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FACTS ABOUT OSU

Oregon State is the oldest state-assisted institution of higher learning in Oregon. It began as Corvallis College, a Methodist school, in 1858 and came under state control in 1868 when designated Oregon's land-grant school by the state legislature.

The main 400-acre campus has more than 80 major buildings. Another 4000 acres adjoining the campus are used for research and instruction. In addition, the School of Forestry uses another 14,300 acres and the School of Agriculture uses 24,000 acres.

With 12,000 students enrolled, Oregon State University is in a period of record growth. There are 14 residence halls, 16 cooperatives, 16 sororities and 33 fraternities.

OSU was a pioneer in work in Food Science. Its School of Home Economics is the fourth oldest in the nation. Its Departments of Fisheries and Wildlife and Forest Engineering are highly regarded.

OSU is part of a world-wide system of seismograph stations reporting and studying earthquakes. The seismograph can be viewed in the Oceanography building.

OSU operates on a "year-round" basis. Summer classes make it possible for a student to graduate in three years.

Oregon State's oceanographic research program is one of the best in the nation and the oceanography teaching program ranks fourth nationally. The 800-ton research vessel "Yaquina" operates out of OSU's Marine Science Laboratory at Newport, Oregon.

OSU offers 125 fields of study in 11 schools and divisions. Masters degrees are offered in about 100 fields and doctor of philosophy degrees in 75 fields. The first advanced degree, a master of arts, was awarded in 1876.

The William Jasper Kerr Library, built in 1963, recently acquired its 500,000th volume. Reading and study rooms accommodate 1,600 students at one time.

OSU is the West's top center for science-mathematics teacher institutes sponsored by the National Science Foundation.

A \$2,500,000 U.S. Public Health Service Northwest Water Research Laboratory completed in 1966 serves the region in water supply and quality programs. The U.S. Forest Sciences Laboratory, with University research units, makes OSU one of the important forestry research centers in the U.S.

Horner Museum, in the Coliseum, has one of the best collections in the Northwest. It contains over 14,000 historical, scientific and artistic items. More than 65,000 visitors tour the Museum yearly.

Statistical Data on Corvallis, Oregon

Historically, Corvallis—first named Marysville—was settled in 1845, the name changed to Corvallis in 1853 and the city chartered by the legislature in 1857. Benton County was created by an act of the Territorial Legislature on December 23, 1847 and named for Sen. Thomas Benton of Missouri, who was long an advocate for the development of the Oregon Territory. The name Corvallis is said to have been a Latin compound intended to mean "heart of the valley".

LOCATION: Corvallis, the county seat, is located at the intersection of U.S. Highways 99-W and 20 on the Willamette River, 85 miles south of Portland and 55 east of the Pacific Ocean in one of the nation's most productive valleys.

POPULATION: Corvallis—28,609, Benton County—45,800.

FORM OF GOVERNMENT: Mayor, city manager and nine councilmen.
TRADE AREA: All of Benton County and parts of Lincoln, Polk and Linn Counties, which includes approximately 150,000 people.

ALTITUDE: 224 feet above sea level.

CLIMATE: Average annual temperature—53.6; average annual rainfall—38.66; (less than Miami, Chicago, or New York); average annual snowfall—8.1"; growing season 183 days. Corvallis has mild, subcoastal type weather with moist, open winters and dry, warm summers. Electrical storms, hail, high winds and other phenomenons of nature seldom experienced.

ASSESSED VALUATION (True Value): Corvallis—\$128,233,736.
Property assessments based on 25% of true value.

TAX RATE: 1965-1966: 92.9 mills; county - 6.1 mills; special school - 71.8 mills; city - 15.0 mills.

CITY WATER SYSTEM: Daily average consumption - 4,651,000 gallons; capacity - 13,500,000 gallons. Construction program underway to double capacity in next 5 years. Softness - 2.3 grains of hardness, flouridated.

FINANCIAL INSTITUTIONS: Citizens' Bank of Corvallis: Equitable Savings and Loan Association: First Federal Savings & Loan Association; First National Bank of Oregon: U.S. National of Oregon.

NEWSPAPERS: Corvallis Gazette-Times (daily except Sunday) ABC - 10,058, Barometer (university, 4 times weekly).

RADIO STATIONS: KFLY (1240 kc); KLOO (1340 kc); KOAC (550 kc).

TV RECEPTION: KOAC-TV (7) ETV; Six channels received from Portland (2-6-8-12) Eugene (9-13). TV and FM Cable reception is available.

TRANSPORTATION: West Coast Airlines; Greyhound Bus Lines; Southern Pacific Railroad freight service; local bus and taxi service.

AIR SERVICE: Corvallis Municipal Airport is one of the better airport facilities outside Portland: 3 runways, lighted, paved 150 feet wide and all more than 5,000 feet long. Charter flights, sales and service, instruction and crop dusting service available. West Coast Airlines serves the city with two northbound and two southbound flights daily.

HOTELS-MOTELS: Three hotels, 7 motels with a total of 367 commercial living units.

LIBRARY: Corvallis Public Library, 7th and Monroe Streets; 51,491 volumes—annual circulation 269,825. A new wing has expanded the library two and a half times its original size. Library service is available to Corvallis and Benton County.

MEDICAL FACILITIES: Corvallis is fortunate to have one of the best medical-dental reputations in Oregon. Virtually every specialized medical skill is practiced among the 48 physicians and surgeons; there are 28 dentists, including three orthodontists; five optometrists; two orthopedic physicians and surgeons and several chiropractors. The Good Samaritan Hospital is a 131-bed installation with modern equipment and an exceptionally high rating. A new and modern wing has added a 50-bed extensive care facility.

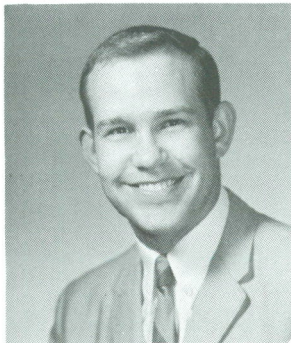

ATHLETIC STAFF

JIM BARRATT — Athletic Director

The hustling new athletic director at Oregon State is personable Jim Barratt, who over a 15-year period worked his way up through the ranks of athletic heirarchy at OSU.

Barratt, 41 years of age, was appointed to the post in late spring, following the death of Slats Gill.

Barratt is Oregon State personified, and his roots are deep. As an undergraduate at OSU, he was editor of the school daily paper, The Barometer, and extremely active in campus affairs. Following graduation in 1950, he became assistant alumni director, and a year later moved over to the athletic department as ticket manager.

Next came the role of athletic business manager, and when Gill became athletic director in 1964, Barratt moved up to the post of assistant athletic director. Then, immediately after Gill's death, Jim became acting director, prior to the final permanent appointment.

A native of Heppner, where he was raised and graduated from high school, Barratt later enlisted in the Navy for World War II and saw a lot of overseas duty. In 1946, when he entered OSU, he married his childhood sweetheart, the former Dorothea Wilson. They have two teen-age daughters.

Barratt handled all ticket sales for many years and his never-ending enthusiasm and attention to details helped establish him as one of the top men in the field. As chief aide to a pair of fine athletic directors, Spec Keene and Gill, Jim helped with virtually every affair of the department and learned his apprenticeship well.

The new athletic boss for the Beavers has been well-trained for his job and has the personality and business-sense to go with it. Oregon State can look forward to an era of sound athletic accomplishment under his guidance.

COMM HENNESSY, athletic business manager, has been with the athletic department since February 1, 1961, after serving nine years with the physical plant at Oregon State. He was born in Fontana, Kansas, but came west to Oregon in 1946. When he joined the athletic staff, he took on the duties of ticket manager and handled that role until recently, when he was moved up to athletic business manager and top accountant for the department. Hennessy is well-versed in all financial matters and proved as ticket manager that he has the personality and charm to get along well with people. Among other duties, he is athletic office manager and in charge of grounds and maintenance.

DENNY HEDGES, assistant to the director, is the newest addition to the staff and is sure to be a welcome one. Hedges, an OSU graduate, has a solid athletic background, having been a student aide to Barratt while in school. Later, he was manager of Multnomah Civic Stadium and assistant manager of Multnomah Athletic Club. Prior to that, he was assistant admissions control supervisor at Memorial Coliseum in Portland. His responsibilities there included handling of tickets, pay roll, scheduling employees and other management. At OSU, he will be in charge of promotions, game management and travel arrangements.

BILL ROBERTSON, Head Trainer, has been chief of the OSU tape brigade for 20 years, and long has been one of the most popular citizens in the Corvallis community. Famous for his always well-received vocal rendition of "Casey At The Bat" and dozens of other recitations, Bill is much in demand at banquets and social gatherings. The athletes call him "Rope-sole," and his reputation as an athletic trainer ranks right near the top of that field. Robertson originally is from Vancouver, B.C., but became an American citizen many years ago and has lived in the Pacific Northwest ever since. He served in the army in World War II, and saw duty in both Italy and the Aleutians. Bill is a graduate of OSU.

JOHN EGGERS, sports publicity director, recently observed his 16th anniversary on the athletic staff at OSU. He joined the staff on July 1, 1950, as an assistant to director Irwin Harris, and was moved up to the top spot on July 1, 1952. Eggers was born and raised in Pendleton, the "Round-Up City" of eastern Oregon. He was an all-state basketball player at Pendleton high, a prep teammate of Lew Beck who later went on to win all-America fame at OSU and play in the Olympic Games. Eggers played one varsity basketball season at Willamette while only a freshman before enlisting in the Navy for World War II. After discharge, he attended OSU from the fall of 1946 through 1949. Before returning to the OSU staff, he worked for one year as a sports writer on The Oregonian in Portland.

BILL SEMON, football trainer, is now in his third season with the Beavers, following an experienced career. He graduated from Enumclaw, Washington high school, prior to three and one-half years in the Navy in World War II. Graduated from Central Washington State College and was trainer for all sports at Central for three years. Served as trainer for the Seattle Ramblers pro team eight years and one year was football trainer at Lewis & Clark College in Portland. Was on the staff at Stanford for a short period of time, before coming to OSU for the 1964 season. Semon is inventor of the patented Palmer Knee Brace used by professional, college and high school football players.

THE COACHES

DEE ANDROS, Head Coach

Born in Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, on October 17, 1924. Attended Central High there, graduating in 1942. Went directly into the Marine Corps for service in World War II. Won Bronze Star for valor at battle of Iwo Jima. Was discharged in February of 1946 and enrolled at University of Oklahoma in Norman. Freshman year played varsity football under late Jim Tatum and went to the Gator Bowl, beating North Carolina State. Next three years played under Bud Wilkinson, and twice went to the Sugar Bowl. The Sooners beat North Carolina in 1949 and Louisiana State in 1950. Among his teammates were Darrell Royal (Texas), Jim Owens (Washington), Jack Mitchell (Kansas) and Bert Clark (Wash. State). Graduated from Oklahoma in 1950 and was assistant on Oklahoma staff in 1950-51-52. Line coach at Kansas in 1953. Went to Texas Tech in 1954 and 1955, and team went to Sun Bowl. Moved to Nebraska as assistant to Pete Elliott in 1956. Also was at California with Elliott in 1957-58-59, team going to Rose Bowl on January 1, 1959. When Elliott became head coach at Illinois in 1960, Andros joined him there and was at Champaign in 1960 and 1961. Andros became head coach at Idaho in 1962 and served three years before taking the head job at Oregon State. In 1963, the Vandals posted a 5-4 season for their first winning campaign since 1938 when they were 6-3. They also beat Washington State in 1964 for first time in 10 years and only the third time over a 32-year span. Idaho, in 1964, almost upended Rose Bowl-bound Oregon State, losing out to the Beavers, 10-7. Vandals narrowly lost to Oregon (14-8) and to Iowa (35-25). Andros is married, and he and his wife Luella have one daughter, Jeanna, aged 9. He is now in his second season as head coach at OSU, having compiled 5-5 record in 1965 through toughest schedule in school's history.

SAM BOGHOSIAN, Assistant

Born in Fresno, California, on December 22, 1931. Attended Fresno High School, and was all-Northern California guard. Also all-Valley in baseball. Played at UCLA in 1951-52-53-54, and was starter on national champions of 1954. All-Coast, Scholastic All-American, 1954. Played in 1954 Rose Bowl game and also in the Shrine East-West game. Joined UCLA coaching staff, handling freshmen in 1955, the junior varsity in 1956 and was an assistant with varsity from 1957 through 1964. Married to former Judith (Judy) Lorraine Busch and they have two children, John James, 5 years, and Jodi Kathleen, 2 years.

GENE FELKER, Assistant

Born in Milwaukee, Wisconsin on March 4, 1929. Attended North Division High School and performed in football, basketball and track. Was all-state and all-city in football. Was offensive and defensive end at University of Wisconsin, 1948 through 1951. Selected on All-Big 10 and All-Midwest team, played in both the East-West Shrine game and Hula Bowl. Played with Dallas Texans in 1952, and was in Army in 1953 and 1954. Line coach at Drake 1955-1958, and an assistant at Arizona State from 1959 to 1964. Married to the former Georgene Reigner, and they have one daughter. Marla Jean, aged 11.

JOHN EASTERBROOK, Assistant

Born in Champaign, Illinois, on July 17, 1939. Played football, basketball and golf at Champaign High School, winning honors as all-state in basketball and most valuable senior athlete. Played at University of Illinois, as quarterback, in 1958-59-60. Most Valuable back in 1958, won Earl Blaik Scholar-Athlete award, most valuable player in Copper Bowl, 1960. On Illinois staff in 1961, and moved to Idaho with Dee Andros for 1962-63-64 seasons. Coached backfield. Married to former Cynthia (Cindy) Coogan, ex-Illini cheerleader, and they have two children, John, Jr., 5, and Ann, 3.

ED (BUD) RILEY, Assistant

Born in Guin, Alabama on November 30, 1925. Played football, basketball, baseball and track at Marion County High School in Guin. Came west to University of Idaho with Dixie Howell and was a halfback for Vandals in 1948-49-50-51. Had highly-successful prep coaching career, 7 years at Wallace, Idaho, and 3-years at Lewiston, Idaho. Served as freshman coach at University of Idaho in 1962-63-64. Also held job as administrative assistant. Married to former Mary Shumaker and they have three children—Mike, 12; Eddie, 7; and Peter, 2 years.

ED KNECHT, Assistant

Born at Toledo, Ohio, on October 12, 1927. Played football, basketball and track at Scott High School in Toledo. Was an end and halfback at University of Toledo in 1946-47-48-49. Graduated in June of 1950. Prep mentor at South Lyon, Michigan; Scott High, Toledo; Dundee, Mich.; Rossford, Ohio; Defiance, Ohio; and Boise, Idaho. Also backfield coach at U. of Idaho in 1957-58-59. Coached state championship prep team at Boise. Married to former Shirley Brekaw, and they have four children—Bobby, 15; Kathy, 13; David 11; and James, 5.

RICH BROOKS, Assistant

Born at Forest, California, on August 20, 1941. Played football, basketball, baseball, and track at Nevada Union in Grass Valley, Cal. All-league in football and basketball, played quarterback and defensive halfback at Oregon State in 1960-61-62 and was on Liberty Bowl championship squad of 1962. Understudied Heisman Award winner Terry Baker. Was an assistant freshman coach at OSU in 1963 and assistant coach at Norte Del Rio High in Sacramento in 1964. Married to former Karen Kisky and they have two daughters, Kasey Kristine, 2 years, and Kerri Erin, 6 months.

Facts About Dee Andros

He's had lots of experience with Bowl games. While a player at Oklahoma, he went to the Gator Bowl once (they whipped North Carolina State), and to the Sugar Bowl twice (they beat North Carolina and Louisiana State). As an assistant coach at Texas Tech, he made it to the Sun Bowl. While with Pete Elliott at California, he got to the Rose Bowl one year.



Dee Andros knew quite a bit about Oregon State University before he ever came here. He was with Pete Elliott at Nebraska, California and Illinois as an assistant coach, and tells how Pete remembered Corvallis and OSU with great fondness. The latter, fresh out of the University of Michigan, was a Beaver aide (his first job) in 1949 and 1950.



Some of Dee's more well-known teammates at Oklahoma included Jim Owens from Washington, Darrell Royal from Texas, Bert Clark from Washington State and Jack Mitchell from Kansas. While at Oklahoma, Dee played under the late Jim Tatum his freshman year, and under Bud Wilkinson the final three seasons.



Dee Andros' only training rule to players is: "We will not tolerate a player who will embarrass me or the University."



If you don't think Dee Andros is tough, listen to this:

"For heroic achievement in connection with operation against the enemy while serving with the Marine Infantry Battalion on Iwo Jima volcanic island from 13 March 1945 to 25 March 1945. Field Cook Andros volunteered for two combat patrols against enemy resistance pocket. As a member of these patrols, he acquitted himself with distinction in the face of accurate machine gun and rifle fire. His devotion to duty was in keeping with the highest traditions of the United States Naval Service."

So reads the inscription on his Bronze Star plaque he won for valor on Iwo Jima in World War II while a sergeant with the Marines.



Andros has to be the all-time speaking champion of Benton County. Since he took over the head coaching job at OSU, Andros has made over 250 speeches. When he arrived on the scene last February, he said, "I'll speak anywhere, anytime, if it will help OSU football." And he has more than lived up to his promise.



The new Beaver headman is extremely popular with media from press, radio and TV, for he genuinely enjoys talking to people. He isn't one to duck questions, or issues. He's forthright and frank. With Dee, there just isn't any double-talk. He also has a charming wife named Luella, and an adoring daughter, Jeanna, nine.

GENERAL OUTLOOK

Oregon State expects to have a good football team in 1966—one that figures to play a respectable game against any of the 10 tough opponents on its schedule. It's another rugged slate, to be sure, but the Beavers are better equipped to chance it than they have in some previous seasons.

Coach Dee Andros and his hustling staff led OSU to a 5-5 record last year through what was probably the stiffest schedule in the school's history. They also came up with a fine freshman crop and many of those sophomores-to-be will play important roles this fall.

The 1965 backfield returns almost intact. Only man missing is Fred Schweer, the halfback, and his spot will be taken by Sophomore Jerry Belcher. Others are All-American Fullback Candidate Pete Pifer, Wingback Bobby Grim and Quarterback Paul Brothers. For a change, Andros has some depth behind them this fall.

Veterans dot the starting offensive line, except Split End where basketball ace Harry Gunner holds forth. Gunner is out for football for the first time at OSU, and his 6-6 frame makes him a fine passing target. Other offensive linemen include Jim Wilkin and Jeff Hardrath, tackles; Dave Marlette and Joe Reid, guards; and Al Frei, center. Hardrath is recovering from a knee operation, however, and it remains to be seen if he will be ready. The same situation applies to Doug John, a defensive line mainstay.

Defensively, veterans also take over, at least in the line. Ends are Greg Hartman and Tom Coccione, tackles are Dennis Rozario and Jess Lewis (a sophomore), guards are Mark Gartung and Skip Diaz, with Russ Kuhns and Jim Godfrey handling the linebacking chores.

Biggest question-mark is in the defensive secondary, where OSU was completely wiped out by graduation. Newcomers Charlie Olds, Jim Scheele, Don Welch and Major Lincoln will be battling for halfback jobs, with basketballer Scott Eaton and Scott Davis the prime safety candidates.

Oregon State's depth is better than usual at some positions, but this is offset in part by the obvious lack of experience in the defensive backfield. If the defenders can somehow come through, Oregon State could have a good season.

Andros termed spring practice spirit as "excellent" and that has been one of his trademarks, wherever he has coached.

The Beavers might not win 'em all this fall, but they figure to let each and every opponent know it has been in a ball game.

Oregon Forest Facts

The State of Oregon ranks No. 1 in the United States in standing timber and production of lumber, plywood and particle board. It has over 21 per cent of the nation's commercial timber volume. It produces 22 per cent of the nation's lumber and 55 per cent of its plywood.

Almost half of Oregon's 62 million acres are in forests (30 million acres). Of these, 26 million acres are classified as commercial forest land. The federal government controls about 15 million acres of the commercial forest land, the state and counties about 1 million acres and 10 million acres are held by some 36,000 private owners. The gross state forest product is valued in excess of \$1.3 billion per year.

The forest industry employs about 75,000 full time workers each year. Last year they earned about \$430 million. In addition, several thousand non-manufacturing workers derive their income directly or indirectly from the forest resources. Overall, forests account for almost 60 percent of Oregon's economy.

In Benton County, where Oregon State University is located, 35 per cent of the total number of industrial persons employed derive their living from wood products. In Benton County, nearly 30 per cent of all income comes from forestry.

Oregon, indeed, is the "land of the tall timber."
