CAMPUS WEEK-END OPENS

TWO-DAY, ALL-COLLEGE CELEBRATION TO START WITH ROOK-FROSH GAME

Program Dance Climaxes Long List of Events Saturday Night; Husky Freshmen and Orange Senior Crews Race Today as Feature of Water Regatta on River

Campus week end, a two-day, all-college celebration, opens officially today with a ball game between the rooks and the University of Oregon frosh. From then until late tomorrow night, something will be doing every minute, according to Ted Drake, general chairman.

A program sport dance, the only all-school dance of spring quarter, will bring the activities to a close Saturday night in the Memorial Union ball room. A limited number of tickets, 400, went on sale yesterday in the Memorial Union ticket office. The crowd is being held to 400, according to Curtis Tigard, chairman, in order that everyone will be comfortable in case of a warm evening.

Ruth Messmer, popular blonde blues singer, from the KEX studios in Portland, will sing several of her new songs as the feature. Sammy Chestnut's Colonels have worked up a new repertoire of late hits to offer Campus week end dancers. Chestnut said yesterday that his orchestra will be ready to provide its best music of the year Saturday night. Programs will be exchanged for tickets this afternoon. Admission will be \$1.25.

Classes Excused
Water sports on the river by the Van Buren street bridge will fill the afternoon program following the ball game. There will be no class this afternoon. Two crew races, the first between the sophomores and juniors and a second, between the University of Washington freshmen and the Orange senior crew will be the main attractions on the river. PATTERSON FEATURES DEDICATION SERVICE

Program Arranged for Alumni; Class of 1904 to Receive 25-Year Certificates

Dedication of the Memorial Union building and the dedicatory address by Governor I. L. Patterson will feature alumni week end, May 31, June 1-2. The tentative program for the three days has been arranged which will include the various class reunions, alumni banquet and dance and the baccalaureate services.

Registration of the alumni in the Memorial Union building will begin Friday, May 31. The varsity baseball team will meet the University of Oregon nine as the first event of the week end. An informal dinner for all alumni will be in the Memorial Union tea room at 6 o'clock. Twenty-five year diplomas will be given to the class of '04 at their reunion banquet.

Students, alumni, faculty and distinguished guests will take part in the dedication ceremonies of the building Saturday afternoon. The alumni banquet and dance is scheduled for the evening. Other events to occur during the day are the silver jubilee breakfast, the annual alumni business meeting and the picnic lunch on the east campus for alumni, seniors, faculty and guests.

The class breakfasts and the baccalaureate services will be Sunday morning. The sixtieth annual commencement exercises will take place the following day.

UNDERCLASSMEN SET FOR ANNUAL BATTLE

Tug o' War Teams Determined; Safety Equipment Used

The rook-soph tug-o-war at 9 o'clock Saturday morning across the millrace south of town is the underclassmen's event of campus week end, and both classes are "raring to go." The teams, through hard work by Harold Boone, manager, have been assembled. Donald MacLean, rook captain, announced that the rook team would be chosen from Walker, Sammons, Galbreath, Bergerson, Jones, Harrison, Babes, Guderich, Wahn, Henkle, Stevens and Gustafson. Bob Mathews, sophomore captain, did not have the definite lineup of his team. Dr. C. V. Langton, director of physical education, will be the official judge of the contest.

Through the courtesy of the Corvallis fire department, an ambulance and a pullmotor are to be provided to take care of injuries or oversize doses of water. All precautions possible have been taken to insure the safety of contestants. A wire screen will be laid on the bottom of the mill race, which will be pulled up if someone turns out to be missing.

The burning of the green, in which both rooks and rookies take part, will follow the tug-o-war.

Harold Boone, manager of the tug-o-war, announces the following rules for contestants:

1. Held at 9 o'clock sharp.
2. Sophomore on the east side of the mill race.
3. Teams to consist of 10 picked men.
4. No one is to pull on the rope except the tug-o-war teams.
5. The teams will pull 10 minutes.
6. Losing side crosses over.
7. 10 minutes fight in the water.
8. Those not able to swim are to cross below the place where the rope crosses the mill race.
9. The tug-o-war teams are not to be thrown into the mill race.
10. The members of each team must have a physical examination before entering the contest.

The Oregon State Symphony orchestra will give a return concert at the University of Oregon Sunday. The university orchestra gave a concert here on the campus last year in return for one given by Oregon State on the university campus the previous year. The program played at the benefit concert, May 5, will be repeated in Eugene by request of Eugene persons who attended the benefit concert.

Jacques Gerschkovitch, conductor of the Portland Junior Symphony orchestra, will direct the orchestra when it plays at Eugene. Mr. Gerschkovitch expressed his desire to conduct the concert and Eugene people are anxious that he do so, according to reports received. Conductor Gerschkovitch will be on the campus this afternoon and tomorrow afternoon to direct the orchestra in special rehearsals.

The relationship between the university and the Oregon State orchestra is one of friendship. Marguerite MacManus, professor of stringed instruments and conductor of the Oregon State Symphony orchestra, has made these exchange concerts possible through her acquaintance with Rex Underwood, conductor of the university orchestra.

TOTTEN DEFEATS HAMILTON FOR EDITOR OF BAROMETER

Dorothy Crawford Bests Lucile Porter by 12 Votes in Race for Student Body Secretary; Associated Candidates Capture 13 of 20 Contested Offices

Ransom Meinke was elected president of the Associated students and Carl Totten editor of the Barometer in yesterday's election, dividing the major honors between the Red-Independent and Associated parties.

All other offices went to Associated party candidates with the exception of six. Ronald Johnson was the only other Red-Independent candidate to win a major position, defeating Chet Bergey by a 120 majority, 1334 to 1214 for chairman of the Memorial Union. Meinke polled 1304 votes to 1276 for Greer, and Totten 1320 to Hamilton's 1273.

Hal Boone and Dorothy Crawford were victorious in running for first vice-president and secretary of the student body, respectively. Boone bested Reichle with a 282 majority and Miss Crawford won from Lucile Porter by 12 votes, 1292 to 1280. Hester Davis and Harold Exalt were elected second and third vice-presidents of the Associated students. Relyn Thomas lost to Miss Davis by 40 votes, and Jack McCannell was defeated by 40 tallies.

Ralph Buerke, Elayne Searing and Paul Troch were chosen members of the Greater O. S. C. committee. Buerke will be chairman as he polled the greatest number of votes of the six candidates. Rowing on the frosh crew are Fred Jansen, stroke; James Donohue, No. 7; Walter Campbell, No. 6; John Fuller, No. 5; Don Williamson, No. 4; James Urquhart, No. 3; Lane Baker, No. 2; Al Koch, No. 1; Eddie Benz, coxswain. Bob Young, stroke of the senior crew, has seen the Husky frosh work out, and has the highest respect for the power and speed of their stroke.

The opening event of the program will see the junior and sophomore crews in a race to decide the battle for second place in the interclass standings. Following this race the Washington frosh and the champion senior crew will match strokes over a two-mile course, finishing at the bridge. Edward S. Stevens, former Harvard crew coach, will act as official starter for the races while judges and other officials will be selected later.

A canoe tilting contest for the Phelps-Terkel cup will precede the senior race. The awarding of a cup has stimulated interest in the tilting, and entries are still pouring in, according to Crandall, in charge of the event. Each campus organization is allowed to enter a team in this event.

The moonlight regatta starting at 10 o'clock, will be one of the most elaborate events on the program, reports Bob Young. Two crews, lighted by electric torches, will row an exhibition race. Music and fireworks will be other features.

OMEGA UP'S CAPTURE ALL-SCHOOL HONORS

S.A.E.'s Place Second in Meet; Lyman Stars for Victors

Omega Upsilon, dark horse of the all-school track meet, won yesterday by scoring 58 points. Sigma Alpha Epsilon took second with 30, and Hawley hall with 24, was third. 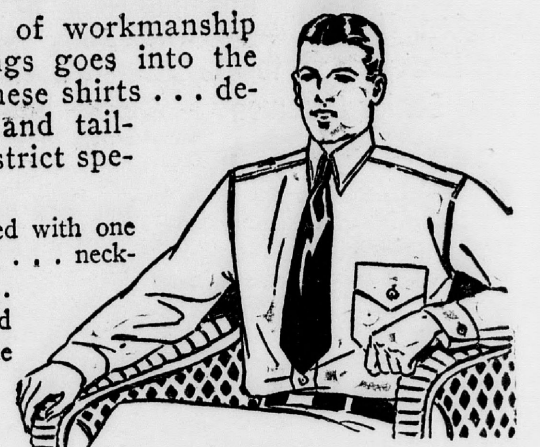
