## Provider selected; new employee assistance program soon available

OSU's new Employee Assistance Program (EAP) should be in service by the end of next week, after a contract is signed with Cascade Counseling Center of Portland, the provider.

A campus taskforce reviewed six proposals for the EAP during December and selected Cascade last week, said Susan Hron, benefits officer with Human Resources.

The center's ability to provide referral and a minimum level of counseling statewide prompted the taskforce to select the firm, Hron said.

Under the program, employees seeking assistance can either call or visit Cascade's local office on Ninth Street. A toll-free telephone number will be available for workers outside the Corvallis area.

The EAP will target all eligible employees and their families "whose personal health and mental health problems do or may interfer with their work performance," Hron said.

An estimated 4,000 employees—classified, management, and academic, working at least half time—in all 36 Oregon counties will be eligible for the services, which would be completely confidential, she said.

### New patent director named

William W. Hostetler has been named OSU's new director of technology transfer, replacing Kim Smith, who left that position last spring for a post in the chancellor's office.

Hostetler will help university researchers identify and protect material that could be patented or marketed, and develop the commercial potential of products by negotiating license agreements with private industry.

The 42-year-old Hostetler most recently served as director of patents and trademarks at Washington State University, where he received a master's degree in business administration.

Hostetler plans to increase awareness of the patenting and licensing program so more researchers will take advantage of what he calls their "right and obligation" to market their research.

Last year OSU earned more than \$400,000 in royalties on about 20 commercially active patents and licensing agreements. Income is shared by the inventors, the university, and the inventor's department for future research efforts.

Employees could refer themselves to the service, or could be referred by supervisors, co-workers, or friends.

The service could include assistance for those with drug and alcohol problems; marital, divorce, financial, and legal difficulties; physical and emotional problems caused by stress; depression, extended illness, chronic time loss, and related problems, she said.

Once the plan goes into effect Human Resources will provide training for supervisors and orientation for employees so details of the program are known to all who are eligible. The toll-free telephone number also will be issued, Hron said.

Cost of the plan is about \$1 per employee per month, she said.

Ed Coate, vice president for finance and administration, initiated consideration of the program, which is the second such university plan in the state system. Portland State's is the first.

Cascade has EAP contracts with several state agencies and private industry firms, Hron said.
