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A VARIATION ON HOLIDAY ALBUMS

The Christmas spirit has inspired musicians for generations, from medieval monks toiling away at liturgical chants to record-label suits shoving "Little Drummer Boy" in the face of their biggest stars. The latter has unfortunately become the milieu in the music industry, where the Christmas album often amounts to little more than a cash grab. Luckily, some artists still take the Christmas album format as a challenge to produce some of their most compelling art. Here are a few that do just that.



Kate Bush - 50 Words For Snow

Technically this isn't a true Christmas album; it's more of a concept album about winter. One of the album's most expressive lyrics – "It's midnight on Christmas" – sets the scene for the rest of this snowy, tranquil album suite. With its subtle piano and Bush's fluttering vocals, 50 Words For Snow is committed to evoking its elemental namesake. There aren't many better albums for watching the winter weather outside from the comfort of your home. Recommended if it snows.





Mariah Carey - Merry Christmas

This is the most stereotypical Christmas album here, but it's also the gold standard for the genre. Carey and her producers knew exactly what each song needed, and the songs switch between respectful minimalism and joyful pop-soul. There are even some surprisingly experimental moments, like a house take on "Joy To The World" by Three Dog Night. They're done in good taste – which is, at the end of the day, Merry Christmas' strongest attribute.

Vince Guaraldi Trio - A Charlie Brown Christmas

Pianist Vince Guaraldi's soundtrack to the Peanuts film of the same name is emphatically not what one would expect from a Christmas album. It's not celebratory or joyful – but nostalgic, wistful, and mysterious. The material here is mostly composed of Yuletide standards that are given a deft jazz spin by Guaraldi. The best moment comes when Guaraldi tries writing his own Christmas classic. The result: "Christmas Time Is Here," whose vocal version is one of the most haunting songs ever.



Jim Reeves - 12 Songs Of Christmas

This album once moved Sid Vicious to tears, and it's easy to see why. Listen to the love in Reeves' voice as he sings of the Nativity on "Mary's Little Boy Child," or the way it howls on "White Christmas." This is one of the most emotionally-compelling Christmas albums ever made. It's also one of the prettiest; its musical landscape gives up to distant choirs and strings that whip about the edge of Reeves' voice.




Sufjan Stevens - Silver & Gold

Jingler


