

MINUTES OF THE COMMITTEE ON ENTERTAINMENT OF MR.
JIRO HARADA

April 23, 1935

Present: Mrs. Warner, Mr. Barker, Mr. Bovard, Mr. Onthank.

Mr. Barker announced that Mr. Harada's name officially goes on the University staff as of September 23, 1935, but that the exact date of his arrival in Eugene is not yet known. There was considerable discussion of meeting him at his arrival. It was formally agreed that if he arrived in Seattle Mr. Barker would endeavor to meet him and motor him to Portland, that if he arrived in San Francisco Mrs. Warner would, if possible, plan to meet him there.

Mrs. Warner announced that he will be provided with an office in the museum, using the room now occupied by Mrs. Garner.

There was extensive discussion of appropriate entertainment. The chairman was authorized to draft a note for the faculty bulletin asking faculty members to submit their proposed invitations to the committee in order that conflicting and bunching of dates may be avoided, and especially that invitations might be arranged to give him a broad acquaintance in the community and the University community with him. It was agreed that Mrs. Warner would give the first formal occasion at which he would meet members of the committee and others especially interested, this to be arranged as soon as convenient after his arrival. It was understood also that members of the staff would be urged to call on him individually.

The question of where Mr. Harada might most conveniently and appropriately reside was discussed but no specific action taken, the faculty club, guest room at the men's dorm, and possible apartments all being discussed.

It was agreed that Mr. Barker would talk to the Art School staff as soon as convenient to arrange for the close relationships between that group and Mr. Harada.

The chairman was authorized to appoint three members of the committee to a sub-committee to go over proposed social invitation in an attempt to arrange them into a balanced schedule. Also to look out for developing such invitations if and where needed, and to look out for trips and recreation if these are not adequately provided for.

It was understood that Mr. Barker is arranging for visits to other colleges in the state during the winter quarter, that during the spring quarter he will be absent at institutions in California and elsewhere, but will return to the summer quarter in Portland.

MEMORANDUM OF THE COMMITTEE ON ENTERTAINMENT OF MR.
KARADA

April 29, 1938

It was suggested that an art conference be held but discussion of this was deferred for a later meeting of the committee.

It was agreed that he would be invited to give no public addresses until he had had an opportunity to get his work underway on the campus and he is ready to accept them. It was also agreed that members of the committee would see that he is properly escorted to faculty meetings, to various lectures, group meetings, etc.

Arrangements for a suitable room in which his lectures are to be given were also deferred for later consideration.

It was understood that the chairman would see that his courses are properly bulletined to the faculty advisers.

Mr. Barker reported that the University had set aside the sum of \$1,000 to provide for expenses in connection with Mr. Karada's visit. The nature of expenses which might be charged against this fund were not indicated, however.

Meeting adjourned.
