

At present I am waiting to hear from the Consul General at Honolulu regarding my proposed lectures at the University of Hawaii. I may have to stop there on my way home to give lectures for a week or ten days at the beginning of the next fall term, but I am not at all sure. I was expected to give lectures there during this school year which I find impossible. If I do not have to stop over at Honolulu on my way back, I shall be free from August 1 to the latter part of September. And even if I have to give lectures at Honolulu, I think it is not necessary to leave here before September 15. I promised to be back in Tokyo before October 15, so as to be there in time for the opening of the Shosoin. So I feel sure that I shall be able to do some work for you in August and part of September, though rather doubtful as to the value of my service to you as my knowledge on Chinese art is sadly limited. However, in whatever way I may be of service to you I shall be very glad to render.

I am glad to know you enjoyed the persimmons and that you are expecting to be back in Eugene before long.
