My dear Dr Harada:

We miss you a lot here in the Museum and
wish that you were occupying this little office room of mine.

We have made some changes in the Japanese
exhibits, as we have placed the four statues at the further end

of the room where the Hideyoshi doll case was. The four statues
are in three cases and when we get a few more, I will send you
some photographs for your inspection and see what suggestions
you would make about the arrangement.

I am sending this draft sooner than I said

I would, because I shall be going to Portland the first week
in March and when I return, it will be spring vacation at the
University. I am planning to leave with Mabel Garner for the
East about April 1st. My mail is always forwarded to me, so I
have no difficulty in getting my letters.

I have heard from Elizabeth Keith, the Eng-
lish print artist, who is in London that she is expecting to
go to Japan this spring.

Two weeks ago Mr Barker was down here and
we spent three fourths of an hour admiring the Japanese
statues. Mr Zane has a class of 100, which he brings to the
Museum every Wednesday morning and another class of 40 which
he brings later in the day. I have many things that are not
good enough for display in the Museum and I have moved them

into a study collection. They consist of textiles, porcelains
and lacquer. Mr Zane likes to have these where his students
can handle and examine them closely. He is attempting to
teach this class of 100 that there are beautiful things in
Japanese art that they are not Museum pieces they can
be used in household decoration and they are within the
means of the ordinary pocket book. The class is called
"Art Appreciation".
Miss Kerns is using some of the same material
for her class to copy. Every year we have an exhibition for
the classes of the reproductions of Japanese paintings that
you left us and next fall we are planning a show of the modern
Japanese prints that you left us.
I wish I could express my gratitude to you
for what you are doing for me and all of us. If it should not
be a convenient time for you to send anything, do not let
that bother you, but just hold the things or money until it is.
