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



OSU hosts annual high school band festival

The LaSells Stewart Center is the place to be to hear quality bands from high schools and middle schools from Washington and Oregon, as the OSU music department hosts its annual band festival, April 23 and 24.

"At our festival, the bands play strictly for criticism," said Gary Reeves, assistant director of bands at OSU. "It's a sort of reward for the students, they get to go somewhere and perform."

There are 28 bands in this year's festival.

The bands are organized into sessions of about six bands to

each session. The bands play for the other five bands in their session and are judged by experienced adjudicators, according to James Douglass, director of bands at OSU.

"Each band performs about 20 minutes of challenging music and the other five bands make up the audience," Douglass said. "There are two adjudicators and confidential ratings are given to the directors for their individual performances. However, this is not a contest, it is a festival. No awards are given out and no ratings are posted during the day."

The annual festival was started in 1974 and was first held in Gill Coliseum, he said.

High school concert bands do not get many opportunities to perform, so the festival gives the students a chance to play in

front of an audience, Douglass said.

"We think that over the years this has helped to enhance the high school concert band programs. It gives them an opportunity to play for what could be considered a critical audience and an audience of their peers," he said.

The festival also helps the bands to recognize weaknesses in the music they play, and to improve on the pieces, according to Reeves.

"The adjudicators, who are listening to them, are guys with many years of experience and they're going to point out to them weaknesses in their performances," Reeves said.

"It gives us a chance to be evaluated by professionals," said Dan Bowerly, band director at Issaquah High School, in Issaquah, Wash. "It reinforces all the things that I say to the band."

"We get feedback from the adjudicators on things we're doing well and things we could improve on," said Matt Polacek, band director at Cascade High School.

"Some bands are very good and others are in rebuilding stages," Douglass said.

The festival also helps recruiting by getting high school students on the campus, where they get to hear the OSU Symphonic Band at the end of the festival, Douglass said.

The bands come by invitation, but all the bands that wanted to attend were invited, he said.

The festival will run from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. on April 24.

CLA lacks money

The College of Liberal Arts' (CLA) enrollment is expanding at a rate beyond their budget.

According to Carolyn Maresh, CLA business manager, although roughly one-fourth of all Oregon State undergraduates are in the College of Liberal Arts, and it has the most student credit hours (SCH), faculty salaries are the lowest of all the colleges.

Maresh said the CLA's budget has increased by 2 percent this year, but salaries are up by 5 percent and the number of student credit hours (SCH) full-time students, is up by almost 7 percent. In the last two years, the number of SCH has gone up by 13 percent.

"The budget increase is not keeping pace with the enrollment," said Sally Malueg, associate dean of CLA.

Because of the lack of money, faculty and room, additional sections of classes aren't offered even when the demand is high.

"We could fill six to eight faculty positions and not even make a dent," Malueg said.

In some cases, problems meeting the enrollment are so bad, the college has only a week to find a teacher and still doesn't have enough money to offer them, Malueg said.

Nationally, faculty salaries are always at the bottom especially for CLA teachers. According to Maresh, the whole state is 96th out of 112 schools.

One of the biggest problems is overcrowding. "We are supposed to have enrollment management statewide. In order to get under our cap, we have to drastically lower enrollment," Malueg said.

According to Maresh, one of the biggest changes taking place because of high enrollment is having to fill a class until there are no seats left. "This makes a difference in the attention the student gets. Even though we pack them in, we still can't find room."

According to Maresh, there are not enough facilities to hold 100-plus students, and even the faculty are having to share offices. OSU has to get state approval to build and there are a lot of people in line to get space.

The central administration has been very supportive, but changes come slow within the university, Malueg said. "The president and provost have tracked us well in the last three years," she added.

Maresh backed Malueg up, adding, "We have been treated fairly with what resources are available."

Both Maresh and Malueg voiced feelings about being able to house CLA in one building. Currently, it is spread among the 16 oldest buildings on campus.

The expanding enrollment is also causing advising problems, Maresh said. "We see 800 kids in a week. This puts a strain on faculty who need to keep teaching. Do we just stop advising?"

Higher enrollment is not only affecting lower level classes, it is making "upper division classes harder to get into," Maresh said, adding, "We are finding that we are being forced to do what other universities have already had to do."

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Interviews will be held and selections made during Spring term.
Selectees will earn an hourly wage and will be expected to work an average of 5 to 6 hours per week during the 1990-91 academic year.

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Beavers hope to make splash in Pac-10s

OSU women's swimming team dives into spring practice

It may be the off season for the Oregon State women's swimming team, but they are diving into spring practices, hoping to make a splash in the Pac-10 next year.

Ask any OSU woman swimmer which conference is the most competitive, and without a doubt the answer would be the Pac-10 Conference. It is an undeniable fact considering that there are several national and Olympic champions competing while six teams placed in the top 15 at the NCAA Championships. The competition is not limited to first or second places, minutes or even seconds, but extends to recruiting and funding.

The Beavers also face various recruiting difficulties, such as climate and funding.

"It's hard when all the girls visit and the weather is so unpredictable," said OSU women's coach Julie Saunders. "The first question they always ask is about the weather, and I can only hope it's nice out."

Another major difficulty facing the swim team is the amount of funding available. Oregon State is different from other Pac-10 schools because the state does not provide funding for athletic programs.

"They (Washington and California schools) have more scholarship money to attract out-of-state swimmers and keep in-state swimmers home," Saunders said.


Swimming has become a year-round ritual for some athletes. A classic training program requires dedication and planning. It is not unusual for a program to involve weight lifting three days a week, swimming twice a day, biking, running and playing other sports like soccer.

"It is as important to be mentally ready as well as physically in shape," said team member Debbie Fagan on what it takes to be competitive.

Apparently the laborious work and strenuous training has paid off for the OSU women's swim team. "We did real well this year, we competed strong and finished with a 6-2 dual meet record," Saunders said. The competitive swim season, which continues through both fall and winter terms, was full of goals and personal triumphs.

"At the beginning of the season we all got together and set goals for certain meets and times and our main goal was for the Pac-10s. I think we all reached them," team member Becky Curtis said.

"We broke 15 school records, including 14 at the Pac-10 Championships," Coach Saunders added. "These records mean a lot when you can't move up against the top six teams, and it really shows how hard they strived."

With the top six places sewn up, the Beavers battled to place among the final three cellar positions, which is very respectable by national standards. Going into the final day, Oregon State held seventh place by a slim margin over the Washington Huskies. The lead didn't last, however, as the Huskies stroked past

the Beavers, dunking them to eighth place.

The future of the women's swim team is full of possibilities and hopes. "We were real young this year, we have eight strong juniors returning and a total of 16 back for next year," Saunders said. "Next year will be a good one."

Ross drafted by Dolphins

For Phil Ross the wait is over, as he was selected in the ninth round of the National Football League draft by the Miami Dolphins.

"I feel good; as time passed I was starting to panic," Ross said from his parents' home in Seattle. "They're a real good program, with Don Shula. And Dan Marino throws some good passes so I think it will be good for me."

Ross was the 235th pick of the draft, and the second Beaver chosen in this year's draft. Pat Chaffey was the first Beaver selected when he was chosen in the fifth round by the Chicago Bears. They were the cornerstones of last season's Air Express.

Ross graduated from Garfield High School in Seattle, Wash., in 1985, where he was recruited by four other Pacific 10 Conference schools. Ross came to OSU in 1985 and made an immediate impact, as he

played in all 11 games and started the final five. After sitting out his second year with an injury, Ross was a Pac-10 All-Conference selection his final three seasons as a Beaver.

Ross stands eighth on the Pac-10 career receiving list with 153. Last season he caught 36 passes for 415 yards. His best game of the year came in the second game of the season when he caught seven passes for 58 yards against Washington State in the second game of the season in Pullman.

Though the Dolphins are known mainly for their offensive air power, they drafted offensive players with six of their nine draft picks. USC running back Leroy Holt was the only other Pac-10 player drafted by Miami. In all, there were 43 Pac-10 players chosen, which is the most by any conference in the nation.

But can Ross even make the team being such a low draft choice? He thinks so.

"I will definitely make the team, I don't have any question in my mind," he said.

Hohenschuh retires due to injuries

Joy Selig and Shannon Hohenschuh are roommates and best friends. When Joy Selig won the NCAA Gymnastics Championships on balance beam and floor exercise, no one was happier than Hohenschuh. But as Selig proved her dominance in college gymnastics, Hohenschuh was saying good-bye to her career because of injuries.

Hohenschuh fell on January 27 while warming up on uneven bars. A stiffness in her back developed and would not go away. The junior, who had a variety of injuries the previous two seasons, would not compete on a regular basis again.

At Nationals last Friday, Hohenschuh competed on the floor exercise and scored a 9.35.

"I almost stepped out in the middle of her floor routine and stopped her because her eyes were blinking in the middle of her routine. That let us know how much pain she was in," Turpin said. "She's an amazing person and pain does not stop her. It just comes down to the point where someone has got to make that decision,

and basically that's what has been done."

Turpin decided that Hohenschuh should retire. Actually, the correct term is that she's being put on medical. Hohenschuh will still receive her financial aid for her senior year, but will not count as one of the ten scholarship athletes to compete. "I've known Shannon for a long time and I really care for her," Turpin said. "(Making this decision) would be hard under normal circumstances, but with Shannon it's extremely tough because she wants it so much."

Hohenschuh was told on Saturday, and took the news as well as could be expected.

"There were some tears and emotions, but she didn't challenge it or fight it," said Turpin.

Hohenschuh was unavailable for comment at press time. "We (Shannon and I) talked a lot about it last night, it's just going to take her a long time to get over it," Selig said. "Gymnastics has been a part of her entire life, not only her, but her whole family. Her mom is a coach and owns a club, there's a lot more to it than just injuries. Gymnastics just means so much to her, but I think in the very long run it's going to be the best thing for her."

Elections begin tomorrow

This Wednesday, a week after the ASOSU primaries that had twice the voter turnout of last year's primary, OSU students will begin casting ballots in what organizers are calling a tight general election race.

With polls closing at 3 p.m. on Thursday, the races for president/vice president, OSPIRG funding, vice president for senate and senators for the College of Liberal Arts, are expected to come down to the wire.

The president/vice president race will pit incumbents Shahid Yusaf and Laura Baker against Curt J. Carroll and Todd Mickey.

Sunday, in an interview with the *Daily Barometer*, Yusaf said the active recruitment of women and minority students into ASOSU would help create a diversity in the political decision-making process. He also said the concept of equality among all student groups was necessary for solving campus-wide issues.

In a similar Barometer interview, Carroll said a better communication base between students and their representatives in ASOSU was needed to fully realize student government's potential. Apathy on campus, he said, must be reduced and students should be more involved in governmental decision-making processes.

OSPIRG supporters, after having been required by the elections committee to

leave the MU Quad during primary elections for campaign violations, will ask for student funding for their organization.

OSPIRG, a public-awareness group that violated a 300-foot campaign perimeter rule Wednesday when setting up its booth during the Environmental Day Fair, will ask each student for \$2 per term to support the group's educational programs. The group, which has chapters at PSU and other universities around the nation, informs students on topics ranging from recycling to the homeless.

Chip Wood, president of an organization against funding OSPIRG with student fees, said OSPIRG should be voluntarily funded. "As students, it's more important to make this a dynamic, viable campus than it is to change the world around us," Wood said.

The race for vice president for senate between Stephen McLeod and Jeff Grunwald is also expected to be close. Both candidates are running on a platform stressing communication.

The race for senators for the College of Liberal Arts is also too close to call. Co-chairman of the elections committee Mike Lund said this race could be the tightest of all.

"The distribution of votes in the primary was incredible," Lund said. "So many of the candidates were within one vote of each other."

Cast of thousands needed

Big Kiss set for Wednesday

"I think it's kind of a weird way to spend your time, but if it makes people happy I guess it's fine," said Cindy Cretin, a senior in marketing. "PM Magazine" is scheduled to film the record-setting kiss, and KIQUY will play music at the Quad, said Cassandra Wozniak, MUPC member.

People are encouraged to show up early because the event is officially over after the big kiss at 7 p.m., said Kiernan Hodge, MUPC member.

"I guess it will be sort of like mash and dash," Hodge said.

Transfer student requirement change

New admission requirements and difficulties adjusting to a new institution are the two biggest problems a transfer student faces when entering Oregon State University.

The new admission requirements for fall 1990 include a higher grade point average and an increase in the minimum number of transferable credit hours. In the past, admission requirements included a 2.00 GPA and a minimum of 30 transferable credit hours.

Beginning next fall, the GPA requirements for a transfer student will increase to a 2.25 for Oregon residents and a 2.50 for nonresidents. The minimum credit hours transferable for admission has been increased to 36 graded hours.

"The increased GPA requirement indicated to us that the transferring student should be successful at OSU," said Clay Torset, assistant director of administration.

Besides the new admission requirements, many students have difficulties adjusting to a new institution. Russell Dix, associate registrar, said "Many difficulties begin when transfer students assume OSU's rules and

regulations are the same as their previous institution."

Pat Rogerson, academic adviser for the College of Liberal Arts, said most of the transfer students she counsels have a difficult time adjusting to the large class sizes, as most transfer students come from small colleges.

"Problems arise for transfer students when they take too heavy a class load in order to get caught up in their major," said Dr. Morris LeMay, director of the counseling center.

Many transfer students feel isolated and usually don't have a strong affiliation with the university due to the shorter amount of time they plan on spending at OSU. "The more bonds students form with on-campus organizations, the better their chances for academic success," said Ray Leidich, director of the academic services center.

Bob Rice, assistant professor of College Student Service Administration, has set up a class for transfer students. The two credit higher education class, HIED 202X, is offered fall term. "Students get linked with a faculty member and also participate in group support," he said.

Rice reports that "after completing this class many students feel better adjusted and see faculty members as helpful."

Failed escape attempt nets prison term

COQUILLE — A man who was serving a sentence for a failed escape attempt in March was sentenced Monday to 5½ years in the state penitentiary for his failed efforts.

Thomas Cornelius, 25, was convicted earlier on charges of first- and second-degree escape and an inmate with a weapon.

In his escape attempt, Cornelius broke a window in his second-floor cell and, with a bed sheet, he hoisted up a basket that a friend had left on the street below. The basket contained a jack that Cornelius used to pry the prison bars apart, a gun with the wrong ammunition and rope that was too short to reach the ground.

He was able to make it outside the jail cell, but got stuck several feet above the street. He was rescued by the Coquille Fire Department.

At the time, Cornelius was serving time in jail on another escape.

The *Barometer's* choice for Executive Director of Committees goes to Janelle Factora.

Factora is a junior majoring in political science, and has vast experience serving on various student groups including: Panhellenic senator, student government committee, Women's Affairs Task Force, MUPC Special Events Committee, Elections Committee, and Judicial Board Selection Committee.

Although she is running unopposed, Factora's position on reorganizing and improving the continuity of committees and improving the communication between students, student government and the administration makes her the best candidate in any case.

Jeff Grunwald, a junior majoring in chemical engineering, earns the *Barometer's* endorsement for vice president for senate.

Finally, the editorial board of the *Daily Barometer* would like to encourage students to vote "NO" on OSPIRG's request for student funding.

While the *Barometer* agrees with many of the ideals of a group like OSPIRG, it is opposed to the mandatory \$2 charge per term it is asking students to pay.

Special interest groups, as a whole, cannot possibly claim to represent the opinions of an entire community,

and therefore OSPIRG's demand that OSU students support statewide activities must be rejected.
