myself, together with Arthur Markewitz (president of the house) made to decision, which meets with the most hearty approval of the boys who have been here during the summer. The house has excellent facilities for the meetings which we hope will be held there, also for the social functions in which we are interested.

Mr. Harold Young, a past president of the Alumni association in Portland, has been giving assistance in lining up some good support in Portland.

From every possible angle, the prospects are fine for the best possible year in International Club work and in the promotion of good-will and closer relations. We certainly appreciate your very large part in making this possible. I wish to have a conference with you as early as possible after your return to Eugene.
