Freshman Rowers Make Fine Record In Spring of '30

In the spring of 1930, the rooks served notice that experience could be defeated by ambition and hard work in the sport of rowing when they won the annual campus week-end meet. They beat the sophomore crew by a scant boat length and defeated the seniors twice, as the first race had to be run with only six men in a shell, due to a damaged outrigger in one of the boats.

Special entertainment was provided the large crowd when Howard Bullard, rowing stroke, caught a crab about a hundred yards from the finish line and was thrown completely clear of the shell. The rooks calmly picked up the stroke immediately and won the race with a good margin. George Gordon, '31 in commerce, became president of the Rowing club at this time.

The champion rook crew went to Seattle on May 24 of this year to test their ability against the University of Washington freshmen. The Washington yearlings previously had defeated the California freshmen by seven boat lengths.

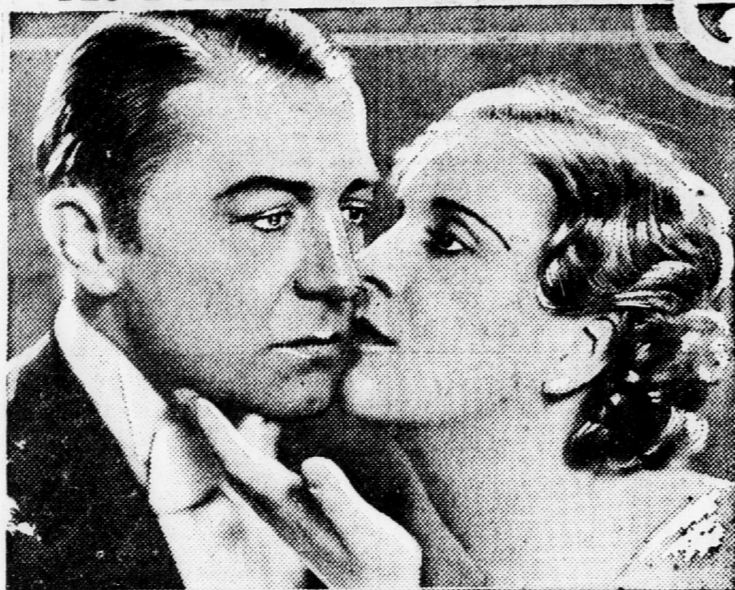
Three strokes after the start of this race, Clark Sweet, ex'33 in business administration, who was less than 5 feet 6 inches tall startled the Washington crewmen by breaking his oar. After the oar had been replaced and the race started over, the Orange representatives were defeated by less than three boat lengths.

In the fall of 1930, the first homecoming race was held and the long-standing dispute between the senior crew, consolation winners the spring before, and the sophomore crew, was settled, the seniors winning by a quarter of a length. This race was held on a downstream course, contrary to the usual practice. It has since been found that it is a much better practice to hold the races on an upstream route, as the men find it much easier to handle the shells.

In the spring, Carl Ahlers, '32 in business administration, was elected president of the Rowing club, and in the Campus weekend races, the seniors and sophomores staged another thriller after having vanquished the rooks and juniors, the seniors again defeating the crew which had journeyed to Seattle the year before. A strong rook crew won the consolation race from the juniors.

A picked crew was beaten by the Portland Rowing club by half a length during the Rose festival when a starboard man caught a crab not far from the finish. At this time plans were drawn up for a new shell house and bids were asked for the building for which a legislative appropriation was asked.
