While I would greatly enjoy going to Boston, I think that in the long run, it would be best for the Museum that I accumulate the money and send it on to you, so that is what I am going to do, unless something unforeseen should happen.

This afternoon I came to the Museum and found a long box, expressed to me from Mrs Lindsley. Inside the box was the painting of Buddha in Nirvana. She had not written me that she was sadding it and from her last letter, I concluded that the matter was indefinitely postponed, otherwise, I would have written her not to send it. It would not surprise me at all to find that this painting is not as good as the one we should be trying to get.

My plan is to take the painting to Seattle and show it to you before you sail and then you can decide whether or not it is a sufficiently desirable work, considering the subject, and whether you will still get me one for the Museum as we had planned.
