Dear Sir: I have an interesting piece of hand-carved Chinese grille work which was designed to be used as an arch way. It is about fourteen feet in length and about two feet in width at the top and much wider at the sides. The design is made up of birds and flowers and is quite intricate. The depth of the work is about eight inches. This is an old relic that has been in Roseburg for about forty years and is reported to have cost \$1500.00. I would like to have this piece appraised and would appreciate it very much if you can advise me how this could be done without too great a cost. If some member of your staff should come through Roseburg, I would be pleased to have him inspect this piece and if it is found to be of enough interest I would consider lending it to the University of Oregon for exhibition purposes.
